

Fishing, Hunting Successes Taper Off In Douglas Area

Hunters and fishermen in the Douglas County can expect only fair to good success this weekend due to the fact the forests are closed in some parts and the fishing is almost at an end.

Pigeon hunting in Western Douglas County will only be fair to poor this weekend. The birds are thinning out, and no promise of improvement is in sight. This also applies to the rest of the county. Grouse and mountain quail hunting should be improved over last year with the Elkton Steamboat and Tiller areas all showing good increases. The portion of the county lying along the Coast Range has been closed to entry because of the extreme fire danger.

Summer steelhead angling in the North Umpqua has only

been fair to good this past week, with no better forecasts in store this weekend. The salmon angling at Winchester Bay can be considered nearly completed as most of the salmon are now in the tidewater areas of the lower Umpqua River. The salmon fishing on the lower Rogue River has been only fair to good the past few days, but is beginning to improve and could be good over the weekend.

For those who like catfish and bullfrog angling, Tenmile Lake is the best bet. Fishing here has been good and has been increasing in popularity during the past few weeks.

Trout fishing is improving in the middle and upper sections of the Rogue River and promises to be good at Lemolo and Toketee reservoirs.

King Football Takes Over Tonight At Finlay As Troy Meets Indians

The 1957 football season gets off with a bang tonight at Finlay Field when the Roseburg High School Indians tangle with the Douglas Trojans in the first game of the season for both teams, starting at 8:15 p.m.

Tonight's action will mark the first time in several years that Roseburg has played a team from Douglas county and will also be the first time in several years that Douglas has played an A-1 high school.

Coach Brad Ecklund of Roseburg has been putting his team through tough drills all week in preparation for this game, in hopes of coming up with a win in his first try at Roseburg.

For coach Bob Williams at Douglas it will be a case of trying to cut a bigger school down to size through hustle and fight.

Turnout Bigger

Turnouts the first week of practice saw Roseburg more than double the turnout at Douglas with a total of 75 players against the 35 at Douglas. Included in this amount for Roseburg was a total of seven lettermen, while Douglas counts 10 lettermen in its total. Of the 10 Douglas lettermen, three lettered two years ago and did not play last season.

The backfields for both teams are more evenly balanced. Roseburg will only have 7-pound advantage. The average for the Roseburg backs is 153 pounds, while the Douglas average is 151 pounds. Ecklund has been pounding into

New Knothole Club Set To See First Tilt Here

An added treat is in store for the younger group Friday night at the Roseburg - Douglas football game.

Athletic Director of District 4, Lorne (Dutch) Simons, has come up with a plan called the Knothole Club. Any student in the junior highs or grade schools are eligible to join this group.

Members of the club can present their membership cards at the gate and will receive a ticket to the game for a total price of only 10 cents. This also entitles them to free ice cream at halftime, donated by Umpqua Dairy. The admission ticket to the game will be torn in half at the gate, with half of the ticket given to the Knothole. This half of the ticket assures the holder of the free ice cream.

Special seating is also being arranged for the members of the club on each side of the field, next to the grandstands.

Two Offenses

The game will feature two different types of offense, with the Roseburg team working on multiple type split T formation and Douglas running an unbalanced T formation.

Both ball clubs use the same type of defense in a five and six man line, with the edge going to the team that hits a little harder and hustles a little more.

One of the weak spots on the Roseburg team at the present time could be at the ends. The lack of veterans at these positions has proved to be hard to cope with.

One of the top candidates for that position, Bill Barrong, has a dropped football for the season, and a replacement has not yet been found, although Greg Stevens and Eugene Endicott have been progressing well.

The right side of the Roseburg line appears to be the heaviest at this time, with 210-pound Brent Long at the tackle and 200-pound Lee Gaylor at the guard being the heaviest men in the starting lineup. Left tackle C. B. Simons is the

big man in the other side of the line at 190 pounds. Center Mike Vasey will hold down the middle of the line with his 185 pounds.

Vasey, at 185 pounds, matches the heaviest man on the Douglas team in tackle Neal Goltger.

Starting backfields for both teams are the most evenly balanced, although Roseburg will have two of the smallest players in the game in their backfield.

Smallest Man

Starting Roseburg quarterback Bob Steele is the smallest player on the field at the start at 140 pounds. Left half Bill White of Roseburg tips the scales at only 142 pounds. On the other hand the Indians also have two of the biggest backs in 180-pound right half, Dave Bradley, and 170-pound fullback, Russ Pinard.

The smallest Douglas player on the field will be starting fullback Roy Miller who weighs in at 143 pounds. Terry Counts, starting left half, weighs only 148 pounds, so each team has a couple of real small guys. The heaviest man in the backfield for Douglas is quarterback Walt Schroeder, who tips the scales at 160 pounds. Phil Hill at 155 pounds in the right half spot

completes the starting Trojan backfield.

Roseburg will suit up a total of 37 players for the opening game, while Douglas will go along with a total of only 28 players.

Both coaches are planning to play as many players as possible during the game in order to give all the players a chance for some much needed experience.

The old Eugene High School, now to be known as South Eugene with a new high school in that city, will travel to Beaverton, which is reported to have a strong team but has several players down with influenza.

Medford, runnerup to Marshfield last season, will go to North Salem. Another interesting contest has Grants Pass at Albany.

None of the Portland league teams play.

Most of the Friday games will be non-conference affairs. But a few will count.

In district 8 Corvallis will be at Sweet Home and South Salem at Prineville.

