It's too bad he didn't go through with it. Some of his constituents might have told him to dishant his troops and keep his shirt on—that this presently explosive business of racial integration in our schools is one of those instances in which the sins of the fathers must be visited upon the children.

That suggests two questions:
1. Who were the fathers?
2. What were their sins?

If we are to answer these questions, we must go back some four and a half centuries into history. In 1516 King Charles I of Spain

Child Guidance Clinic Proposal Given Approval

Douglas County took another step Thursday night toward establishment of a clinic to help children in the early stages of mental disturbances.

The clinic is to be promoted by the recently-established Douglas County Child Guidance Advisory Committee. At its third meeting in the county courthouse Thursday, members unanimously approved the idea of instituting a child guidance clinic in the county "in the near future."

Dr. Mary Soules, county health officer, was asked to make the availability of psychiatric help in establishment of a clinic. She will report to the group at the next meeting Oct. 24.

Specialists Available

It has been indicated that psychiatric specialists can be made available on a part-time basis through the State Department of Health. They could direct and coordinate efforts of existing health, welfare, judicial and school agencies. These agencies would then do follow-up work necessary to make the clinic effective.

Speakers at the meeting in Roseburg Thursday were Mrs. Lois Baker, administrator of the Douglas County Welfare Department; Erma Plett, county health nurse; and Dr. Soules.

Speakers indicated a need for such a clinic was strongly felt. They said many children could be returned to normalcy before it is too late. The clinic would handle only children in early stages of mental disturbances and would not try remedying conditions which were already serious.

Six-Acre Grass Fire Put Out

A six acre grass fire at 6 p.m. Thursday near Platt Road east of Sutherlin was caused by children playing with matches, reports the Douglas Forest Protective Assn.

In other fires Thursday, the DFPA said 1½ acres of grass were burned on Roberts Mt. about 2 p.m. and the fire was probably caused by a carelessly discarded cigarette. Two other fires occurred about 5 p.m. One was started by the remains of the Hazel Ball cabin on Lower Ruben Rd., near Glendale, that burned earlier in the week. A small area of grass was burned.

The other fire developed near Curtin and burned half an acre of grass. It was probably caused by sparks from the hotbox of a passing train, according to the DFPA.

Meanwhile, a small fire at 11:30 a.m. Thursday burned brush and grass around the home of C. V. Montgomery, 1509 SE Kane St. The fire was extinguished in five minutes by Roseburg firemen.

Truman Says No Governor Can Defy Federal Laws

KANSAS CITY — "No governor can nullify the federal constitution or the laws passed by Congress and approved by the Supreme Court under it," Harry S. Truman said yesterday.

"When a governor cannot enforce these laws and decisions it is the sworn duty of the President of the United States to enforce them," he added.

The former President made it clear he was referring to racial segregation strife in Arkansas, but he did not name any governor in his statement to a news conference.

Truman said he volunteered the statement because he thought it should be made. He said it took a week to prepare it.

Garden Valley Protest Meet Slated Tonight

Garden Valley parents are up in arms as the result of an announcement by the Roseburg School District board of directors that the Garden Valley School will be closed Monday.

A protest meeting is scheduled tonight at 7:30 at the school to organize opposition to the move, according to correspondent Addie Schneider. Several people said petitions were being outlined to fight the closure.

Supt. M. C. Deller had to attend a Portland meeting today and cannot represent the district at the meeting. Meanwhile, school board members were being contacted by people from Garden Valley so they could attend. It could not immediately be determined who was spearheading the fight movement.

The board made the announcement it was closing the one-classroom school at its Wednesday night meeting so a more favorable adjustment of rooms, teachers and transportation could be effected.

A strong denial was pronounced by mothers of children in Garden Valley that only one child was attending the school from the valley. Mrs. Schneider reported. They said four of the 14 second graders were from the valley. The others are from nearby Riversdale.

Ship's Captain Must Tell Why He Didn't Testify

PORTLAND — The captain of the Norwegian ship Thorshol, which rammed and sank the Army Engineers' dredge Rossell at Coos Bay Tuesday, is to appear in U.S. District Court here Friday afternoon to show cause why he should not testify in a hearing.

Thursday the captain, Mathias Mathiesen, appeared at a Coast Guard board of investigation hearing at Coos Bay, but on advice of counsel, refused to testify.

He questioned the jurisdiction of the Coast Guard over a foreign vessel.

Capt. L. M. Thayer, conducting the inquiry, then adjourned the hearing and asked U.S. Atty. E.C. Luckey at Portland to take over.

Luckey got a court order for the captain of the freighter and for his officers to appear here and to show why they should not be required to testify.

The Coast Guard investigation is intended to determine why the accident occurred. Three crewmen were killed and one is missing and presumed dead.

