13th Nuclear Blast Set Off

ATOMIC TEST SITE, Nev.—A blood-red fireball burst over the Nevada desert Friday as the United States touched off the 13th atomic explosion of the 1957 test series.

The flash of the blast at 4:20 a.m. (PST) was visible over a large area of the west. The device was exploded from a captive balloon 1,500 feet above the Yucca Flat test grounds. Friday's test was roughly one-half of nominal in power. A nominal bomb is equal to 20,000 tons of TNT. Friday's blast, code-named "Doppler," was originally set for Monday and was postponed because of weather and technical difficulties. There were 41 missions by military planes, and eight scientific tests conducted in connection with the explosion. Four hundred and fifty military observers viewed the test from trenches 3,000 yards from ground zero. Among them was a platoon from a crack Canadian regiment, the Queen's Own Rifles. The platoon was assigned here from its base at Calgary, Alberta. The military men did not take part in any maneuvers after the blast.

Americans Cheered Upon Arrival In Communist China

LONDON—Forty-one young Americans were almost mobbed by cheering Chinese youths when they arrived in Peiping Friday, the British news agency Reuters reported from the Red capital.

The Americans inquired almost immediately what the reaction in the United States was to their visit. Reuters said they had been cut off from the outside world for nine days while crossing Siberia and northeast China on the Peiping Express from Moscow. Reuters also reported: When told that President Eisenhower said they were ill-advised and had done a disservice to their country, a voice from the American group said: "We will soon set him right." Dean Hoxey, X-ray technician from Los Angeles, said: "I am an American citizen and so is the President." The young Americans, many of them students, looked surprisingly fresh after the journey. As the train pulled into Peiping's main station a crowd of about 100 Chinese began chanting "Long live world peace."

Syrians Claim U.S. Has Raised False Threat

DAMASCUS—Syria's acting defense minister has charged the United States raised a false threat of a Communist takeover in Syria in order to hide its own bid for greater Middle Eastern influence. Khalid el Azem joined other Syrian officials in denying that Syria is falling under Soviet control as a result of leftist officers taking control of the army. The United States knows Syria will not accept foreign influence, Azek told American reporters. "You pretend we have become Communist and are under the influence of the Soviet Union. You use this as a weapon and propaganda, hoping to frighten people who fear communism and who are afraid of their goods," the defense chief asserted. "You use it to force American and European public opinion to support American policy in the Middle East. If you told people frankly the real purpose, which is to replace British and French influence by your own and to guarantee the interest of oil companies and other monopolies, the American people would not help by giving you funds," statement read by Azem said the American people and President Eisenhower fail to understand the Arab mind and Arab aims.

ert Steward, Baker County rancher who is state agriculture director or who was chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee at the last session; Sen. Walter J. Pearson, Portland, Senate Tax Committee chairman; Chairman S. W. Horn of the Tax Commission, and State Finance Director John Richardson. "When the Legislature convened in January of this year," Gov. Holmes said, "it was given revenue estimates for the 1957-59 biennium prepared for former Gov. Elmo Smith by the staff of former Tax Commissioner Ray Smith. These were as inaccurate as the figures presented to the past three Legislatures under the same Ray Smith's supervision. "On the basis of this false estimate of the economy, the Legislature prepared its tax program. Upon adjournment in May, the Legislature concluded that an estimated 37 million dollar surplus and the revenue anticipated would meet a budget of 72 million dollars and have a surplus on June 30, 1959, of some nine million dollars." The governor explained that he asked Horn and Richardson to make new estimates. He added that his proposal would provide relief as well as allow a reasonable increase in the 1959-61 budget to provide new institution and higher education buildings, expanded services, all without any tax increase in that biennium. He said that Democratic legislative leaders would carry out his program speedily at the special session. Secretary of State Mark Hatfield estimated that a 20-day session would cost the state about \$111,000.

be used solely for hiring of suitable supervision for center activities. No UF aid will be diverted to operation of the plant for such expenditures as rent, lights, heat and other such items. Also on the recommendation of the budget committee, the board turned down admission to the National Legal Aid Assn., United Seaman's Service, Council on Social Work Education, National Travelers Aid Assn., American Hearing Society and Salvation Army Service Extension. Total organizations now in the federation are 10. Don H. Reed, campaign chairman for the impending drive requested the board to set a date for the proposed kick-off of the fund raising campaign. He said the original starting date had been cancelled because of what he called "vacationitis" and the "recent lumber industry developments." The original date had been Sept. 11. It has now been tentatively set for Sept. 25.

