

Test Reactor Speakers Listed, Inspection Set

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (AP)—Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) and Atomic Energy Commissioner Harold S. Vance are scheduled to speak at the national reactor testing station near here Oct. 2 and 3 during an industrial preview of an engineering test reactor.

An AEC spokesman said the two-day program will include an inspection of facilities and a symposium on the reactor regarding its design, cost, experimental use and operation.

Some 250 representatives of U.S. industry concerned with building and operating nuclear test and research equipment for civilian and industrial use have been invited to participate.

Members of Congress, the Atomic Energy Commission and newsmen also will be on hand.

Primary facilities for the 14-million-dollar ETR were designed and built by the engineering division of the Henry J. Kaiser Co. and operated by Phillips Petroleum Co.

General Electric Co. designed the reactor itself and the nuclear core and controls.

About two million dollars worth of additional equipment will hike the total cost of the reactor to 16 million dollars.

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Rep. Porter Calls For Resignation Of Summerfield

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Porter (D-Ore.) suggested Thursday the resignation of Postmaster General Summerfield, saying Summerfield's "incompetence goes beyond his misconception of the department he heads."

In a speech prepared for the annual convention of Associated Third Class Mail Users Inc., the Oregon congressman said:

"He (Summerfield) has misrepresented his success in cutting down personnel. He has violated the Urgent Deficiencies Act intentionally and then brazenly and unnecessarily cut off essential mail service. His proposed embargo on third class mail was patently illegal and irresponsible. For every penny he saved, he lost many more for the American taxpayers."

Porter, a member of the House Post Office Committee, referred to Summerfield's actions last April during a row with Congress over his demand for more money to maintain full postal service during the final three months of the fiscal year which ended June 30.

Summerfield briefly cut back some mail service and scheduled a halt in handling of third class mail. But he restored service and called off the planned embargo on third class mail after Congress voted him 41 millions of the 47 million dollars he sought.

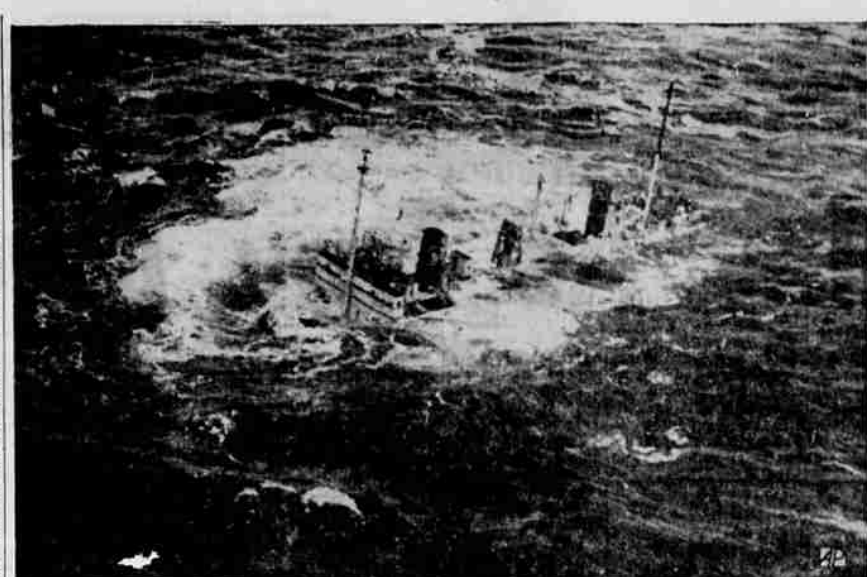
In the course of the fight, some members of Congress contended that Summerfield had broken the law by not making his regular appropriations last over the entire fiscal year. Summerfield said his department encountered bigger-than expected mail volume and other unforeseen expenses.

Asistant Atty. General Appointed For Alaska

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP)—Appointment of Robert Redding, 25, as an assistant Alaska attorney general was announced Thursday.

Redding, native of Portland, and a June graduate of the Willamette University Law School at Salem, arrived here Monday to begin duties as clerk in the attorney general's office pending his admittance to the Oregon Bar.

He will miss oath-taking ceremonies at Portland Saturday, Redding said, but may be able to be sworn in here.

