

Juvenile Court Hearing Slated For Young Slayer

THE DALLES, Ore., (AP)—A juvenile court hearing was ordered Wednesday for Larry Zink, red-haired 14-year-old boy who faces a first degree murder charge.

The boy, flanked by his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Glen Zink, appeared before Justice L. M. Martin for preliminary hearing.

At the outset, however, the boy's attorney, Earl Bernard of Portland, challenged the court's jurisdiction and asked for transfer to juvenile court.

Both Martin and Dist. Atty. Harry Hogan agreed to the transfer, although Hogan disagreed on the question of jurisdiction.

The boy is charged with having fatally beaten Mary Matthews, 9, the night of Aug. 16. The girl and a friend had been sleeping out in the friend's back yard.

Handwriting matched that on a note found by police which said a hobo had done the killing. Hogan said the boy signed a statement saying he had stumbled on the girl while talking about in the night, had gone home for an ax, then had returned for the fatal beating.

County Judge James Hunt, juvenile judge for the county, set 2 p.m. Thursday for his hearing. Court attaches said Judge Hunt has the option of sending the case to circuit court, where the boy would be tried as an adult, or of proceeding with it as a juvenile matter. In the latter case he could make the boy a delinquent ward of the court and send him to MacLaren School for Boys.

Larry, resident of The Dalles most of his life, was born at Tacoma.

New Law Forbids Driving With Only Parking Lights

A new Oregon law, which took effect Aug. 20, makes it illegal to drive with parking lights at any time when headlights should be used, James F. Johnson, state motor vehicle director.

Headlights must be used from a half-hour after sunset to a half-hour before sunrise and at any other time when vehicles and persons are not easy to see at a distance of at least 500 feet ahead.

Driving with only parking lights in fog or during early evening hours has been a contributing factor in a number of fatal accidents, Johnson said.

PLEADS INNOCENT

Pleading innocent to a charge of being drunk in a public place, Mand E. Smith, 46, Rt. 1, Box 200A, Sutherlin, was released from jail on \$50 bond pending trial in Roseburg municipal court, Dec. 18. She was arrested by city police Tuesday night and was lodged in the county jail until bond was posted.

Bottles Rolling On Floor Of Car Causes Collision

Bottles rolling on the floor of a car were listed as the cause of a collision in Roseburg Wednesday. The crash occurred at Northeast Jackson Street and Diamond Lake Boulevard, and despite slow speed of both vehicles resulted in a total of an estimated \$175 damage.

Police reports state that Orley B. Milligan, 38, 637 NE Stephens St., was pulling out of a service station when he reached down to pick up some bottles which had rolled from beneath the car seat. While thus occupied, his 1956 station wagon rolled into the street and collided with a 1954 pickup driven by Eldon George Howard, 36, 2340 N. Stephens St. Howard was driving on Diamond Lake Blvd. and was slowing to park when the vehicles struck.

Milligan was cited by Roseburg police for failure to yield the right-of-way.

Otho Head Found Guilty Of Venison Possession

Found guilty of illegal possession of game Wednesday in a district court trial, Otho Ervington Head, 31, Camas Valley, was fined \$100 by Judge Warren A. Woodruff. He was lodged in the county jail in lieu of the fine.

Head had pleaded innocent to the charge filed by state police Aug. 30 and elected to be tried before the judge. The only witness called was the state patrolman who made the arrest for possession of venison.

Head represented himself in the trial. Prosecution was handled by Bert Burgoyne, deputy district attorney.

E. H. Winger Dies In Winston

16 Others Names

In the indictment, 16 others were named as co-conspirators but not defendants. The indictment was returned Aug. 27 but kept sealed until Wednesday to permit arrests.

Thus far, 12 have been seized here and one each in Atlantic City, N.J.; Baltimore, and Washington, D.C. The rest of the defendants are scattered throughout the United States. There are serving prison terms on other charges.

The indictment, unsealed before U.S. District Judge Edward Weinfeld, charges the syndicate smuggled about 50 pounds of heroin—plus large amounts of cocaine and opium—each month from France and other countries.

Williams said the ring began operating in 1950 and has been under investigation for four years. He said the probe leading to the indictment involved U.S. agents and police in France, Britain, Italy, Belgium, Germany, Turkey, Cuba, Mexico, Venezuela and Canada.

Among those arranged here yesterday before Judge Weinfeld on charges of conspiracy to violate the narcotics law were: Edward Weinfeld, 46; and Benjamin Danis, 49, all of New York City.