Porter Asks Indictment Of Strongman Trujillo

WASHINGTON—Rep. Porter (D-Ore) said he asked a federal grand jury Wednesday to indict Generalissimo Rafael Trujillo, the strongman of the Dominican Republic.

Porter said Trujillo should be indicted in connection with the disappearance of Dr. Jesus de Galindez, a foe of Trujillo, and Gerald Lester Murphy, a Eugene, Ore., flier. Galindez, an outspoken foe of Trujillo, disappeared from New York City, where he taught at Columbia University. Porter has said that Murphy flew Galindez to the island stronghold, and then was slain.

State Police Resume Search For Flier In South Sister Area

BEND—State Police Friday resumed their search for the body of an evangelist who tended an injured companion and then apparently set out for aid after their plane crashed on South Sister Mountain more than a year ago. Bones of the man found near the smashed craft were identified as those of Dr. Ralph Johnston, a Lebanon dentist and pilot of the plane that crashed on a flight from Lebanon to Minneapolis June 14, 1956.

Search teams set out in ever widening circles from the wreckage to try and find the body of Hartwick Hanson, the evangelist from Salem.

Ferde Grofe And Wife Attacked At Hotel

CHICAGO—Ferde Grofe, 65, nationally known composer, his wife Ann, 49, and Philip Maxwell, 56, promotion director of the Chicago Tribune, were attacked by a club-swinging man as they sat in an automobile in front of the Hotel Sherman early today. All escaped injury when they fled from the car.

The man, identified by police as James Hudgens, 48, Granite City, Ill., was captured by police after a short chase. Maxwell said after he had parked in front of the hotel hidgens jumped into the rear seat of his car. He was carrying a board with two nails in it and began swinging at the Grofes and Maxwell, who were seated in the front seat. They jumped from the car, Maxwell said, and he halted a passing police squad car.

TAIPEI, Formosa—An earthquake jolted Taipei Friday, causing buildings to shudder, window panes to rattle and lights to sway. The only damage appeared to be fallen plaster and a few cracked walls.

Sen. Johnson Protests U. N. Choices Of Ike

WASHINGTON—Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex) says President Eisenhower slighted Democrats in selecting this country's United Nations delegation.

Johnson made his protest in the Senate Thursday before that body confirmed Eisenhower's nomination of 10 delegates and alternates to the U.N. General Assembly. The Democratic leader noted that only one of the five alternates is a Democrat and added: "This is not just a Republican United Nations."

Johnson permitted the entire slate to be approved by unanimous voice vote, however, after asking that in the future the alternate delegates be balanced politically.

Delegates Named

The five delegates are U. N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, Republican former senator from Massachusetts; Rep. Carnahan President George Meany of the AFL-CIO; and Herman B. Wells, president of Indiana University. James J. Wadsworth, U.S. deputy to the U.N., heads the five alternates. The others are Miss Irene Dunn, former motion picture actress; Mrs. Oswald B. Lord, New York; Genoa S. Washburn, Chicago attorney; and Philip M. Klutznick, Lake Forest, Ill., attorney. Klutznick is the Democrat in the alternate group.

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Marine Front To Bring Cooler Weathers Here

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS The southern edge of a storm front was expected to move inland across the northwest part of Oregon Friday, bringing a surge of cooling marine air that will drop temperatures to a more comfortable level, the Weather Bureau said.

However, in Eastern Oregon, which has been plagued by range fires, the cooling effect won't be felt until tomorrow.

The Weather Bureau said fire hazards will remain high throughout the state Saturday, but there was some prospect of a slight decrease in the danger in the northwest. The overall outlook is for a return to the pattern of morning cloudiness and sunny afternoons. Only in the extreme northwest part of the state was there a possibility of showers.

