ted when school resumes Monday, but his previous order that integration must start immediately still is in effect although defied by Gov. Orval Faubus.

The decision left the outcome of the struggle uncertain and a governor's aide said there will be no immediate comment from Gov. Faubus.

President Eisenhower and Atty. Gen. Brownell conferred in Washington Saturday on the Little Rock matter but reached no decision on what possible steps the government might take in the dispute.

Order More Guardsmen
Faubus, who contends that he stopped integration with National Guardsmen Tuesday to maintain peace and order, has ordered a fresh company of guardsmen to report for duty at the high school Monday morning.

Only a token force guarded the school grounds Saturday.

The school board, represented by attorney Richard Butler, told the court that the National Guard troops called out by Wiley Branton, representing the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, declared "tension and agitation have no bearing on this suit. They were brought about by actions of the governor and National Guard."

Every seat in the courtroom was filled. About 15 Negroes sat on two benches. No white people sat with them.

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Thunderstorms Hail Hit States; Two Girls Killed

Thunderstorms and hail raked northern Texas and New Mexico as a huge mass of cold air pushed southward Saturday over much of the nation.

Rain and thundershowers also pelleted other scattered areas of the country from Texas to the Ohio Valley and in the Southeast and Northwest.

Two teenage girls were killed and a dozen other youngsters were injured in Sweetwater, Tex., Friday night when a bolt of lightning struck a tree under which they were huddling.

Waters swirled as high as three feet deep through Clovis in eastern New Mexico after a four-inch deluge Friday night. A dust storm roared through Wheatland, about 10 miles north of Clovis.

Hail destroyed cotton
Hail wiped out the cotton crop in some areas of the storm-battered Texas-New Mexico sections.

Forecasters Saturday indicated more rain for most sections of the country as the cool air started to drift southward.

Showers will occur from the southern plains into the Ohio Valley and New York State. Rain also was predicted for the Gulf Coast states, the central and southern plateaus and in the Northwest from Western Montana through Washington and northwestern Oregon.

At Sweetwater, Robbie Mitchell, 15, apparently was killed outright. Firemen worked for an hour and a half but were unable to revive Glenda Sue Condray, 14.

Ruby Walker, 14, was revived after 70 minutes and was reported in serious condition. Eleven other girls were hospitalized and one was treated and released.

Wayne Tyrone, football coach at the John Rogers Junior High said, "I saw the lightning strike the tree but didn't hear anything."

ate the Middle East and its current activities to rob Syria of its independence.

He said Eisenhower was "determined to carry out our national policy" of opposing such Soviet moves.

Dulles disclosed that American programs of economic aid, as well as arms shipments, are being speeded up for Syria's neighboring countries.

Eisenhower already has ordered airlifting of U.S. weapons to Jordan, and is reported considering flying arms to Iraq also.

Dulles said that, after hearing Henderson's report, Eisenhower expressed hope that international Communism would not push Syria into acts of aggression against Syria's neighbors.

Bellot Strait Trip Completed By Patrol Ship

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Three U.S. Coast Guard ships and a Canadian Arctic patrol vessel have gone through Bellot Strait, "key link in the Northwest Passage," the Navy reported Saturday.

Their journey through the 50-foot channel at the northern tip of the American continent established an escape route eastward for ships which otherwise might be trapped by Arctic icepacks.

At the eastern exit of the strait, commanding officers of the ships signed a message reporting on their journey and left it in a cairn, or marked cache, near Ft. Ross, Somerset Island.

"On arrival in U.S. waters," their note said, "the U.S. Coast Guard ships will be the first ships flying the Stars and Stripes, and the first squadron of ships to accomplish the Northwest Passage."

The Canadian ship, Labrador, led the way in overcast weather and the three U.S. vessels followed through the calm water of the strait, the Navy reported. They found only occasional scattered ice during the one-hour and 20 minute passage, which was completed yesterday, the Navy added.

Bellot Strait separates Boothia Peninsula from the mainland from Somerset Island. Boothia Peninsula is the northernmost point of the American mainland.

Development of a comprehensive hospital policy took the limelight this week at the regular board meeting of the Southern Oregon Hospital for Crippled Children, Inc.

The meeting was held at Boswell Springs, the 22-acre site of a proposed nonprofit hospital for crippled children.

Ernest Seaton was selected as chairman of the policy-making committee. He will be assisted by Delbert Dickey of Yoncalla and Lowell Anderson of Drain. Dr. Lucian Imboden of Drain, medical adviser of the hospital project, will assist in forming the medical advisory group to make suggestions to the policy committee.

Several civic organizations of the state have expressed willingness to canvass their cities for donations to the hospital project, it was reported. The report was made by Gladys Workman of Scottsburg, vice chairman of the hospital corporation. Mrs. Workman said the volunteering clubs and individuals would like to have cards showing their authorization to collect donations for the proposed hospital.

New Hurricane Reported Spawning In Atlantic
SAN JUAN, P.R. — Squalling westward today from mid-Atlantic new-born hurricane Carrie, swinging 100 miles an hour, has makers in the air 1,000 miles from land.

The U.S. Weather Bureau located the center of the season's third whole gale last night at about 2,600 miles east southeast of Miami, Fla., and 1,750 miles east southeast of San Juan.

