After 12 months of living with "choke up" taunts, Milwaukee's Braves have proved their stuff, for the moment at least, against their chief tormentors — Brooklyn's de-throned Dodgers.

The Braves never looked more like champions than last night. Held to only four hits by rookie Danny McDevitt, they paired 'em with walks and beat the Brooks 2-1 on Del Crandall's pinch single in the ninth.

With second-place St. Louis idle, the Braves padded their National League lead for the first time in nine days, gaining a five-game bulge with 15 to play and reducing their pennant-clinching magic number to 11.

Any combination of Braves' victories and St. Louis defeats totaling 11 starts the beer flowing in Milwaukee.

Scrap To Be Settled
The American League should settle its pennant scrap in the next 24 hours in a two-game showdown between the New York Yankees and Chicago's second-place White Sox opening at Yankee Stadium today.

The Sox, who whipped Boston 7-1 yesterday while the Yankees were idle, are five games behind with 16 left (two more than the Yankees have).

Only one other game was played in the majors, with Detroit defeating Washington 8-5.

The Braves, who had lost five of eight, had to scrap all the way against McDevitt, 24. They collected eight walks, but managed hits in the fourth and ninth — scoring in each frame.

The Dodgers scored in the second-offender in the fourth with a single and two walks that loaded the bases.

Bob Trowbridge relieved and got out of the jam through a double play.

Free 300-Acre Site Near LA Offered Bums

ONTARIO, Calif. — The Brooklyn Dodgers have been invited to settle down near U.S. Southern California city and have been offered a 300-acre site for free to settle on.

The site is about 40 miles east of Los Angeles.

Ontario real estate broker Charles R. Latimer told The Associated Press Thursday that he has wired the offer to Dodgers President Walter O'Malley on behalf of Donald F. Duncan, chairman of the board of the Duncan Parking Meter Co. of Chicago.

Latimer said Duncan is an ardent Brooklyn fan who would like to see the Dodgers move West.

Ecklund And Simons Urge Strong Community Support

"It's up to them — but it's also up to you." That was the charge given the community Thursday at the weekly meeting of the Roseburg Rotary Club by new football coach Brad Ecklund.

Both the football team and the community will get their first tests of the year at Finlay Field. The Roseburg Indians joined with the Douglas High Trojans in the initial assignments for both.

Ecklund indicated the team and community are interdependent. He said the team would "put out a little more effort" if the grandstands are filled. At the same time, he said, "you fill those stands and I promise you'll see things you've never seen."

About this year's future, Ecklund said merely: "With a few breaks, I'm sure we'll make you proud of us."

The new coach also outlined the method he has been using to whip his team into shape. He said primary emphasis so far has been on conditioning and offense. He said such things as defense and kicking have been soft pedaled so far.

Athletic Director Lorne (Dutch) Simons joined Ecklund on the bill in calling for community support. "If you want a good program, you're going to have to support it," he said. "Don't underestimate your presence at football games."

Chairman of the school board Harold Hoyt got in his licks in support of the new emphasis on athletics being stressed in the Roseburg district. He said "athletics teaches Americanism" indicating that the competitive spirit is fostered. "Athletics is the place where you can get there by putting out," he concluded.

Seattle, in its final home game of the year, played the perfect host Thursday night, passing Hol-

Last place Portland, a cousin for everybody almost all season, exercised its newly found muscles again Thursday night and beat Vancouver 8-4. That just about knocked the Mounties out of any hopes for the Pacific Coast League pennant.

Falls To Angels
Leading San Francisco fell to Los Angeles 3-2 in 10 innings to remain three games ahead of Vancouver. With four games remain-

ing any combination of Seal victories or Mountie losses totaling two will cinch the PCL flag for San Francisco. Incidentally, Steve Bilko of Los Angeles, did not homer and still is four short of the PCL record of 60.

Sacramento beat San Diego 6-3, keeping the Padres from pulling away from their fourth-place dead-lock with Seattle.

Paul Pettit drove in 10 runs for Hollywood, hitting a two-run home run and a grand-slammer as well as two singles. Not bad for a guy who was signed a few years ago as a \$100,000 pitcher. The roof fell in the fifth inning when the Stars scored 11 runs. Seattle finally ran out of pitchers in the sixth inning and threw shortstop Lyle Luttrell at the Stars as an emergency hurler. He allowed only four more runs.

Portland had little trouble disposing of Vancouver. The Beavers drove out starting pitcher George Bamberger with a three-run blast in the third inning. The Mounties managed only four hits off two Portland pitchers, one Owen Friend's two-run homer, his 21st of the year.

This effort by Portland, which all but decided the Pacific Coast League pennant, leaves four games to be played.

Hollywood comes to Portland for the final series opening on Friday the 13th.

Portland's final victory over Vancouver was one of its best hitting efforts. Bob Borkowski hit a home run. Casey Wise had three singles in five times up. Ed Wineciak got four hits and three runs batted in, and Luis Marquez, who has been scheduled to play every position on the field some time in Friday night's game, got four hits also, including a double and a triple.
