UO Students Win Easily In Southern Oregon Open

MEDFORD (AP) — Two University of Oregon students Friday won matches as the field narrowed to 16 and the competition stiffened for the men's title in the Southern Oregon Golf Tournament.

Keith Gubrud, Eugene, a 21-year-old university sophomore, went three under par in downing Bobby Atkinson Jr., Portland, one of the tourney favorites.

Bobby Norquist, Portland, a senior at the Eugene school, had little trouble in trouncing Warren Deakins of Medford 6 and 5. Norquist rolled to his victory with five birdies.

A 30-foot birdie putt on the 15th hole put Gubrud safely ahead in his match. Atkinson cut Gubrud's margin to two strokes with a birdie on the 16th. The players halved the 17th to give Gubrud the win.

Dom Provost Wins
Eugene's other entry in the men's championship bracket, Milo Marlatt, was defeated 5 and 4 by Dom Provost Jr., Portland.

Quarterfinals were held Saturday in the women's and senior men's divisions. Both these brackets were idle Friday.

Driver Sets Attempt For U. S. Speed Record

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah (AP) — Roy Leslie of Denver fully bettered his own American land speed record in a qualifying run and planned to try to set a new mark Saturday.

The 43-year-old auto repair businessman was clocked by the Southern California Timing Assn. at 270.473 miles per hour over these western Utah salt flats.

He said that was the fourth fastest land speed time in the world. England's John Cobb holds the world record of 294.196 m.p.h. That was made on these flats in 1947. Second and third best speeds were made by England's George Eyston and Malcolm Campbell.

Leslie already holds the speed record for an American driver or an American-built car—225.411 m.p.h. and in a record run Thursday he raised that to 263.159 m.p.h.

Eugene Softball Hurler Throws No-Hit Contest

The Portland Beavers lost another Pacific Coast League baseball game Friday night—9-5 to the second-place Vancouver Mounties.

A five-run outburst in the seventh inning helped the Vancouver cause.

Portland was scoreless until the seventh inning. But then the Beavers broke through with two runs. They were under across by Ed Wincenak and Milt Martin.

Portland got two more in the eighth on a homer by Luis Marquez, a single by Bob Borkowski and a double by Ron Bowen.

Billy DeMar's single, a two-base error by shortstop Bud Peterson and a forceout accounted for Portland's final tally in the ninth.

Seals Lose Game
Elsewhere in the league, the pennant-hungry San Francisco Seals, seeking to end successfully an 11-year quest for the league championship, suffered a double jolt.

First the Seals' parent Boston Red Sox recalled Ken Aspromonte, San Francisco's second baseman and the team's leading hitter with .330.

Then the San Diego Padres Friday night drubbed the Seals, 5-2, as the second-place Vancouver Mounties pounded the cellar Portland club, 9-5. This allowed the Mounties to climb within three and one-half games of the Seals.

Hollywood, six games out of first and in third, edged seventh-ranked Sacramento, 3-2. Seattle and Los Angeles, ranked fifth and sixth, split. The Rainiers took the opener, 3-2, and the Angels the nightcap, 2-1.

Boxer Players Hurt
Boxing general manager Joe Cronin said he was reluctant to take Aspromonte from the Seals but explained he had no alternative. Boston's second sackers are on the injured list.

Aspromonte will leave Sunday after first playing with the Seals in their scheduled doubleheader with San Diego.

Padre shortstop Bill Werle shut out his former Seals mates until the ninth and then nipped their rally after two runs to preserve his win.

Vancouver's George Bamberger was hurling shutout ball against the Beavers until the seventh. In the final three innings the Beavers touched him for five runs.

The Mounties pushed across five runs in the seventh, four on Jim Marshall's two-run triple and Owen Friend's two-run homer.

This combined with tallies in the first and fifth and two in the ninth for Bamberger's 13th victory.

Seattle slipped by Los Angeles triumph, but the Angels nipped a ninth inning Rainier rally in the second game to gain a split.

Bilko Hits Single
Los Angeles scored its nightcap runs when Steve Bilko singled in a score in the first and Bert Hamrie, who had hit a double and advanced to third on an infield out, reached home on Bob Dolan's sacrifice fly.