Shortly after the accident, the freighter's agent, and subsequently its pilot, said the vessel's steering apparatus failed.

Portland's Television Strike Settlement Made

PORTLAND — Settlement in Portland's 10-day-old television strike was reached early Friday.

Pickets, who had been at KOIN-TV, KGW-TV and KPTV, were withdrawn. They represented the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, whose members at the stations struck for higher pay.

William F. Lubersky, attorney for the stations, said settlement had been reached but that any statement would be made by a representative of the federal mediation service.

None of these could be reached immediately.

93 Persons Sign Up For Caravan To Visit Agencies

Ninety-three people from Central Douglas County have been issued invitations to attend the caravan to take them on a tour of child care agencies in the Portland area Saturday.

The tour, first of its kind by the organization, is being staged as a preliminary to the Central Douglas United Fund campaign which starts Oct. 9.

Those taking the trip will leave Roseburg Saturday morning following a no-host breakfast. They will drive north in a caravan.

Actually, three tours are scheduled, each taking a different representative group of the agencies in. One will go via Corvallis where it will visit the Children's Farm Home and then on to Portland to visit the Christie School for Girls and the Waverly Baby Home.

The second will go directly to Portland to see the Volunteers of America Mothers and Childrens Home, Salvation Army White Shield Home, Providence Nursery and Louise Home. The last group will visit the Albertina Kerr Nursery, St. Mary's Home for Boys in Beaverton and St. Rose Industrial School.

Don Reed, campaign chairman of the county drive, said anyone interested can attend merely by calling the United Fund office in Roseburg for reservations.

Hearing Slated Today For Myrtle Creek Man

A hearing to determine whether a Myrtle Creek man should be placed under peace bond because of an alleged threat to commit first degree arson will be held this afternoon in district court.

Cecil M. Landers, 27, has been accused by his wife, Ozell, of threatening to burn the house in which she and her children live. This was done on Sept. 3, she claims.

Landers is being held in the county jail in lieu of \$1,000 bail.

Syria's Chiefs Declare They'll Never Attack

DAMASCUS — Syria's two top military chiefs have returned from urgent conferences in Cairo, where they declared Syria will never attack anyone, including Israel.

Brig. Afif Bizry, leftist army commander, and Lt. Col. Abdel Hamid Serraj, army intelligence chief, came back to Damascus Thursday.

There were no details here on what they talked about on their hurried trip to the Egyptian capital.

No Aggression Planned

Cairo newspapers, however, quoted them as saying Syria will not make any aggressive military move with the arms bought from the Soviet Union.

There were other signs of an easing of Middle East tension over Syria.

Premier Sabri Assal told reporters after another emergency meeting of the cabinet that there was nothing new in the situation and "nothing to be worried about."

The Cairo newspaper Al Akhbar said Serraj firmly denied charges that the Syrian army is controlled by Communists.

Refer To Shipments

Referring to increased U. S. arms shipments to Syria's neighbors, Serraj said: "The imperialists forget that Arab will never kill his Syrian brother."

The United States early this week stepped up the arms deliveries after expressing fears over increasingly close Damascus-Moscow relations and Soviet arms shipments to Syria.

A government spokesman announced Bizry and Serraj had returned from Cairo, where they talked with President Nasser and his Egyptian army commanders.

Highway Litter Barrels Being Wrongly Used

SALEM — State highway commission litter barrels are being used as a free method of getting household garbage collected, W. C. Williams, state highway engineer, said Friday.

Barrels which are used for garbage collection are being removed, he added.

Williams said a motel on the coast has a notice in its cabins that garbage should be placed in the litter barrels along the highway.

Williams said it costs \$20,000 a year to empty the 630 litter barrels along the highways, and that his department has no intention of going into the garbage collecting business.

There are some mysteries involved, too. For instance, Williams said he can't figure out how grass clippings got into one barrel, many miles from any inhabited place.

Dr. Sidney Smith Sworn Into Canadian Position

OTTAWA — Dr. Sidney E. Smith was sworn in Friday as Canada's new foreign secretary. The 60-year-old educator, new to politics, resigned Thursday as president of the University of Toronto.

Beside him as he took the oath of office from Chief Justice Patrick Kerwin was Prime Minister John Diefenbaker, who had held the foreign portfolio since the conservatives' surprise victory over the Liberals last June.

Harold Hickerson Resigns Chamber Secretary Position

Harold J. Hickerson, secretary of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, will resign effective Dec. 31.

T. H. Pargeter, Chamber of Commerce president, reported he has been officially informed by Hickerson that he would not seek reappointment after Jan. 1.

Notification was given at this early date, Pargeter said, to afford time in which to receive and process applications for replacement without the necessity of acting hurriedly.