Some other feature games:

Astoria at Tillamook; Washougal, Wash., at David Douglas of Portland; Gresham at Fort

Vancouver; Hillsboro at Forest Grove; Milwaukie at Oregon City, and Parkrose at Oswego.

Hood River will play at Tigard; West Linn at Estacada; Dallas at McMinnville; Newberg at Sandy; St. Helens at Scappoose.

Dillard at Roseburg; Cottage Grove at Junction City; North Bend at Reedsport; Willamette at Eugene at Springfield.

Baker at Enterprise; Redmond at Hermiston; Union at La Grande; Milton-Freewater at St. Patrick's of Walla Walla; Pendleton at Kennewick; WyEast at The Dalles; Madras at Bend, and Newport at Lebanon.

Local high school footballmen are rightfully enough gratified with the largest Roseburg High turnout in years; and doubly so in that the roster is not depleted each practice day.

As Coach Brad Ecklund ably put it before the Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce early this week: "We have as many boys as we have suits." Which suits everybody fine.

We didn't sit in on Ecklund's discourse before the chambermen. But Jaycee Dr. Verne Anderson adequately filled us in after the meeting.

For the first time the Roseburg coach made public estimates on the season's outlook, regarding Grants Pass as a "power" in Southern Oregon this year and on the Roseburg schedule. He said, in effect, that the locals would hold their own with the "big teams," they face and that the team has a good chance in the "big games." He was referring to such rivals as Marshfield, Grants Pass, and Eugene.

HE SAID he was happy with the athletic setup here and that the Roseburg athletic department is now second to only two others (unnamed) in the state, who have been organized for years.

Ecklund's plans during the current season, he said, are to try to work as many sophomores as possible into the games, but that all hands regardless of school year would get to play, based on their performances.

A firm exponent of split-T football, Brad explained that the system is also being taught this season in both Roseburg junior high schools, as well as to the high school teams. The grade school program, he observed, is not concentrating on any one tactical phase of the game.

This brings us up to date, which means the opening whistle tonight when the Indians meet their first opponent, neighboring Douglas High. The rest of the schedule includes eight A-1 opponents, including five league games.

THE SUMMARY below reveals that while Roseburg's turnout this year was the largest in years and highly creditable, it's still in the building stage compared to the turnout at rival schools. Below is a school-by-school account of 1957 rivals with the 1956 record given where available and a few other key details.

DOUGLAS: (6-1); six lettermen in turnout of 31; Coach Bob Williams in second season. District 6-A-2. Home game.

ASHLAND: (1-7); 10 lettermen in turnout of 55; Coach Al Simpson in fourth season. District 6-A-1. Road game. 1956: Roseburg, 42-0.

GRANTS PASS: (6-3); nine lettermen in turnout of 46 (smallest original turnout in years, but more expected); veteran coach is Mel Ingram. District 6-A-1. Home game. 1956: Grants Pass, 35-14.

SOUTH EUGENE: (6-2); 11 lettermen (eight backs, three linemen) in 120 turnout; veteran coach is Lloyd Amick. District 5-A-1. Home game. 1956: Eugene, 12-0.

SPRINGFIELD: (5-3); 14 lettermen. Hal Whitbeck coaching second season; District 5-A-1. Road game. 1956: Springfield, 6-0.

NORTH BEND: (4-5); 12 lettermen in biggest turnout in years—106. New coach is Cliff Saxton. District 5-A-1. Road game. NB, 20-19.

CRESCENT CITY: (4-5); six lettermen in turnout of 80. Tex Gattin coaching fourth season. California Interscholastic Conference—school of 1,050 enrollment. Home game. 1956: No game.

MARSHFIELD: (11-0); 22 lettermen in 150 turnout; Coach Pete Susick; Road game. District 5-A-1. 1956: Marshfield, 32-7.

COTTAGE GROVE: (0-5); 10 lettermen in 60 turnout; Coach Sam Bell; Home game. District 5-A-1. 1956: No game.

The general consensus has it that Marshfield, despite not reaching full potential with its present crop of athletes until the 1958 season, is still the heavy favorite to repeat District 5-A-1 title, but in a close race. New North Eugene High will join the league in football in 1959 and other sports in 1958-59 school year. They play sophomore and jaycee schedules in intervening years.

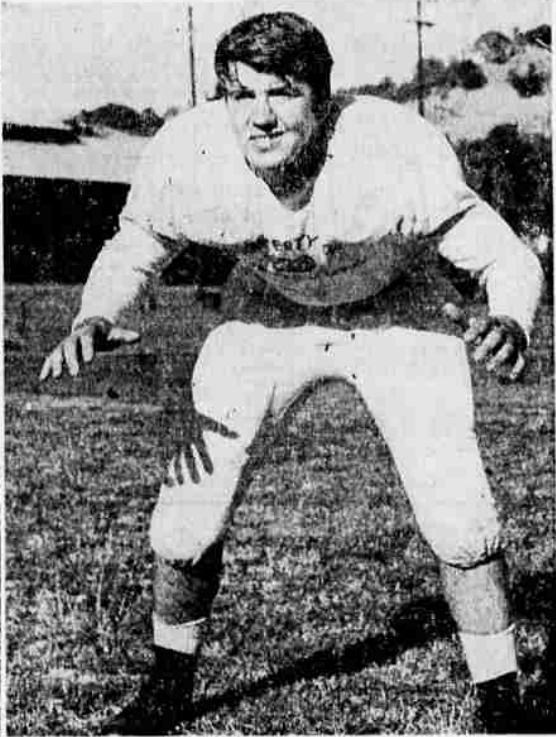
