Suddenly the rescue ship—the American steamer—Saxon—appeared.

"We jumped up and started signaling," we knew a lifeboat had been launched. Surprisingly, we found our strength and jumped into the water and grabbed lifeboats and lifelines thrown to us."

Hoffa Involved In Big Real Estate Venture In Florida

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate investigators heard testimony Saturday that James R. Hoffa used Teamsters Union funds in a Florida real estate venture in the face of his lawyer's advice that "the law would condemn" the practice.

Robert F. Kennedy, counsel to the Senate rackets committee, said the project offered Hoffa and Detroit real estate man Henry Lowrey, a Hoffa associate, a chance to make "a tremendous killing." He said the risk was borne by the union and by low buyers.

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division, registering the purchase in the name of his New York lawyer, Noah Braunstein.

But Bellino said Hoffa, who previously invoked the Fifth Amendment when asked about his relations with Hoffa, apparently made no further payments. Krich said he believed Hoffa still owns the property.

The real estate project, called Sun Valley, was started late in 1954 and was directed by Lower.

Received \$80,534

Bellino testified that between Jan. 1, 1955, and June 30, 1956, Lower received \$80,534 in salary, expenses and loans from the Teamsters while running the real estate development.

In addition, he said, Hoffa arranged with a Detroit bank that the Teamsters account for \$75,000 in loans for the Sun Valley operation.

Testimony about the project was developed as the committee drove toward the windup of its current round of hearings on the activities of Hoffa, Midwest boss of the giant Teamsters Union and leading candidate to succeed Dave Beck as president.

Krich said that at first he was taken in by Lower's glowing description of the Florida development and sold 466 lots in the project to friends and in-laws as well as Teamsters members.

Krich said part of the sales pitch which he and others used in approaching Teamster Union members was to mention that Hoffa was interested in Sun Valley.

Tells Of Death

Krich also told the committee an alias Michigan dealer, Wilfred I. Love, died during a Hoffa-backed strike of his Detroit establishment after being told by Lower that "they'd wheel him out in a casket."

The committee placed in evidence a letter from Love to Hoffa.

Stevenson Backs Integration In Public Address

CHAPLAIN, N. C. (AP) — A plea for public school education which will prepare children to join in the making of great decisions was made here today by Adlai E. Stevenson.

Such training will require increased factual knowledge and emphasis on the importance of independent thinking, the Democratic party leader declared.

His speech was prepared for delivery at an education rally sponsored by the North Carolina Citizens' Committee for Better Schools, a group named by Gov. Luther Hodges to arouse grassroots school support.

Stevenson named public education's "two most immediate issues" as those of "integration and of federal aid to education."

"Of the matter of integration in the schools I say only — lest my silence be misunderstood — that if I thought it in my power here today to advance by anything I could say or do the solution of this problem I could speak of nothing else," he said.

One of the educational purposes, said the former Illinois governor, must be to teach children to adjust to life in the world in which they live. He described this as "a world where, among other things, the vast majority who are poor, the vast majority whose skins are dark, the vast majority who are uneducated, now are demanding their birthrights as children equal in the sight of God."

dence a sworn statement from Omar P. Hewitt, vice president of Florida National Bank in Orlando, which Kennedy described as "of particular significance."

Hewitt's statement said that: 1. Lower had described Hoffa and himself to the bank as Sun Valley's "principal owners," but stressed that Hoffa's interest could not be made public, although this restriction later was removed.

2. The bank had loaned \$500,000 to Sun Valley, guaranteed only by notes, after receiving an assurance that Hoffa would keep deposits of funds from Teamsters Local 299 on deposit at the bank at all times in amounts equaling or exceeding the amount of the loans. The affidavit said this was done.

That Sun Valley still owes it \$349,999.99 and that the Teamsters bank balance at Orlando is \$400,000.

Krich said lots in the project were sold to Teamsters at prices ranging from \$150 to \$350 each, with assurances that paved streets were being built in the subdivision near Orlando.

Actually, he said, the only paving installed or planned was around some model houses for sale to the most affluent of the Teamsters. He said the subdivision had no water facilities. He termed it "useless" property.

Former Soviet Officer Claims He Was Poisoned

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) — Nikolai Khokhlov, former Soviet secret police officer who charged he was poisoned by Russian agents, has been transferred to a U.S. Army hospital.

The commanding officer of the hospital said Saturday Khokhlov is "still critically sick," but declined to make any comment on the report that he was poisoned.

"All we know is he is a very sick man and we're trying to find out what is wrong with him," the hospital official said.

The diagnosis includes tests to check on the poison theory but these will not be completed before Monday at the earliest, he added.

Assassination Mission

Khokhlov, 34, defected to the West in Frankfurt in 1954. He said then he had been sent there on an assassination mission. He became ill Sept. 15 while in Frankfurt attending a conference sponsored by the anti-Soviet newspaper—Possev.

He came here from the United States to attend meetings of the National Alliance of Russian Solidarists (NARS), an anti-Soviet organization of Russians. The NARS said Khokhlov had been poisoned and that the attempt on his life "was made at the instigation of and sponsored by Soviet state security organs."

