

All New Students Must Pre-register At Myrtle Creek

All high school students new to the Myrtle Creek School District will register at the school this week, reports correspondent Ruth M. Evans.

Juniors and seniors new to the district will register Wednesday at 9 a.m. Sophomores are scheduled at 9 a.m. Thursday, and freshmen will register Friday at the same time.

M. R. Barkhurst, principal of the high school, indicated that students should be prepared to purchase their books and student body cards at the time of registration.

Meanwhile, pre-school physicals and registration will take place today and Thursday for all youngsters entering the first grade. Myrtle Creek students were to be examined today at the school, and Tri-City students Thursday at the Tri-City School, beginning at 9 a.m.

Physicians from the Myrtle Creek Clinic, county nurses and members of the Tri-City and Myrtle Creek PTAs will take part in conducting the examinations.

School in the district will open officially next Wednesday, Sept. 4. Supt. Al Neet said classes will be short the first day. Cafeterias will go into operation at Myrtle Creek and Tri-City Sept. 5. Buses will operate on their usual routes Sept. 4.

Granges Collected 1,382 Signatures

Douglas County granges collected 1,382 signatures as their part of the state effort to bring about a referendum of the state's school district reorganization bill, reports Garden Valley correspondent Addie Schneider.

The bill, approved by the last Legislature, however, became law Aug. 20 because granges of the state were unable to raise the necessary number of names on petitions to bring about the referendum.

County School Supt. Kenneth Barneburg explained that if the necessary number of names had been raised, the bill would have been referred to the people at the next election. However, since not enough names were raised, it automatically became law Aug. 20, the deadline.

The bill, briefly, provides that the county school superintendent shall call a convention of all school boards of the county. The convention, in turn, will elect nine people to serve as a committee to investigate reorganization of school districts in the county. It will hold hearings and then make recommendations to the state department of education. If the state department approves, public votes will be held in all districts affected by such reorganization plans. In order to withdraw from any such reorganization plans, 60 per cent of the vote in any district must be against it. A second election can then be held, and if 50 per cent vote against, the reorganization will not take effect in that district.

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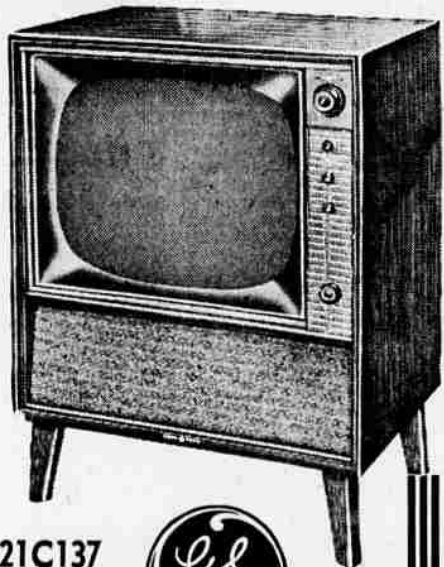
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