"For myself, and speaking on behalf of the board of directors, I regret our secretary's decision to retire," the President said. "His fine work is greatly appreciated by all of us who have had the privilege of working with him. Not only is he appreciated for his fine and efficient work, but also because those of us who have worked with him have found him to be a gentleman and friend."

"He has conferred a great favor upon the officers and the board by announcing his retirement at such an early date, thus giving us time to make careful selection of his successor. We also are glad to know that he will be remaining in Roseburg, thus making his knowledge and experience available to us as needed."

Pargeter reports the appointment of Al Flegel, Ray Simms and Fred Solin as a committee to receive and investigate applications for the position. The committee will recommend a successor from among those who apply and the final selection will be made by the board of directors.

Hickerson came to Roseburg to accept the position Jan. 1, 1944. He had been employed previously in North Bend.

Information Workshop Held For 4-H Leaders

Modern methods of keeping the public informed on agricultural and 4-H activities were the subjects of an "Information Workshop" held Thursday in the county extension office of the Douglas County Courthouse, according to Frank von Borstel, 4-H Club extension agent.

The workshop was conducted by Arnold Ebert, information specialist at Oregon State College. Ebert demonstrated the latest styles and methods used in radio reporting, writing circular letters, providing news stories and getting ideas across to the public, said von Borstel.

The meeting was attended by extension agents from five Oregon counties, Coos, Curry, Josephine and Jackson, as well as Douglas.

The workshop was one of a series of conferences now being conducted around the state, reported von Borstel.

Vernon Shadick Held For Probation Violation

Held in the Douglas County jail on a charge of probation violation is Vernon J. Shadick, 22, 1061 Alameda Ave.

Shadick recently was convicted in Roseburg municipal court of vagrancy and was handed a jail sentence. This occurred not long after his release from the county jail where he had served 30 days of a one-year sentence for obtaining money by false pretenses.

Terms of his probation included making full restitution on all worthless checks he had passed. This was to be done within 60 days of his jail release.

Court Order Hits Future Violence

John Kasper Indicted For Inciting Riot; Boycotts Forbidden

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Federal and state authorities struck a triple blow Friday at violence which disrupted the start of public school integration here this week.

The Justice Department announced in Washington it is turning over to local authorities information of "possible significance" gathered by the FBI in the Tuesday dynamiting of half-million dollar Hattie Cotton School.

Another arm of the Justice Department, the U. S. District Court clamped on a broad court order against further violence.

Kasper Indicted

Simultaneously, the Davidson County grand jury indicted integrationist John Kasper on a charge of inciting others to riot. The Kasper indictment was based on statements he had made at various pro-segregation meetings here.

The FBI here gave no further details immediately of its activities in the case.

Criminal Judge Chesler K. Hart of Nashville set Kasper's bond at \$2,500 and an attorney said he would attempt to post it later.

Kasper and nine others were notified officially of a district Federal Court order against interfering with orderly integration of first grade classes.

Forbids Boycott

Besides banning acts intended to keep Negroes out of racially mixed first-grade classes, the order specifically forbids boycotts of the newly integrated grammar schools. Six schools end their first week of integration today, after two days of surface calm.

U.S. Dist. Judge William E. Miller issued the temporary order

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Gov. Faubus Off To See President About Problem

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Gov. Orval E. Faubus took off Friday for a "history-making" conference with President Eisenhower on the aggravated federal-state integration problem at Little Rock.

"I feel very hopeful," Faubus said. "I'm just going to see the President and I can't discuss the conference in advance, but I'm optimistic."

The governor, accompanied by Arnold Sikke, his executive assistant, and Rep. Brooks Hays (D-Ark) left in a small Aero-Commander plane.

Hays said the Eisenhower-Faubus conference "may bring the conclusion of one phase of the problem of not only Little Rock and the South but of the nation."

The reference apparently was to the general problem of race relations.

Hays said also he felt it is important "to avoid any letdowns if we don't come to a solution." He did not elaborate on this point.

Hays probably will join Faubus in at least some of the discussion with Eisenhower.

School Teachers Strike Ruled Illegal By Judge

PAWTUCKET, R. I. — A superior court judge Friday declared illegal a strike of 400 Pawtucket school teachers, now in its eighth day, and said he would issue a temporary restraining order. Judge G. Frederick Frost said he would hand down a written decree Saturday.

In stating his finding orally Friday, Judge Frost said:

"The court is clearly of the opinion and finds that the teachers are an integral part of the government of the city. They are governmental employees and have no legal right to strike against the government which they are now doing."

The strike was called by the Pawtucket Teachers Alliance in a wage dispute. They rejected as too small a pay raise offer by the city school committee. The strike has forced 10,000 public school pupils to remain out of classrooms.

LIFE OF EASE
