TRIBEMEN WHO GRIZZLIES

After dominating play for most of the three quarters of the game, Roseburg's Indians relented and gave up a fourth period touchdown to their rivals in taking a 14-7 non-league football decision over Ashland on the losers' field Friday night.

It was the Indians' second straight success of the new season in non-league warfare. Next week they tangle with Grants Pass. Roseburg put together a yardage-making running attack throughout much of the contest, but it was a perfectly-executed long aerial, in their only passing attempt of the night, that broke the scoring ice late in the second period.

The locals' second and game-deciding touchdown came early in the third period on a three-yard drive over guard by 160-pound half-back Jerry Humphries. Brent Long booted both conversions.

Grizzlies Score Late

Roseburg gave up seven points to the home club with 2:40 remaining in the contest when a 58-yard ground drive was capped by a 20-yard end sweep by 171-pound full-back Jerry Stubblefield on a pitch-out play.

The winners appeared to be in complete control of the contest with a 14-0 lead early in the fourth quarter. They were parked on the Grizzly 22-yard line with first down. But three near-identical line thrusts by quarterback J.P. Steele netted only 12 feet and it was fourth and six when an 18-yard field goal attempt by Long fell short and to the right of the goal posts.

Ashland got brief life from this, being forced to punt. But the next time the Grizzlies got the ball they got rolling for the first time in the evening to score.

Ashland's scoring situation was set up like this: Following the missed field goal attempt by Roseburg, the Grizzlies took over on their 20 and marched out seven yards before punting. The Indians got the punt and right off to score. Stubblefield added the conversion.

The Indians had to reject one more Ashland threat in the final 2:40 of the contest. They took the onside kickoff, grounded by guard Ray Nolte on the Indian 46. Two plays later, Steele led the piskin on the Roseburg 42 and made tackle Mike Kearns retrieved for Ashland with 1:10 left.

Nolte Brilliant

But the losers could not cash in. The much-used and successful pitchout play on the first play from the 42 backfired, Simpson's pitch went astray, bouncing between two Ashland backs running wide to the right. Nolte, who performed brightly throughout, nailed the ball on the bounce and the Roseburg line was able to tackle Mike Kearns retrieved for Ashland with 1:10 left.

The clock showed 30 seconds at this point and Ashland could get the ball back. Neither could the Indians score, as they were content to settle for three short line plays and an unnecessary roughness penalty which didn't help the cause. The game ended with Roseburg on the Ashland 20.

In the first quarter, the teams fought to a standoff, through a series of penalties, fumbles and punts. Neither team crossed midfield until the Grizzlies got to the Indian 47 two minutes before the first period ended.

Roseburg got past the midfield stripe in the opening minute of the second chapter, but finally gave the ball up on a fumble on

the Ashland 37. The Indians held for downs again, though, and after Steele had run back the ensuing punt to the Ashland 47, they took charge of the contest.

Most of the play was in Ashland territory then.

Punt Returned

Halfback Bill White returned a Grizzly punt 12 yards down the middle to the Grizzly 28 and on the first play, with 35 seconds left in the first half, Steele uncorked a perfect pass, diagonally to the left side of the playing field which 62 left end Eugene Endicott took on the run at the goal line to score.

Steele's pass had to be good and it was, for defender Al South had Endicott tailed all the way. Roseburg scored again the first time the ball in the hand period, Center Mike Vasey ran the onside kickoff back seven yards to the Ashland 47 and was hurt on the play. He limped off the field and was replaced by Loren Olson.

Humphries gained seven yards at left tackle on the first play of a 47-yard, eight-play TD drive. Humphries and fullback Russ Pinar got 11 and four yards respectively. Steele went seven on a keep to the 18. Pinar got one at the middle. Humphries added 11 on a hard tackle on at right end, White jabbed for three at guard and Humphries smacked center for the final three.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Venerable Archie Moore of the 1926 vintage swinks when he says he'll fight for another 10 years, but young Tony Anthony won't say it isn't possible.

Ole Arch, who started fighting 21 years ago and may be 41 or more by the time he retires, named the 22-year-old Anthony without mercy last night to score a seventh round knockout and preserve his light-heavyweight title.

The champ reigned supreme in the ring at the Olympic Auditorium in Los Angeles, after a boxing lesson and again after the fight as he met newsmen in the confines of his dressing room.

Taking first things first, the champ says he would like to tangle with French-Canadian Yvon Duroule in a title fight for a pound crown which he thinks will add Uncle Sam's relations with Canada.

Berates Durella
Anthony, on the other hand, battled a time with Yvon and doesn't give the Canadian a chance. Then Archie said he believes he might be of help to fat people, and probably could write a book on weight control.
