

Canyonville, Days Creek Enrollment Down Only Slightly

Only slight drops in enrollment have been noted at two more Douglas County school districts. Canyonville Virginia Proctor of Canyonville reports that district's enrollment this week was 386, down only 16 from last year's first week of school. The number of high schoolers is 74 as compared to 81 last year. Supt. O. J. Monger said he thought peak attendance this year would reach about 410 in comparison to a peak of 420 last year. High schoolers numbered 75. The enrollment in the district was expected to creep up with late enrollments. One new replacement has taken a job in the faculty, Marlene Bronson, a University of Oregon graduate, is replacing Wesley Nash, who has been called into the armed services.

Three Portland Indictments Are Dismissed

PORTLAND — Three more indictments in Portland's involved probe were dismissed Thursday as the state completed wiping out a series of wiretap charges. The indictments, said Asst. Atty. Gen. Arthur Higgs, do not list facts that constitute a crime. Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding, who started the series of dismissals by ruling just that several weeks ago, agreed. They stemmed from a 1956 raid in which some tape recordings were seized. The federal government used the seized tapes to convict gambler Big Jim Elkins and his employee Raymond Clark, of having violated federal law in making them. But the state indicted Mayor Terry Schunk—who then was sheriff—along with a deputy, a former district attorney, a newspaper reporter and others for having made copies of seized tapes. Thursday's dismissals clear Schunk of all charges except one alleging subornation of perjury. The dismissals also ended wiretap charges against Clyde Crosby, international Teamsters union representative, and Brad Williams, Oregon Journal reporter. In another phase of the city's vice story which started a year and a half ago and saw more than a hundred indictments returned, a perjury trial was postponed. William Langley, who was ousted as district attorney for failure to prosecute gambling, is the defendant in that. Higgs told Judge Redding the state needs more time on the case which had been scheduled to go to trial Thursday.

The present plan the school for exceptional children will be unable to handle more than 30 youngsters. Get Standard Building. Deller said Edenbower was selected for the site of the school in order to have a "standard" building for the children. Tiny Nuclear Device Detonated Over Nevada

ATOMIC TEST SITE, Nev. — A tiny nuclear device estimated by observers at no more than five kilotons was detonated by scientists at 5:45 a. m. Friday. It kicked up a small cloud of dust that rose to about 15,000 feet then floated away west of due north.

Only a dull thump was heard at the control point and there was no shock wave. The five kiloton rating of the blast would make it one of the smallest of the 1957 test series. The Atomic Energy Commission termed it officially as "far below nominal." Nominal is 20 kilotons, equivalent to 20,000 tons of TNT. Friday's blast was the 17th in the current series. It was detonated from a balloon tethered 500 feet above the Yucca Flat test area.

Lane said: "If that is so, why join?" to which he replied with a gesture: "The United Nations means nothing to us."

The broadcast said Chou proposed a toast to "greater unity of youths in the world, world peace" and to the happiness and health of the delegates.

Sergeant Freed Of Abuse Count

FT. CARSON, Colo. — A special court-martial Thursday acquitted a 26-year-old Army Sgt. I.C. Alexander Brown of mistreating an infantry basic trainee after five months of detention.

Brown, of Warrington, Fla., denied he struck Pvt. Maurice Willis, 22, of Kansas City, while Willis was a trainee under his supervision with Co. I, 39th Infantry Regiment.

Willis testified that Brown hit him in the head and slapped him when Brown called him to a barracks room Aug. 4, because he had been absent the day before for general inspection. Willis said he suffered a nosebleed but did not have to go to the hospital.

Elsewhere in the race-conscious South, integration attempts met with varying success yesterday. Negro pupils applying for admission to all-white schools in Arlington, Va., and Maryville, Tenn., were turned away without incident. Catechals and heckling from a small crowd greeted 12 Negroes who attended classes for the third day at Sturgis, Ky.

Three persons were arrested during mild demonstrations at Easton, Md., where Talbot County schools opened for their second year on an integrated basis.

U.S. May Lift Ban On Albania

WASHINGTON — The United States is considering an easing of an 11-year ban on travel by Americans to Communist Albania, site of naval bases for Soviet warships.

The State Department is reported weighing this move as a follow-up to its surprise action Thursday ending a seven-year embargo on American visits to Bulgaria, another Russian satellite.

Top officials gave no explanation for easing the ban on travel to Bulgaria, but it appeared to foreshadow eventual renewal of U.S. diplomatic relations with that Communist state.

The President planned to interrupt his vacation Saturday and return to Washington, where he will confer with Atty. Gen. Brownell.

Eisenhower telegraphed Gov. Orval Faubus that he would use every legal means to uphold the U.S. constitution.

Almost simultaneously with Eisenhower's telegram Thursday, the Little Rock School Board asked the U.S. District Court in Little Rock to suspend its order to integrate.

Hearing Sited

Judge Ronald Davies, who issued the integration order, will hold a hearing on the board's petition Saturday. A spokesman for the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People said it will oppose any postponement.

In another major school integration development, a federal judge said segregation in Dallas schools must end after the Christmas holidays. U. S. District Judge William H. Atwell, twice overruled by a Court of Appeals when he tried to allow Dallas more time for integration, said "it is my duty to do what I have been ordered to do by a higher court."

The court order apparently means about 20,000 Negroes will be integrated in Dallas' school system of 120,000 students. But Gov. Price Daniel said no court order would resolve the segregation problem in Texas.

