Poling, Dean of Men at Oregon State College, was the guest speaker on "OSC, the present and future," at the first fall meeting of the Roseburg Unit, Oregon State College Mothers Club, Monday evening at the attractive home of Mrs. Maurice J. Newland in Laurelwood with officers, Mrs. Ivan Pickens, vice president; Mrs. John Ferguson, president; Mrs. E. S. The faculty and staff members include about 1700. There are 6 members of the OSC staff now teaching at Oregon State University, Bangkok, Thailand. He said there was an enrollment of 150 foreign students at present who are the "cream of the crop" of their respective countries and that American boys and girls are "missing in action" they fail to cultivate these students. He reported that OSC is launching a program whereby 54 outstanding science teachers from high schools throughout various states will be enrolled in 9 new courses training them for college and university teaching positions.
