Iowa Woman Beats Sutherlin Girl In Semifinal Match

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Jo Anne Gunderson, a relaxed, red-haired teenager from Seattle, met Ann Casey Johnston, a Mason City Iowa mother Saturday in a youth vs. veteran final for the National Women's Amateur Golf Title.

The long hitting 18-year-old Jo Anne fought her way into the final for the second year in a row with a 3 and 1 victory over Anne Richardson of Columbus, Ohio.

Mrs. Johnston, 34, clobbered University of Oregon coed Carole Jo Kabler 7 and 6 with a three under par round at the tree-lined 36-36-74 par Del Paso Country Club course.

The final shapes up as a rematch of last year's national semifinal when Jo Anne beat Mrs. Johnston 1 up. The Seattle girl lost in the final to Marlene Stewart.

Ed Sadowski was top batter for the Seals in the nightcap. He hit triples in the second and third innings, driving in four runs. Winning pitcher Jack Spring held the Rainiers to eight hits.

Vancouver drummed 15 hits off four San Diego pitchers with Jim Marshall hitting two home runs for the Mounties. Mel Field, who gave up eight hits, kept the Padres scoreless after the first inning.

Carlos Bernier figured in six of Hollywood's seven winning runs. He batted in four runs with two doubles and two singles and scored two more. Bernier's double in the ninth set up the winning run. Curt Raydon scored him with a slashing single to left field.

Carole Jo contends her game lay with her approaches and putting. But she couldn't match Mrs. Johnston, who was chipping within three and four feet of the cup and sinking the long ones.

On the 4 par 325-yard No. 10, Mrs. Johnston dropped a 35-footer for a birdie to go five up.

Carole Jo, pressing to get back in the match, began lunging into the ball and hooking. The lowan ended the match on the 12th when she hit her drive on the 160-yard hole 2 feet from the cup and sank her putt for a birdie. She needed only 18 putts in the match.

The Richardson-Gunderson contest was far different. Both girls were pasting their drives 230 to 250 yards. But Jo Anne was the more accurate iron player, hitting 13 of the 17 greens.

Yoncalla Signs 2 Coaches To Handle Sports Program

Two new coaches soon will begin duty at Yoncalla High School to take over duties formerly held down by Lou Maurer.

Ron Anderson, a former junior high school coach in Roseburg, will handle football and track. Bill Spalgetti, who coached in eastern Washington schools the past five years, will be in charge of basketball and baseball.

Anderson, who was in Central Junior High last year, came to Oregon from Missoula County High School, Mont., the year after that school went through a 10-0 football season. He was coach, and the team placed five in its line on an all-state football team, according to Yoncalla Principal Wayne Flynn.

He will teach physical education, biology, general mathematics and English. Anderson is single.

He will be coaching the second 11-man team the high school team has turned out since switching from the six-man sport. Last year, the Eagles advanced into the state class B semifinals before bowing to Monroe, eventually the state champion.

Anderson is a 1952 graduate of Idaho State College, where he was an all-conference tackle and on the boxing and wrestling teams.

Spalgetti is a graduate of Eastern Washington College of Education. A Couer d'Alene, Idaho, man, he coached at Cusick, Wash. He will teach industrial arts and social studies in addition to coaching. Spalgetti is recently married.

Both men now are living in Yoncalla.

Hatfield Warns Again Cutting Taxes Too Much

SALEM — Republican Secretary of State Mark O. Hatfield Friday suggested that the Legislature be cautious about reducing property and income taxes when it meets here in special session Oct. 28.

"It would be my suggestion," Hatfield said, "that we not raise hopes that taxes can be reduced and services maintained at their present high level while predictions of widespread unemployment are made right and left. Legislators must take a cold, hard look at the surplus before spending it or obligating it in any way."

"Otherwise the surplus may be a mirage that is really the quicksand of deficit."

The Giants scored in every quarter with Frank Gifford scoring two touchdowns, Alex Webster one and Ben Agajanian a field goal and three extra points in a game played at Los Angeles. The Rams scored on Bill Wade's pass to Bob Boyd from 11 yards out in the final quarter.

The Lions also winning their second in a row, were down 20-10 at halftime. With Bobby Layne in the driver's seat, throwing two TD passes, and setting up another score they scored 21 points in the third quarter that iced the game. The Rams had 17 completions in 24 attempts for 299 yards and two touchdowns. He kicked two field goals and booted four punts.

CHICAGO — "It's a perfect night," said Chicago White Sox Manager Al Lopez. "We won and (the Yankees) lost and as I've said all along, we have a chance for the pennant."

The Sox defeated the Boston Red Sox, 4-1, Friday night behind Billy Pierce while the New York Yankees dropped a 5-4 decision to the Cleveland Indians. The result chopped New York's lead over the White Sox to 5 1/2 games.

"All we need is a good winning streak," said Lopez. "Remember how we shot out in front early in the season when we won something like 13 games and lost 3. If we can do that again, we have a good chance for the pennant."

Actually most of the Sox are hoping to win their next six games and they feel they can overhaul the Yankees. They play Boston Saturday, have a double-header against Baltimore Sunday and then take on the Yankees for three games beginning Tuesday.

Pitching Looks Good

"Our pitching is shaping up," said Lopez. "Pierce looked real good out there tonight. It'd be a good time for him to get real hot and win about five in a row."

Pierce, who posted his 17th triumph against 9 losses, had his best game by scoring two runs in the majors, has the same hopes. "I don't know," said the chunky southpaw, "I just hope I can win a few in a row. Especially a couple against the Yankees. If we can do something against them