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550 LICENSES SUSPENDED

SALEM — Licenses of 550 Oregon drivers were suspended in August, the state Traffic Safety Division said Friday.

There were 275 suspended for drunken driving, 68 for reckless driving, 46 for violating the basic speed rule, 39 for failing to report accidents, and 91 for having bad driving records.

Oregon Expected To Have Many Asian Flu Cases

PORTLAND — Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, said Thursday that Oregon may be plagued by 300,000 to 350,000 cases of Asian flu this fall and winter.

Dr. Erickson said mortality rates of the new strain are less than two per 1,000 cases. This could amount to some 600 deaths in Oregon from the disease, based on Dr. Erickson's estimate of the number of cases of the disease.

He said that anti-flu shots would be available to some 90,000 persons in the state later this month. None of the vaccine is tax-purchased and there are no government controls on the vaccine, he reported.

He said the vaccine immunizes about 70 per cent of those vaccinated.

The health experts later proposed establishment of a state advisory committee, to help combat such an epidemic.

Way Resigns Boilermakers Union Position

PORTLAND — William Way said Thursday he has resigned as business manager of the Portland local of the Boilermakers Union.

He said it was voluntary but The Oregonian said it had been demanded.

The local has a building financed out of lush World War II shipbuilding members' dues which long has been called the "marble palace." And it has, according to Homer E. Patton, international vice president, liquid assets of about \$1,250,000. Its membership is about 3,000.

Way is president of the Portland Central Labor Council and has been a frequent critic of Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton over the handling of Portland's vice investigation. He was in the news again last month when gambler Big Jim Elkins said Way had a bad record in the Navy. Way said that was a smear and the Labor Council gave him a vote of confidence.

Calims Move Voluntary

In San Francisco Thursday, where he is attending a union negotiation session, Way said he had resigned, voluntarily, effective Sept. 14.

Patton was quoted by The Oregonian as saying, however, that Way's resignation had been requested because of "unethical activities" in the union. He declined to detail them, except to say he had found discrimination in Portland hiring and "various other matters."

Patton said he would take over as receiver of the Portland union. Whether Way's resignation would also take him from the Central Labor Council presidency was uncertain.

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against any aggression, subversion or other pressures from Syria.

The governments of Lebanon and Jordan, both strongly pro-Western, were described here as feeling themselves under heavy political pressures because of the Syrian crisis.

Air Lift Sited Soon

In the case of Jordan, an air lift will begin operating, perhaps next week, to deliver mobile weapons — presumably such things as light artillery and machine guns.

Disclosure of the decision to hasten weapons deliveries to the four nations came as the State Department announced that Secretary Dulles will make a personal report on the Syrian situation to President Eisenhower.

The State Department said Henderson's report would be given further study "in the light of relevant principles of the United Nations charter and the policies set forth in the joint resolution of March 9, 1957."

The congressional resolution of March 9 embodied Eisenhower's emergency Middle East declaration offering American economic and military aid to any Middle East country resisting Communist aggression and subversion, and seeking aid.

The reference to it seemed to imply there might be some action to shore up the independence of Lebanon, Jordan, Turkey and Iraq—neighbors of Syria.

Atomic Bomb To Be Set Off To Study Earthquake Effects

TORONTO — The United States is fulfilling the wish of scientists to atom bomb. Prof. Frank Press of California reported Friday.

The A-bomb will be set off underground at 9 a.m. PST Sept. 14 in Nevada as part of regular tests by the Atomic Energy Commission.

But for the first time, in a most unusual step, the exact time is being announced in advance so scientists all over the world can record and study the shock waves beating and bouncing through the earth.

This "earthquake" bomb is expected to yield invaluable information concerning the makeup of the interior of the earth, said Dr. Press, seismologist at the California Institute of Technology.

Early this week Dr. K. E. Bullen of Australia said scientists had asked Washington, London and Moscow two years ago for permission to use one to four A-bombs for scientific study. He said the knowledge learned could help in the goal of some day predicting earthquakes.

Russian scientists replied they didn't favor using A-bombs, mainly because of the danger of radioactivity.

Dr. Press said there would be no hazard from radioactive contamination in the underground blast.

Eisenhower To Cut Short His Vacation To Study Problems

NEWPORT, R.I. — President Eisenhower will interrupt his New England vacation tomorrow to return to Washington for conferences on the Arkansas school integration controversy and the Middle East Communist threat.

The President, scarcely unpacked after arrival from the capital Wednesday, plans to return to his Narragansett Bay resort center tomorrow evening.

He and Mrs. Eisenhower, still convalescing from Aug. 6 surgery, are guests at the U.S. Naval Base on Coaster's Harbor Island.

Late yesterday press secretary James C. Hagerly said the President would return to the White House tomorrow.

1. Confer with Atty. Gen. Brownell regarding the school integration situation in Little Rock, Ark.

2. Meet with Secretary of State Dulles and State Department trouble shooter Loy Henderson for a briefing on a mounting crisis in Syria. Henderson returned this week from the Middle East where he developed a "deep concern" lest Syria should become a victim of international communism.

3. Get together with Budget Director Brundage for preliminary discussion of the administration's pending program for the fiscal year starting next July 1.

The White House also announced the President probably will drive from Washington to Baltimore, Md., for a brief stop late in the afternoon at a coming-out party for his young niece, Ruth Eisenhower. She is the daughter of the chief executive's youngest brother, Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, president of Johns Hopkins University.