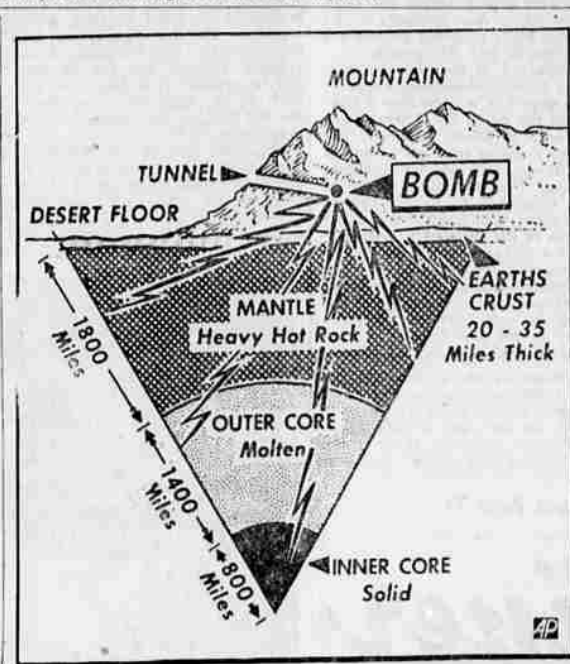
Workers To Offer To Buy Plant Of Georgia-Pacific

BELLINGHAM, Wash. (AP)—Employees at the Georgia-Pacific Corp. plywood plant here said Thursday they will offer to purchase the plant for a minimum of \$300,000 and a percentage of the mill's profits until 1970.

Georgia-Pacific, citing adverse economic conditions as the reason, Wednesday announced plans to shut down the plant about Sept. 20. The company offered to sell the plant to a workers' cooperative for \$1,250,000 and provide 50 million board feet of timber during the next four years.

The workers' cooperative said the purchase plan to be submitted to the corporation would involve a down payment of \$100,000 and payments of \$100,000 at the end of the first and second years, or 40 per cent of the profits for the two years, whichever is greater.

After that, the cooperative would pay Georgia-Pacific 40 per cent of the profits each year for 10 years, up to a maximum full purchase price of \$1,500,000.

Hoffa Requests Senate Hearing Resume At Once

WASHINGTON (AP)—James R. Hoffa today asked the Senate Rackets Committee either to reopen right away its public probe of his labor career or to delay it until after the coming Teamsters Union Convention.

Hoffa, Midwest boss of the giant Teamsters Union, still is the front-running candidate to succeed Dave Beck as Teamsters president at the Sept. 30 Miami convention despite earlier disclosures before the Senate group.

The 44-year old Hoffa has been charged before the committee with accepting money loans from employers and with associating with New York labor racketeer Johnny Dio.

George Fitzgerald, Hoffa's lawyer, wrote to Chairman McClellan (D-Ark.) and other committee members asking that Hoffa either be recalled early next week or not until Oct. 10.

Fitzgerald said Hoffa would be busy constantly with convention business from Sept. 18 to Oct. 10. He noted also that Hoffa must appear in New York Sept. 23 to answer to a wiretapping conspiracy indictment.

State Board Completes Reorganization Of OTI

SALEM (AP)—The state Board of Education Wednesday completed the reorganization of Oregon Technical Institute as directed by the 1957 Legislature.

OTI now is directly responsible to the board. It used to be a part of the vocational education division, which in turn is under the board.

The new status makes the operation and administration of OTI similar to that of the state university and colleges.

RAILROADS HONORED

CHICAGO (AP)—The National Safety Council honored 15 U. S. and Canadian railroads Thursday for outstanding public safety programs.

The railroads include the Canadian Pacific, Milwaukee Road, and the Union Pacific.

The companies received the council's public safety activities award designed to recognize and stimulate community safety work by railroads in the areas they serve.

IWA Calls For New Policy In Seeking Future Contracts

PORTLAND (AP)—The International Woodworkers of America this week called for a policy of industry-wide contracts because a united management succeeds "in splitting our ranks."

"Only a policy of broad unity on our part can offset the employers' dividing tactics," the 100,000-member union said in a resolution adopted at its annual convention here.

Employers now are successful "in splitting our ranks, with early, sub-standard settlements setting the pattern," the union said.

The resolution, submitted by the union's Western Washington district, was passed without debate and sent to the IWA executive board for study.

A call for unity also was issued by a Canadian labor leader, who said labor will "sow the seeds of its own destruction" if it rests on past accomplishments.

Donald MacDonald, secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Labor Congress, said there still are elements in government and industry which are hostile to organized labor.

Earlier, the IWA delegates approved a resolution calling for one union to embrace all employees of industries using wood products.

Still to be acted upon is a resolution that says "hope of the IWA merging with any other unions is getting dimmer and dimmer." It was submitted by Western Canada's District Council No. 1.

Arson Suspected In Fires Near Jacksonville

JACKSONVILLE, Ore. (AP)—Arson is suspected in a number of recent fires in this area, Police Chief Frank Carter said Thursday.

He said an investigation has started of three fires that broke out within 50 feet of each other about 3 a. m. Monday. The fires were in fields along a highway. They were controlled quickly by the fire department.

Carter said investigators will attempt to learn whether there was any connection with three other fires that broke out last week, one of them burning over 14 acres at Jacksonville.
