

Edict For Catholics Places Sunday Ban On Conducting Business, Buying, Working

PORTLAND (AP)—Roman Catholics are forbidden to work, conduct businesses or go shopping on Sundays in Oregon, Idaho and Montana.

The restriction, issued in a pastoral letter from Archbishop Edward D. Howard, becomes effective Sept. 1, the day the letter is to be read at masses in all churches throughout the three-state province.

A pastoral letter, directed to the clergy and members, is binding in conscience for Catholics and violations become a matter for confession, church officials said.

Archbishop Howard's letter was made public here today by the chancery office. It was signed by the archbishop as head of the province and by Bishops Joseph M. Gilmore of Helena, William J. Condon of Great Falls, James J. Byrne of Boise and Francis P. Leipzig of Baker, Ore.

"Sunday," the pastoral letter says, "is our weekly commemoration of the resurrection of Christ." And it adds that the church commands for Sunday observance: "First, abstaining from any work, second, abstaining from unnecessary servile work."

Exceptions Permitted

The only exceptions to the ban will be for "business services which are so necessary for the common good that they may be rendered legitimately on Sunday." Even then, the pastoral letter continues, those working must have an opportunity to attend mass.

Businessmen may not consider what the effect of competition may be.

The letter asks: "Since others conduct businesses on Sunday and thereby in our competitive economy put Catholic businessmen at a disadvantage, may not these latter do business also on Sunday?"

And it answers: "They may not."

The letter leaves open the way for appeal to the confessor or parish priest "in particular cases where doubt arises." But it emphasizes that exceptions are to be made only for those businesses and industries which are "necessarily continuous, excluding the profit motive, for the common good."

Patronage Ban Included

And because shopping on Sunday is cooperating in "the violation of a proper... observance of Sunday," the letter says that "Catholics may not patronize businesses on Sunday" and should "so order their purchases on other days as to make Sunday purchases unnecessary."

Asiatic Flu Not Germ War Start, Top Surgeon Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—Dr. Leroy E. Burney, U.S. surgeon general, said here the presence of Asiatic flu in this country is not the start of germ warfare by the Communists.

"Is there any possibility that the Communists have planted these germs?" Burney was asked in a copyrighted interview in U.S. News & World Report, a weekly news magazine.

"No," he replied. "I don't believe that is a possibility. We have epidemics occasionally and have had them in the past."

"Could the entry of Asiatic flu into the United States have been prevented?" he was asked.

"No," Burney replied. "In the first place, there are many unapparent infections. In other words, you may have the influenza virus—carrying it around here now, and I couldn't detect it in you. That's No. 1."

"No. 2—There are about 1,800 people who disembark on the West Coast from the Pacific areas every day from planes, ships and other means. You can carry the virus and there's no way of detecting who has it and who doesn't have it."

Burney, asked whether he was quite certain the disease was going to come in epidemic proportions in this country, said: "Yes, on the basis of experience with past epidemics and with its tremendous spread thus far throughout the world."

Burney estimated there are now 20,000 to 25,000 cases in the United States and that between 25 and 34 million persons ultimately may be affected.

Shots Pepper Sheriff's Station; Teeners Blamed

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Firestone sheriff's station was hit by a hail of bullets Sunday night and four persons were hospitalized.

Passersby said the shots came from a car loaded with teenagers. The car made a turn after passing the station and vanished.

None of the injured was in serious condition.

About 10 persons were in the station when the barrage came. All dived for cover on the floor.

Officers said at least three bullets, believed to be .45 caliber, smashed through windows in the station. Other slugs gouged the side of the building.

Dismembered Corpse Of Missing Girl Found

CHICAGO (AP)—Detective squads combed a West Side neighborhood for clues today in the mutilation slaying of a 15-year-old schoolgirl, whose dismembered body was found floating in Lake Michigan in two separate oil cans.

Police said the body of Judith Mae Andersen had been chopped and saved, and was waterlogged.

The case of Judith Mae was the third sensational and apparently motiveless slaying of youngsters—homeward-bound from night time trips around the city. All the crimes are unsolved.

Asiatic Flu Vaccine Shot Slated For Ike

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower planned to receive a shot of Asiatic flu vaccine Monday. The White House said he has come in contact with at least two persons believed to have been stricken by the disease.

