Congress Passes Construction Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress sent to the White House Friday a \$1,734,013,947 money bill containing about 1 1/2 billion dollars for military construction in this country and overseas.

A new compromise was drafted by a Senate - House conference Thursday, and the House passed it Friday—the third time this month it had acted on some version of the catch-all measure. The Senate passed it shortly afterward by voice vote, sending the bill to the White House.

Final House action had been held up by a dispute over a Senate amendment adding \$425,000 to dredge a channel in the Columbia River from Vancouver, Wash., to The Dalles, in Oregon, and \$50,000 for preliminary work on the Rathbun Dam on the Chariton River in Iowa.

The House turned down the Senate amendment last Wednesday. Friday it decided by roll-call vote of 164-120 to pass the amendment after eliminating the \$50,000 for the Rathbun Dam as recommended by Senate-House conferees.

The compromise included an allotment of \$100,000 for additional Weather Bureau programs, a reduction of \$272,100 from the amount the Senate had voted.

The bill's total is about 238 million dollars less than the President requested, 153 million dollars more than the House originally voted, and 90 million dollars below original Senate recommendations.

INQUEST ORDERED

WINNEMUCCA, Nev. (AP) — An inquest was ordered Thursday into the drowning of a five-year-old boy at a hot springs pool across the Oregon line from McDermitt, Nev.

Coroner Jack Howard said the child was the son of Maurice Clark, Nampa, Idaho, who is developing a mine near McDermitt.

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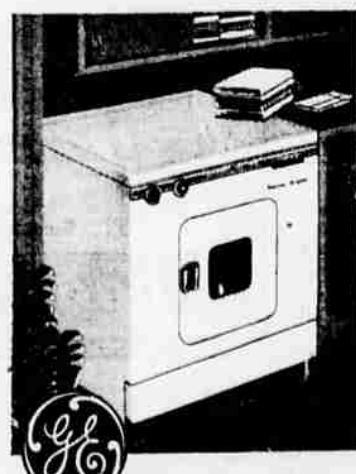
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
