Educational TV Getting A Boost

All the television networks present a wide range of informational material in the course of their programming, but commercial TV has never undertaken academic services for specialized audiences. There are 25 non-commercial educational TV stations today specially licensed for the purpose of providing this most useful service. Many of these stations operate under severe financial handicaps despite generous support by foundations and civic groups.

This year, something concrete is being done for educational TV: being provided added programming for these non-commercial stations and connecting them together into a live service using network lines. With the programming talent and facilities available to the network, this plan can make a substantial contribution to educational TV.

In brief, the plan provides that during 1957, regularly scheduled half-hour educational programs will be furnished live over the network's lines—five days a week, in the early evening, to the nation's non-commercial educational television stations.

The programs are being supplied without cost and kinescopes are being made available on a delayed basis to the network's stations in cities where no educational station exists.

Part of the programs have already been telecast, but the series will resume in October for 13 additional weeks. At this time, a check of the television programming locally will give the time and channel.

New Atlantic-Pacific Canal Site To Be Studied

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Bonner (D-N.C.), chairman of the House Merchant Marine Committee, said Thursday his group is going to make a special study of where a second canal can be built to connect the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

The main reason for the study: The Panama Canal is expected to be crammed to capacity with ship traffic by around the year 1970.

Bonner, in an interview, said the House group is going to hire experts to examine where a second waterway might best be constructed.

He said, too, there are plans for a subcommittee to visit Nicaragua. But he did not rule out the possibility that any place in Central America from Colombia to Mexico might wind up as a recommended site for a new canal.

MINEOLA, N.Y. (AP) — A salesman who threatened the lives of singer Perry Como's three children has been sent to a mental hospital.

ENTERPRISE SAVED

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower signed legislation Thursday designed to save the aircraft carrier Enterprise from the scrap heap and turn it into a museum.

The famed "Big E" of World War II would be given to an association headed by Fleet Adm. William F. Halsey, who used the vessel as his flagship. The association is raising funds to bring the ship to the Washington area as a memorial shrine.

The navy has ticketed the Enterprise as obsolete after 20 years of service.

KODIAK, Alaska (AP) — Two adventures on a round-the-world voyage in an amphibious jeep are safe in their jeep, the Half Safe, holed up in a Kodiak Island harbor.

Molten Rock Hurlled From Mt. Etna Depths

CATANIA, Sicily (AP) — Mt. Etna, Europe's tallest volcano, hurled molten rock 500 feet into the air Thursday in rumbling explosions every three minutes.

The latest eruption, which started four days ago, began increasing in violence Wednesday night.

The explosions are coming from a relatively recent crater several hundred yards down the northeast side of the volcano. Lava has not yet started pouring out.

Clouds of smoke and gas poured from the volcano's 10,758-foot high central cone, but there was no explosive activity there.
