Those Chicago White Sox did it hard, who knows? They might just manage to stay alive.

You can smile, pal, but don't laugh. After sweeping a pair from Baltimore 6-2 and 3-0, while New York lost a single game at Detroit 7-2 yesterday, the White Sox are only four games behind the Yankees in the American League chase.

Another Yankee loss at Detroit today, while the Sox are idle, and a Chicago sweep in a three-game series with New York opening at Comiskey Park tomorrow night would bring the Sox within three percentage points of the top.

All of which could upset the pre-season dope, making it an all-time race in the AL while Milwaukee runs away with it in the National. The Braves grabbed a 7½-game lead again by defeating Philadelphia 7-2 as Brooklyn knocked off second-place St. Louis 6-5.

Giants Beat Redlegs

The New York Giants, pressing for the first division, clobbered Cincinnati 10-1. Chicago's Cubs, blanked 3-0 on four hits by Vern Law, bounced back with 16 hits in the nightcap at Pittsburgh for an 8-2 decision.

In the other AL games, Kansas City defeated Boston 3-2 and Cleveland swept Washington 3-2 and 6-4.

Don't knock the White Sox's chances. The Yankees are only 5-3 at Detroit, and have lost four of six on this final Western trip. At Chicago, the champs will pitch young Johnny Kucks, Tom Sturdivant and an ailing Bobby Shantz (if his injured finger is okay).

Against the Yankees, the White Sox have Jim Wilson, Billy Pierce and Dick Donovan ready — with Bob (No-Hit) Keegan, the No. 1 relief man.

Keegan Gives 3 Hits

It was Keegan who helped get the sweep over the Orioles, throw-

ing a three-hitter in the opener as a follow-up to Tuesday's no-hit job on Washington. The 35-year-old right-hander, now 9-8, walked none and retired the first 10 before Bob Boyd's triple and an infield out scored one in the fourth. Al Piliarek homered in the fifth, but the Birds didn't get another hit until Billy Gardner singled in the seventh.

The Sox, scoring two first-inning runs without a hit and pocketing a pair of unearned runs in the second inning of the opener, were blanked on two hits by Bill Wright until the nightcap sixth. Then Sherm Lollar's two-run single and a wild pitch nailed it. Billy Fischer won his fifth.

Al Kaline had half Detroit's eight hits, including his 15th and 16th homers, both two-run shots. Bob Turley lost it while Billy Hoelt, who won 23 last season, gained a 6-8 record with an eight-hitter.

Yankee Mickey Mantle was 2-for-3, pushing within two points of Boston's Ted Williams, who was hitless as his bat average skidded to .378.

Bob Hazle whacked a pair of three-run homers for the Braves and also singled in three trips for a .326 average in 57 at bats. Warren Spahn also homered while winning his sixth in a row for a 16-8 record. Robin Roberts lost his 18th.

Sal Maglie trudged in from the bullpen and saved it for the Dodgers, fanning Ken Boyer on three pitches with the bases loaded and two runs home in the ninth. Don Drysdale won his 13th. Gil Hodges drove in three runs with his 21st homer and a double off loser Sam Jones.

Big Steve Bilko of Los Angeles Monday night could become the first man in the Pacific Coast League history to belt 50 home runs in each of two consecutive seasons.

The hefty Angel Slugger boomed his 48th and 49th for this year Sunday night while leading Los Angeles to a 6-2 nightcap victory over Hollywood. The Twinks won their first 6-3.

The doubleheader pulled the curtain for the season, and possibly permanently, on a fierce 20-year cross-town rivalry. Brooklyn's Dodgers are expected to move major league ball into the area next year.

Every team in the PCL played a doubleheader Sunday but only the leading San Francisco Seals scored a dual triumph. They defeated hapless seventh-ranked Sacramento 4-3 and 4-2 and boosted

ed their lead over second place Vancouver to 4½ games.

Mounties, Pads Split

Vancouver split with San Diego, which is in a third place tie with Hollywood. The Mounties won 8-0 and then lost in an eight-inning nightcap 3-2.

Seattle dumped Portland 9-5 but the cellar-dwelling Beavers came to life in the second game and edged the fifth-place Rainiers 4-3.

Second baseman Frank Kellert swatted a home run for the Seals with two aboard in the first game's opening frame and catcher Sadowski matched the feat but with no one on in the second inning.

Kellert and Sadowski each hit another roundtripper in the second inning of the nightcap. The Seals added two more runs in the fifth when Bill Benna smashed a long triple to center field with two on.

Bilko's home-run-hitting nightcap performance for Los Angeles gave him an edge over his mark at this point last season. He had hit 47 homers in 130 games but finished the season with 55.

The Vancouver Mounties won their opener behind the shutout pitching of Art Houtteman and the home run hitting of Jim Marshall and Spider Jorgensen. In the second game, Padre pinch hitter Dave Pope singled in the winning run in the extra eighth while San Diego had taken the lead with a run in the third and another in the sixth on Floyd Robinson's home run. But Monte Owen Friend connected for a tying four-bagger with one aboard in the seventh.

Marquez Hits Homer

Seattle came from behind and beat Portland in the opener and got hurler Bud Podbielan his eighth victory against four defeats. Luis Marquez hit a home run for the losers and Bob Thurman hit one for the Rainiers.

The Beavers bounced back with three runs in the first inning of the nightcap, two of them driven in by Ron Bowen's triple.

Saturday Hollywood defeated Los Angeles 11-4. Vancouver clipped San Diego 3-1. San Francisco walloped Sacramento 10-4 and Portland edged Seattle 3-2.

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Junior Fat Livestock Autcion Prices High

Four - H clubbers and Future Farmers of America won prices over the going Portland market Saturday in the annual junior fat livestock auction sponsored by the Roseburg Rotary Club at the county fair.

Prices for the grand champion hog, lamb and beef, and the runners-up, as usual, ran far over the market. In all, 45 animals were sold for \$3,870.57.

Safeway Stores bought Alfred Oliviant's 222-pound U. S. No. 1 grade hog for 40 cents a pound, which compared to last Friday's Portland rate of about 23½ cents. Safeway paid the young Looking-glass man \$88.80 for the animal.

The company also purchased the grand champion beef from Lavaughn Bennett, Days Creek, for \$418.88. The 1,117-pound, prime grade steer would have brought about 25 cents a pound in Portland, but Safeway paid 37½.

Another Oliviant sold the champion lamb, Alfred's sister, Toni, earned \$52 for her 130-pound animal. Boyer Meat Co. bought it for 40 cents a pound, far over the 21½-cent Portland price.

The Portland prices, of course, don't reflect transportation costs from Roseburg, so the difference between the auction prices and Portland rates actually are greater than they show on paper.

Safeway and Van Dine Meat Co. were the two big purchasers.

Safeway spent \$1,358.01 in buying six hogs, six lambs and three beefs. Van Dine bought \$539.39 worth of livestock, including four hogs, three lambs and two beefs. Boyer spent \$465.05 during the day. The youngsters fared well. Hog prices paid averaged about 25½ cents a pound; those for beef about 30½ cents; and for lambs, about 24½ cents.

Auctioneer Virgil Munyon kept the stock moving as he sold 18 hogs, 18 lambs and 9 beefs.

All the animals had been raised by the youngsters in their 4 - H and FFA projects and all had been shown at the fair during its four-day run last week.

A crowd of about 200 watched the sale in the judging ring near the cattle sheds.