MC's Enrollment Is Comparable To Last Year's Figure

First week school enrollment figures at Myrtle Creek, tabulated for the period ending Wednesday evening, showed an insignificant decrease from the same time in 1956. The figure for this year is 1,448 pupils enrolled at the three schools of the district, according to Al Neet, superintendent. First graders enrolled in record numbers. The figure represents a slight decrease from the 1,490 pupils who were enrolled in the district's three schools at the conclusion of school last June. However, Neet pointed to a record number of first graders enrolled and indicated that late enrollees were expected to bring the total back up to what it was in June.

Enrollment of 184 first graders in the two elementary schools made that class the largest in the entire system in Myrtle Creek and represented a new first grade record as well as outstripping last year's first grade enrollment by some 30 in number.

Most of the rest of the grades were about "normal," according to Neet.

Myrtle Creek Elementary School led in the number of students enrolled with 177, followed by Tri-City Grade School with 353 and the Myrtle Creek High School with 318.

Evans Products Strike Ended At Coos Bay

COOS BAY (AP)—The 450 employees of the Evans Products Co. here went back to their jobs this week, thus ending a strike that began Aug. 23.

Neither the company nor the Plywood, Veneer and Box Workers Union would disclose terms of the new contract, which was ratified by union members Monday night.

The union said the contract included a vacation clause for the first time, but did not elaborate. The contract will run until April 1, 1959.

The firm manufactures battery separators and other wood products.

Portland Plays Today In Legion Tournament

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP)—Portland plays Greer, S. C., in the opening game of the national American Legion Junior Baseball Tournament Thursday afternoon.

Coach Jim Partlow said south-paw Mickey Lolich will be Portland's starting pitcher.

The other teams in the tourney, Cincinnati and Washington, D. C., play at night.

Last year also an Oregon team, Roseburg, was in the four-team national finals. It finished in third place.

Body Of Portland Boy Recovered From Slough

PORTLAND (AP)—The search for 3-year-old Darrell Cole at Jantzen Beach Park near Portland has ended.

The boy's body was recovered in the Columbia River Slough about 400 feet below the point where the boy last was seen on a family outing Sunday.

Teamsters Deny Union Corruptly Dominated

or influenced" by corrupt elements were based on disclosures against Beck, Hoffa and other Teamsters' chief in the recent hearings before the Senate committee.

The statement which Beck, Hoffa and fellow-teamsters leaders gave the AFL-CIO group Thursday morning said of the charges:

Denies Importance

"Without attempting to summarize the allegations, it appears that none of them are of such magnitude as to support a belief that the International Brotherhood of Teamsters and its affiliates is 'dominated, controlled or substantially influenced in the conduct of its affairs by any corrupt influence.'"

The Teamsters' statement said the union has no intention of taking any action against any of its officials that would jeopardize individual constitutional rights.

But the statement said the Teamsters convention would consider changing the union constitution "in conformity with present-day needs and the principles of good trade unionism."

These changes, it said, "will provide a more effective machinery for the handling of cases and will strengthen the union by broadening the influence of the rank and file members of the union on the actions of its responsible officials."

In effect, the Teamsters thus asked the AFL-CIO to withhold all possible punitive action pending what might come out of the union's convention.

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Farmers Begin Posting Property

Glendale farmers began posting their property this week against a horde of pigeon hunters who have been making life tough for residents within birdshot range.

Correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox said the season had hardly opened Sunday when birdshot began raining down dangerously close to some farms.

Wilton Garrett told the correspondent shot struck his home and the trailer home of his son, Dean, who farms the ranch with him. He indicated that he was going to post his property.

Another farmer nearby posted his property Monday when shots also started falling on his farm buildings.

Still another man, Ted Roberts, reported that birdshot rained down on his property so heavily he had to prohibit his children from playing in the yard.

Plenty Of Boxcars Now Available In Oregon

SALEM, (AP)—There still are plenty of box cars to supply the needs of Western Oregon lumber shippers, Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan said Wednesday.

He said the Southern Pacific Railroad has 600 cars in storage in the western part of the state, which means that the railroad should be able to fill all orders for the rest of the week.

More cars are expected to be brought in next weekend.

JET CAUSED BOOM

PORTLAND (AP)—The Air Force Wednesday said an F-102 supersonic jet fighter from McChord Air Force Base, Wash., caused the loud "boom" heard Tuesday throughout Portland.

The Air Force said the noise was caused by the sleek craft breaking the sound barrier. Steps will be taken to prevent a recurrence of the incident, the Air Force said.

FILES FOR BANKRUPTCY

Shirley Zeans Smith, a Reedsport plywoodatcher, has filed for bankruptcy in the U.S. District Court in Portland. Debts of \$8,033.85 are listed.

Confidential Trial Final Arguments Scheduled Friday

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The torrent of scandal gushing from the criminal libel trial of Confidential magazine has finally run dry.

Final arguments to the jury will begin Friday, the last day of the trial's fifth week in Los Angeles County Superior Court. The case is in recess today.