Grants Pass was the warmest community in the state Thursday with a temperature of 98. It was 95 at Medford, 91 at The Dalles, and 90 at Pendleton, Roseburg and Eugene. All rangeland fires in Eastern Oregon were reported under control, but foresters remained alert for new outbreaks because of the continued high fire hazard.

Famed Canadian Climber Killed

TERRACE, B. C.—The death of one of Canada's foremost mountaineers in a fall while attempting to scale an unclimbed peak in northern British Columbia was reported Thursday night.

Fellow climbers arrived here to tell of the death Sunday of Mal. Rex Gibson of Saanichton, B. C., president of the Alpine Club of Canada, in a fall 250 feet down a gully of 9,000-foot Mt. Howson, 40 miles east of here. Two others of a five-member climbing party also were injured in the fall.

The climbers said the body of the major was left tied to a rock at the scene. A rescue party planned to fly there in a helicopter today.

Other members of the climbing party were Dr. Sterling Hendricks, Silver Springs, Md.; Don Hubbard of the National Bureau of Standards, Washington, D. C.; Dr. Alex C. Baberger of the University of Missouri; and Alvin Peterson, also of Washington.

Two Children Perish In Apartment Blaze

SEATTLE—A fire which swept through a three-room apartment here early Friday claimed the lives of two children, 11-month-old Wade Patrick Casey and his 23-month-old brother, Clint Joseph Casey.

The boys' father, Dennis D. Casey, told firemen he and his wife awoke to find the apartment in flames.

Lutheran Beliefs Pondered At Meet Of World Group

MINNEAPOLIS— "What do Lutherans believe?" The question served as a framework for deliberations Friday on a summing-up statement of principles that will be one of the final acts of the Lutheran World Federation's third assembly.

The statement will not be a policy directive. The federation is not an organized church but an association of 81 Lutheran churches from 32 nations representing 50 million Lutherans.

It will, however, express agreement by the federation on basic principles of doctrine and her matters.

Seek Declaration A federation spokesman said the statement might provide a clear-cut declaration of Lutheranism's stand on issues of global controversy. In what outgoing President Hanns Lilje of Germany said was an answer to critics "who say the church has not taken a positive stand on world problems," the assembly Thursday approved a resolution calling for world-wide disarmament.

The resolution asking for an end to atomic weapons testing provided it was accompanied by a halt to the production of nuclear arms.

Baby Lives 18 Hours In Grave

AUGUSTA, Ga.—A week-old boy was reported recovering today from exposure and a slight lung infection suffered while buried 18 hours in a shallow back yard grave.

Coroner E. R. May said the infant was buried Tuesday by his Negro grandmother, Mrs. Pinkie Barksdale, behind the Barksdale home in an isolated rural section about 12 miles north of Lincoln, Ga. Sheriff W. A. Hammond said the grandmother's brother reported the burial to him and he conducted an investigation. The sheriff said he was assured by the grandmother that the child was dead and said he would return the next day to open the grave. When he came back he said Mrs. Barksdale told him she heard a crying sound Wednesday and dug up the casket, a wooden box about 12 inches deep.

Officer's Trial Continues Today

FT. SILL, Okla.—Lt. Col. Walter P. Berger, charged with four counts of negligent homicide in the training exercise deaths of four soldiers here June 22, was scheduled to testify in his own defense today. Berger's defense counsel said that three other witnesses also would be called. The prosecution rested Thursday after presenting testimony that: 1. Berger questioned a cease-fire order given by Lt. Col. Walter Short, commander of the firing demonstration. 2. Short ordered Berger to make sure 4.2-inch mortars were aimed at the correct target before resuming fire. 3. Berger checked twice with the firing direction center before ordering the firing resumed. The shells landed among members of an infantry company staging a mock attack on a hillside position.

Youth, 19, Is Indicted For Shooting Of Brother

OREGON CITY—Clyde Feyrer, 19, Molalla, was indicted Thursday by a Clackamas County grand jury on a charge of manslaughter in the fatal shooting of his brother, Leonard Feyrer, 21. Bail was set at \$3,000. Clyde said the rifle with which his brother was shot discharged accidentally during a scuffle between the two. He said he was using the weapon to frighten his brother, whom he said had been drinking.
