

Go To College, Coleman Advises Legion Players

Good material, good leadership and a full community interest were listed as the three main things that make up a winning team by Ralph Coleman, baseball coach at Oregon State College, in his speech before over 100 people at the American Legion junior baseball banquet Wednesday night in the Hotel Umpqua.

"In order to have a winning team you must have good boys who will put out a lot of time and have a will to win. These things along with a good coach, who will teach them that inspiration is the main thing are the most important things in order to have a championship team."

Coleman stated that the main issue of juvenile delinquency was

"leisure time" and that you can not have a championship team until all boys have a chance to play.

Education Termed Best

Another point brought out by Coleman was that a college education was the most important thing that a young ballplayer can have. He said that a player can always enter into the professional baseball field after finishing college and have a college education to go along with his playing ability.

Coleman pointed out players who had finished college and then went into the professional field, but still had a skilled job that they could fall back on. "Only one player out of 1,300 makes it to the major leagues," Coleman stated.

"The person who sacrifices an education for a professional career is not being smart, but is foolish," Coleman said.

The banquet, sponsored by the Roseburg American Legion post No. 16, had as its master of ceremonies Al Flegel.

Short talks on the team of this year and last year were given by coach Bill Harper and assistant coach Don Severson.

News-Review sports writer Bob Monroe gave a short report on the team's games for the season, pointing out the losses and the wins. Monroe also reported on the team's batting and pitching averages for the season.

Harper also introduced the players to the people present and told the progress of each member of the team.

Also appearing on the program were Erv Short, business manager, and Lee Wimberly, area commissioner for American Legion junior baseball.

Bullet Bob Turley, once a strong but wild strikeout artist who fired away and hoped for the best, finally has become a pitcher, a poised and powerful ace who has slammed the door on the Chicago White Sox in their big bid to overhaul New York's Yankees.

The big right-hander has proved himself virtually over night in his sixth major league season — just when the Yankees needed him most.

He has won nine of 11 and has become the major league leader with a 2-41 earned run average.

It was Turley who fanned Minnie Minoso with the bases loaded in the eighth for a 12-6 triumph in Tuesday's opener. Last night, with the tying run on third and the winning run on second, Turley sent a called third strike past Sammy Esposito in the ninth for a 5-4 victory that put the Yankees 5½ games ahead of the second place Sox.

Giants Whack Braves

While the Yankees were at work in what may prove to be the wrap-up job in their run for a third straight American League pennant, Milwaukee's Braves came off with a seven-game lead in pursuit of their first National League flag after a 12-6 clobbering by the New York Giants.

The defeat melted a half game from the Milwaukee edge as Pliksburgh's Ronnie Kline blanked St. Louis 2-0 with a six-hitter and skidded the Cards to third. Brooklyn took second, beating Chicago's Cubs 4-3 in 14 innings. Cincinnati gained full charge of fourth, beating Philadelphia back to fifth, 6-5.

In the other AL games, Boston was held to only two hits by Jim Bunning and Billy Hoeltz—but one was Ted Williams' 33rd home run that defeated Detroit 1-0. Baltimore walloped Cleveland 19-6, regaining fifth from the Tribe. Washington defeated Kansas City 3-2.

Pierce Loses Game

Turley relieved in the sixth last night after the Sox had tagged Larsen for a run that cut New York's lead to 4-2. The Yankees had smashed a 1-0 Sox edge in the fourth with the first of a pair of two-run frames against 17-game winner Billy Pierce, who lost his 10th.

Earl Torgeson rapped a two-run homer off Turley in the seventh, after Hank Bauer's homer had given him the big edge in the top of the frame. Larry Doby's one-out single, a walk and an infield out set up the payoff whammy on Sammy that saved Larsen's eighth victory.