Probably by the end of next week the jury of six men and six women will begin deliberations. It will be up to them to decide whether Confidential and Whisper magazines, Publishers' Distributing Corp., Fred and Marjorie Meade and their Hollywood Research, Inc., are guilty or innocent of conspiracy to commit criminal libel and to print lewd and obscene matter.

If the jury finds them guilty of a felony, the penalty could range up to three years imprisonment, a fine up to \$5,000 or both. If the jury decides the offense is a misdemeanor, the term of imprisonment could be up to one year in jail and the fine up to \$1,000.

The dominant issue of the trial was the story about actress Maureen O'Hara making love in a Hollywood theater true?—persisted to the very end.

Confidential's final witness was a paralyzed former employee of Grauman's Chinese Theater. Testimony of Mrs. Jan Harkins, a young mother, was taken at her bedside in her Los Angeles home.

Mrs. Harkins testified that while working at the candy counter in Grauman's in the spring of 1954, she was told by a fellow employee, James Craig, that Miss O'Hara was "involved in a necking party" in the rear row of seats.

Mrs. Harkins said she did not see Miss O'Hara in the theater.

W. E. Jones Dies In New Orleans

Word was received here this week by Mrs. Fred Lockwood of the death in New Orleans, La., Aug. 2 of her uncle, Wayne E. Jones, a former businessman of Roseburg. He was 86.

Jones was born at Melrose on the farm now owned and occupied by the Busenbark family. He was the son of Douglas County pioneers, the late Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Jones, who at one time operated the Roseburg Hotel. The hotel was built by the elder Jones and was located on Southeast Sheridan Street.

Wayne Jones was engaged at various times as realtor and insurance agent in Roseburg and was once employed by a building and loan association here. He had been selling insurance since moving to New Orleans 20 years ago. He was well known here as a sportsman, particularly for his hobby as an angler.

Surviving are his wife Rose of New Orleans; a brother, William, and a sister, Mrs. C. F. Harpeter, both of Eugene.

Huge Globemaster Crashes; 9 Hurt

BINGHAMTON, N. Y. (AP)—A huge Air Force Globemaster crashed while landing Wednesday night at an airport. The nine crewmen escaped from the flaming wreckage but all were injured.

The transport from Larson Air Force base at Moses Lake, Wash., apparently landed short at Broome County Airport near here, broke up and burst into flames.

Funeral Service Set Monday For Colonel

Funeral services for Col. Terrence C. Fitzgerald, killed Aug. 27 in a helicopter accident in Korea, will be held at 2 p.m. Monday, Sept. 9, at his home town of Torrington, Wyo. Services will be held in the Episcopal Church there.

Col. Fitzgerald was the husband of Thelma (Carter) Fitzgerald, who, with their two children, has been spending the past year with her mother, Mrs. W. H. Carter, 1031 Harvard Ave., Roseburg.

Ordered Jailed

Richard N. Thompson, 46, Baker, was ordered lodged in the Douglas County jail Wednesday when he was unable to pay a \$25 fine levied in district court by Judge Warren A. Woodruff. Thompson had pleaded guilty to being drunk on a public highway.

Sen. Jackson Proposes Plan To Speed Up NATO Nations Training Of New Scientists

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) Thursday proposed a three-point program aimed at helping North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) nations overcome shortages of trained scientific-technical manpower.

Jackson suggested:

1. A NATO scholarship program in fields where critical manpower shortages exist.
2. Additional summer study institutes to meet urgent training needs.
3. An annual NATO awards competition for mathematics and science students and teachers in secondary schools.

Must Increase Quantity

The NATO nations, Jackson said, must increase the quantity and quality of their skilled manpower if their peoples are to realize "the true promise of the scientific revolution."

He estimated the cost of this "talent development program" would be two million dollars a year when in full operation. At the outset, Jackson said, this program would probably be financed largely by contributions from NATO and from member governments. He said it would be in the "enlightened self-interest" of the American government to pay half of the total cost.

As for his plan for a monetary awards program, Jackson said NATO competitions would give both teachers and students in secondary schools added incentive for effort and excellence. The total cost of such a program, he said, would be about \$50,000 a year.

Jackson said some of America's leading educators, scientists and businessmen who comprised an advisory group have concurred in his proposals.

Portland Fire Damage Estimated At \$150,000

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland Fire Marshal Dale F. Gilman has estimated damage inflicted by a Monday night fire at the Columbia Steel Casting Co. at \$150,000. He said the blaze apparently began in an employee's locker room. One hundred men battled the flames, which leaped as high as 100 feet at the height of the blaze. Four fire fighters were reported slightly injured.

The firm is located near the railroad yards in northwest Portland.

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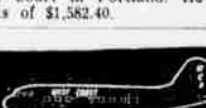
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