Reliever Babe Birrer came in for Ralph Mauriello in the ninth after Seattle's Ed Basinski scored on Juan Delis' double and the bases were loaded. With one away Maury Wills struck out and Ray Orteig grounded to first to end the threat.

Former Major League Outfielder In Hospital
SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Glenn Wright, former major league infielder, underwent a five hour operation Thursday and was reported in satisfactory condition Saturday.

His surgeon said the operation "involved the neck and mouth."

The 56-year-old ex-infielder, now a coach for the San Francisco Seals Pacific Coast League baseball club, played 11 years of major league baseball with Pittsburgh, Brooklyn and the Chicago White Sox.

He finished his active career as a player with Seattle of the Pacific Coast League in 1936. He managed Wenatchee and Spokane and then joined the Boston Red Sox organization, parent club of the local Seals.

Phoenix Beats Portland In Legion Playoff Game
HASTINGS, Neb. (AP) — Phoenix defeated Portland 4-1 Friday night in the American Legion junior section D baseball tournament.

Giants Defeat NFL Opponent

The New York Giants banished all hopes of their National Football League adversaries that their defensive line would be noticeably weakened this year by the loss of tackle Roosevelt Grier to the Army.

The Giants put on an ironclad goal line stand against the Chicago Bears in an exhibition game in Dallas Friday night that netted the Bruins only three yards in four tries. When it was over, the world champions took over on their own 2-yard line and marched 98 yards, under the passing of Charley Conerly, for a score that nailed down a 22-17 decision.

Frank Gifford's one-yard plunge capped the Giants' 98-yard surge.

Both teams were tied 17-17 at halftime, on scores by Don Heinrich (on a run), Bill Soboda (recovered fumble in the end zone) and Don Chandler's 24-yard field goal and two extra points for the Giants; Harlon Hill snagged two TD passes and George Blanda booted a 27-yard field goal and an extra point for the Bears.

Saturday night, the Chicago Cardinals will be seeking their first exhibition victory in a game against the Los Angeles Rams at Portland, Ore., while the Washington Redskins and the Detroit Lions clash at Birmingham, Ala.

The department reiterated that hunters can look for fall flights of wild ducks and geese to be about the same as last year. Officials say last year was a good year for hunters.

Under the framework announced Aug. 15, shooting hours generally will be from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

The regulations as finally approved by Chilson cover the season dates selected by the states, the bag and possession limits by flyways for ducks and geese, and the provisions for special species such as brant, coots, gallinules in the Pacific flyway, wood ducks, mergansers and Wilson's snipe.

PACIFIC FLYWAY STATES
Daily bag and possession limits: Ducks 5 and 10; Geese (except Ross's geese) 6 and 6; coots and Gallinules (single or in aggregate) 25 and 25; Brant 3 and 3; Wilson's snipe 8 and 8. Provided: In all states except California the duck bag and possession limits may be increased to 8 and 15, respectively, provided such limits contain not less than 3 pintails, 3 widgeons, or 3 of these species in the aggregate. In California the duck daily bag and possession limit is 8, which may be increased to 9, provided such limit contains not less than 3 pintails, 3 widgeons, or 3 of these species in the aggregate.

Duck daily bag and possession limits in all states may not include more than 1 wood duck and 1 hooded merganser. In addition to the limits on other ducks, the daily bag limit on American and red-breasted mergansers is 5, possession limit 10, singly or in aggregate of both kinds.

For geese, not more than 3 of the dark species may be included in the aggregate.

The American casualties in the opening round were Arnold Blum of Macon, Ga., and balding Chuck Kocis of Detroit, who fell 1-up to British Amateur champion Reid Jack and Douglas Sewell, the working class member of the British team.

But Billy Joe Patton of Morganston, N.C., teamed with 21-year-old Rex Baxter of Amarillo, Tex., for a stagger-home 2-and-1 victory over Britain's Joe Carr and Dr. Frank Deighton, while Dr. Frank (Bud) Taylor of Pomona, Calif., and Bill Campbell of Huntington, W.Va., downed Philip Scratton and 29-year-old Alan Russell, 4-and-3.

All States Take Advantage Of Long Waterfowl Hunt

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Interior Department Saturday announced hunting dates selected by state game administrators for the shooting of migratory waterfowl during the 1957-58 season.