Inoculation was advised by Dr. Leroy E. Burney, U. S. surgeon general, who said persons with a history of heart or lung ailments are more likely than others to suffer side effects from the disease.

Eisenhower had a heart attack in September, 1955.

Sen. Warren Gill Calls For Hearing On Tax Reforms

PORTLAND (AP)—Sen. Warren Gill, Lebanon Republican and chairman of a special Senate committee, Saturday called a public hearing in Portland Sept. 14 on tax reforms.

Gill said the committee would hear taxpayers' views on tax reduction at the state level. Scheduling of the hearing followed Gov. Holmes' calling of a special session of the Legislature in October to provide income and property tax relief from a growing state surplus.

Gill's committee was created by the Senate at the 1957 session, after the House of Representatives refused to participate. The committee receives no state funds. The other members are Sens. Walter J. Pearson, Portland, Harry D. Boivin, Klamath Falls, and Senate President Boyd Overhulse, Madras, all Democrats, and Anthony Yuuri, Ontario, Phillip Lowry, Medford, and Carl Francis, Dayton, all Republicans.

Belongs To People

Gill, GOP leader at the last session, said "the governor should realize this (surplus) money belongs to the people and not to him." He said Republicans take the position that disposal of a surplus funds rests with the people.

Boivin, in Klamath Falls, said the special committee will invite representatives of labor, tax groups, schools, the State Tax Commission and the governor's office to appear at the September meeting.

Meanwhile, George W. Brown, political education director for the Oregon AFL-CIO, voiced disapproval of the special session call.

Brown said it would be better to make a study of the state tax system, then let the 1959 legislative session decide whether any changes should be made. He said Oregon's economic situation, which he termed critical, could not be improved much by tax reforms only.

Brown made his comments in a speech at the Portland City Club, but pointed out that he was speaking only for himself.

Hubcaps Thieves Busy Here Over Weekend

Hubcap thieves are still busy in Roseburg, reports at the police station show.

Grant Phillips of the Allen-Phillips Used Car Lot, 1328 SE Stephens St., told police that four hubcaps had been stolen from a car parked on the lot. They were taken Sunday night or this morning, he said.

Ellen Kishi, 1693 NE Vine St., reported one hubcap taken from her car Saturday while it was parked in front of her house. A neighbor saw the theft occur and supplied officers with a description of the thief's car.

PRISON BREAK FAILS

MANILA (AP)—Police today killed 5 of 15 prisoners who staged an early morning break from the overcrowded prison at Basilan, on Basilan Island off the southwest coast of Mindanao.

The prisoners, all Moros, were facing charges ranging from murder to robbery. They fled after cutting two bars in their cell.

was in the open class livestock entries. Turley said the number of entries was down to a point where the fair board was considering dropping the division next year. Turley said this would allow more emphasis on Future Farmers of America and 4-H entries. All other divisions were up "fully 25 per cent," Turley said. Between \$800 and \$1,000 in premiums were awarded during the fair.

"It was a good enough fair to make us think we will probably have another next year," said Turley happily.

One of the most enthusiastic groups participating in fair activities was the Oregon Federation of Square Dance Clubs, which turned out 1,400 strong for its first festival. Carl Ruthrauff, chairman of the organization's festival, said "everyone had a good time. I'm as happy as can be."

Dancing was an almost continuous activity. Ruthrauff estimated 1,400 people turned up for dancing, which proved to be so infectious that many visitors continued to dance through the night Saturday.

Turley said dancers danced until 2 a.m. Sunday morning and then adjourned to their motels. They were back at 10 a.m. at the fairgrounds to take up again, Turley reported.

In the federation's meeting Saturday afternoon, it was decided to make the festival a yearly activity. The next festival will be hosted by the Emerald Empire area of the federation at Eugene. Date for the event has been tentatively set for the weekend of July 19, 1958. Federation officers will meet again Sept. 8 at Astoria.

Ann Ferguson, who Tuesday night will be in a concert to raise money in furthering her singing career, Sunday won the talent contest, sponsored each year by Ricketts' Music Store.

The blonde, 18-year-old Dillard must leave this week for Los Angeles and an interview with a talent scout for the Voices of Walter Schumann, featured on Tennessee Ernie Ford's television show.

The talent win netted her a welcome \$50 and a trophy.

2,500 See Rodeo

About 2,500 spectators saw the first rodeo to be staged in conjunction with the fair.