West German police are conducting an investigation into the case. Khokhlov, who has lived in the United States most of the time since his defection, has taken out first American citizenship papers. He traveled here on documents issued by the State Department in lieu of a passport.

His transfer to the U.S. Army hospital was arranged through the U.S. consul in Frankfurt. Consul spokesmen said Khokhlov is entitled to protection by the United States and on that basis the Army was requested to admit him to the hospital.

President To End Vacation Tuesday

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP) — President Eisenhower will end his Rhode Island vacation Monday or Tuesday and return to Washington.

Announcing this Saturday, White House press secretary James C. Hagerty said return Monday now appears more likely.

The president himself indicated that about the same time in telling a golf partner:

"I may go home Monday afternoon, but it will depend on what Mrs. Ike wants to do."

Meanwhile, Hagerty said in reply to a news conference question there as nothing to a report that Mrs. Eisenhower's recovery from Aug. 6 surgery has been slowed by what a newsman termed "some kind of bad reaction to the anesthesia."

Asked whether the first lady's recovery had been impeded by anything the press secretary replied:

"Not that I know of."

The Eisenhower family came to Newport Sept. 4. The president has made quick trips back to Washington for business reasons.

He has arranged a Washington conference Tuesday with a committee of five Southern governors who are seeking withdrawal of federal troops from school integration at Little Rock, Ark.

Newsman Woman Said Missing In Illinois

JOLIET, Ill. (AP) — The disappearance of a woman newspaper executive remained a mystery today. Police said they still considered the case as a missing person despite reports of screams the night she vanished.

"This is a mystery of everybody," Capt. John Dillon of the Joliet Police Department said regarding the disappearance Wednesday of Miss Amelia J. Zelko, 47.

Miss Zelko, also known as Molly was a stockholder, business manager and secretary — treasurer of the weekly Joliet Spectator, a tabloid. She also was the writer of several articles against pinball machines and gambling in Will County.

WINDS DELAY SHIPS

GANDER, Nfld. (AP) — Transatlantic airliners from Europe were running nearly two hours later Saturday because of heavy headwinds, apparently from Hurricane Frieda.

Ramond F. Clark Ordered To Appear At Maloney Trial

PORTLAND (AP) — Raymond F. Clark, who refused to testify Friday, has been ordered to appear again Monday at a hearing preliminary to the trial of a former Seattle and Spokane race track clerk.

Circuit Judge Martin Hawkins ordered Clark to return when defense attorneys resume arguments on whether the state should be allowed to introduce tape recordings into the trial of Thomas E. Maloney.

There still was no indication when Maloney's trial proper will begin. He is charged with conspiracy to accept a bribe.

Defense attorneys began arguing last Monday over whether the tapes should be admitted at the trial, one of a number springing from Portland's long vice investigation.

Subpoenaed Two Dozen

The attorneys have subpoenaed more than two dozen persons. A number of them still have not testified.

Clark was the major witness called to the stand Friday. But he declined to testify on the ground that he might tend to incriminate himself.

Defense attorney Howard Longan asked Clark questions about the tape recordings. Earlier, witnesses made under the direction of racketeer Big Jim Elkins, former boss.

Elkins and Clark both have been convicted in federal court of wiretapping.

Other witnesses also said earlier in the hearing that some tape recordings were obtained by planting a microphone in Maloney's apartment here.

Maloney once was an investigator for William Langley, ousted district attorney.

Turkey Voices Concern Over Syrian Buildup

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Voicing concern over the buildup of Communist-supplied arms in Syria, Turkey told the United Nations last night she is duty bound to protect the security of her southern flank.

Turkish Ambassador Seyfullah Esin told the 82-nation General Assembly his government considers Syrian independence vital to Turkey's safety.

"That is the reason why the recent events in that country are being followed by my government with attention and concern from the viewpoint of our own security," Esin said.

He accused the Soviet Union of waging a campaign of "false rumors" aimed at torpedoing Turkish-Syrian relations even as Communist arms were being sent to Syria.

Russia recently accused Turkey of massing troops along Syria's border. The charge was leveled after Turkey had conducted troop maneuvers near her southern frontier.

Copco's Klamath Project Okayed

WASHINGTON (AP) — California Oregon Power Co.'s \$12 million dollar development program on the Klamath River in Oregon, which it sought an amended license, holds Federal Power Commission approval.

The license as asked in part by the company was authorized Friday.

The projects, known as the Big Bend development, puts into one an earlier proposed two-part program.

In 1954 the FPC approved a license for one of the projects, but the company had not been working on an amendment to the license.

The newly authorized project calls for a diversion dam at the original Big Bend No. 1 site and a powerhouse with two 40,000-kilowatt generators at the original Big Bend No. 2 powerhouse site.

The company also asked that other proposed and existing facilities on the Klamath and Link rivers be included as part of the project but the commission took no action on that.

The amended license runs for 50 years from March 1, 1956.