Port of Lee has more than 1,000 miles east of the lesser Antilles, and forecasters said that "from its present direction and forward speed, there is no immediate threat to insular areas."

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Prison Inmate Shot During Escape Attempt

WALLA WALLA, Wash. — An inmate who hid in a construction area outside the state prison walls was shot three times at 2:30 a.m. Saturday and captured as he dangled head down with barbed wire snared around his ankle.

Warden Bob Rhay identified him as Clifford W. Lurvey, 39, serving seven years from King County for grand larceny and burglary.

Lurvey was in critical condition at the prison hospital with wounds in the abdomen, pelvic area and leg. He underwent surgery.

The warden said Lurvey failed to check in at 4 p.m. Friday when the work crew was returned inside the walls. The construction area is behind a high wire fence, topped with barbed wire.

Normally towers overlooking the area are vacated after the inmates are checked inside. But they were manned overnight after Lurvey's disappearance.

Warden Rhay said Lurvey was scaling the fence and had reached the barbed wire when guards in the two towers opened fire. He had taken the gamble on going over under the lights, assuming the towers were vacated as usual at night.

Captured, he said in a semi-conscious state. "You didn't leave those towers."

Lurvey, who had been on a paint crew, was torn badly by the barbed wire in addition to being hit three times as the guards fired six shots at him, Warden Rhay said.

Tanks, Armored Cars Patrol Cienfuegos Streets After Revolt
HAVANA, Cuba — Tanks and armored cars manned by heavily armed troops patrolled the streets of Cienfuegos today after the second outbreak of rebel action in two days.

Unconfirmed reports indicated the total of dead and wounded might reach as high as 125.

President Fulgencio Batista's armed forces were on the alert throughout Cuba but reports from the six provincial capitals said calm prevailed.

Army planes and Coast Guard vessels kept a coastal watch to prevent any landings of reinforcements for rebel leader Fidel Castro.

The second bloody outbreak in the south central Cuban sugar port of Cienfuegos occurred Friday morning after the government said it had completely smashed the previous day's attack.

Apparently some diehard dissidents had hidden in buildings when airborne troops and armor supported by warplanes quelled the first outbreak.

Government planes, tanks, armored cars and troops carried out a furious assault against the small bands of rebel holdouts.

Provoos Arrested With Young Boy
LINCOLN, Neb. — John David Provoos, 40, World War II Army sergeant once convicted of treason, later freed, and a young boy were held here Saturday.

The pair had been sought for a week after Anne Arundel County, Md., had issued a missing persons bulletin on them.

Maryland police said that due to a rheumatic heart condition, the youth, Robert Lane, was the subject of some anxiety. He had last been seen when he went to visit Provoos in Annapolis Aug. 30.

The two were found by detectives in a Lincoln rooming house about midnight Friday. Police were holding them on an open charge pending a call from Annapolis police.

Provoos told officers the youth left with him because of constant fighting between Lane's parents at home.

Reciprocal Agreement Necessary, Says Chou
PEIPING, China — Premier Chou En-lai told touring American youths Saturday that 24 U.S. newsmen will not be admitted to Red China unless the United States allows Chinese reporters the same rights.

Chou told the Americans that the State Department must agree to the matter by refusing reciprocal rights of coverage to Chinese reporters.

Chou met with 41 Americans at the headquarters of the State Council and talked on American prisoners in China, Chinese "prisoners" in the United States, newsmen, the Hungarian report in the United Nations, Formosa and Tibet.

Chou said Red China is against the U.N. Hungarian report. "It starts from the standpoint of interfering in the internal affairs of Hungary. It distorts facts."

WOMEN'S GUILD TO MEET
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'Mad Ripper' Is Captured

CHICAGO — A lean, tousled ex-night watchman was seized as Chicago's "Mad Ripper" last night, police said, shortly after the stealthy stabber knifed his seventh and eighth victims.

Tall Joseph P. Caraher, 39, was captured after a block-long chase by a group of rock-throwing men who drove him into the arms of an off-duty policeman.

The chase began when two men said they saw Caraher stab a 12-year-old girl on the Northwest Side. They roused neighbors and raced after the fleeing attacker.

"Why are they picking on me?" Caraher mumbled as policeman John Keane held him at gunpoint until more law officers arrived.

He cursed his captors as "German spies."

Police said Caraher was drunk and talking incoherently. They reported he was carrying a blood-stained pearl-handled switchknife when seized.

Homicide Detective St. James Traut said Caraher "is definitely the stabber" who slashed eight persons in Chicago since Monday, six of them Friday.

Later four of the knife victims identified Caraher as their assailant.

Sleek Russian Jet Takes Off On Return Trip
McGUIRE AIR FORCE BASE, N.J. — A sleek Russian jet airliner took off early Saturday on the return flight to Moscow.

The powerful two-engine craft was flown by a Russian crew but also carried the three American fliers who assisted the Russians on the last leg of their flight to the United States earlier this week.

It was the first Russian passenger plane ever to land on American soil.

The American fliers aboard the craft were Capt. Harold G. Renegar, 33, of Keller, Tex., pilot; Capt. Boris N. Dubson, 37, of San Francisco, senior navigator; and M. Sgt. Taylor E. Robinson, 33, of Mari