Norm Gorie of Goldendale, Wash., took top money in the saddle bronc events both days, and Jack Middleton, Redding, Calif., emulated Gorie's performances in barrel riding to star in the event Saturday and Sunday.

Other top money went to Jim Pyeatt, Salem, in calf roping; Art Foss, Redmond, in bulldogging; and Mervin Thompson, Medford, in bull riding.

Purchasers in the junior fat livestock auction Saturday afternoon wrote checks totalling \$3,870.57 for 18 hogs, 18 lambs and 9 heaves. Prices hovered above those paid the day before at the Portland market.

Another big winner was Mrs. Paul Schulte of Oakland, who won \$1,500 worth of appliances of her choice from several dealers who sponsored a merchandise contest at the fair.

Western Electric Company Facing Threat Of Walkout

NEW YORK (AP)—Some 23,000 telephone equipment workers remained on the job in 43 states and the District of Columbia today as union and management negotiators sought to head off a threatened strike.

A one-year contract between the Western Electric Co., manufacturing arm of the Bell Telephone System, and the installers' unit of the Communications Workers of America expired last midnight.

However, after daylong negotiations yesterday, the union announced that it was withholding strike action until at least after today's scheduled meeting.

The dispute centers over wages. The CWA yesterday rejected Western Electric's first wage offer of the current talks. The offer called for wage boosts ranging from 4 to 9 cents an hour.

The union is seeking a 16-cent hourly wage hike in addition to 6 cents an hour in other benefits. Wages now range from \$1.39 to \$2.38 an hour, generally, although a merit scale in some sections of the country places the top pay at \$2.80.

Incomes In U. S. Last Year Reach Record Billions

WASHINGTON (AP)—Personal income in the United States last year reached a record 324 billion dollars. This was an average of \$1,940 for every man, woman and child in the country—before taxes, that is.

The figures came out in a Census Bureau report that showed, among other things:

Delaware's \$2,858 was the highest per capita income in the country, 38 per cent above the national average. Mississippi was low with \$964, less than half the average. Indiana hit the average almost on the nose with per capita income of \$1,946.

Fifteen states and the District of Columbia were above the average; 33 states and Hawaii were below.

The reports covered all sources of personal income, including wages and salaries, net income of unincorporated enterprises including farms, net rental income, dividends, interest and such items as social security benefits, direct relief and veterans' pensions and benefits.

The 1956 total income of 324 billion dollars was 7 per cent higher than the 303 billion of 1955. The per capita income of \$1,940 was 5 per cent higher than the \$1,847 of 1955. Separate reports indicate that per capita income this year is running over \$2,000 a year.

U. N. Truce Observers Investigating Clash

AMMAN (AP)—U. N. truce observers today were investigating a border clash between Israeli and Jordanian patrols in which Jordan said three Israeli soldiers were killed.

A Jordanian military spokesman said a six-man Israeli patrol entered northwest Jordan near Azoun yesterday and opened fire on the Jordanian patrol. Two other Israeli patrols joined the clash and refused to observe a U. N. - ordered cease-fire, the spokesman said.

The patrols withdrew at noon, he added, without inflicting casualties on Jordanian forces.

Funeral For Glendale Man Is Held Today

Funeral services for Robert James Smith, 52, were held today at 11 a.m. in The Chapel of the Roses. The Rev. T. H. Harmon of the Glendale Southern Baptist Church officiated.

Smith, a resident of Glendale for 19 years, died Aug. 23. He is survived by his wife, Dorena of Glendale; two sons; David in the U. S. Navy stationed in Japan, Paul of Glendale, Calif.; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bertron A. Smith of Roseburg; and a brother, James of Roseburg.

Interment followed in the Civil Bend Cemetery.

Barking At Dog Catcher Draws Pistol Whipping

WAGONER, Okla. (AP)—A Broken Arrow constable who doubled as a dog catcher has been charged with pistol whipping a teen age boy who barked at him.

County Atty. Max Findley said the constable, Jess Ridge, 50, was charged with assault with a deadly weapon and released on \$750 bond. Findley said Ridge admitted striking Oscar G. Medlin, 18, Broken Arrow, but said he hit the youth for cursing him and not for barking.

Ridge said, "It's getting so I can't even go to a baseball game anymore without somebody barking at me."
