

Record Total Of Tourists Sees Oregon

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon had a record high total of 1,140,000 tourists this year.

But the Travel Information Division of the state Highway Department says the visitors spent less than those the year before. Tourist spending was placed at \$30 million dollars, compared with \$41 million the year before.

The division says that motels drew half of this year's visitors, a drop of 4 per cent from the previous year. Campers increased by 2 per cent.

Gasoline tax revenues increased from less than \$2,500,000 in 1956 to \$2,750,000 in 1957.

The division plans to do some heavy advertising in California for next year, since about half of Oregon's visitors come from that state.

William Tugman of Reedsport is chairman of the committee, and News-Review Editor Charles V. Stanton is a member.

Meanwhile a state committee has been named to plan attractions designed to bring visitors to Oregon's 1959 Centennial Exposition and Trade Fair.

The nine-member committee will meet for the first time in Salem Oct. 11.

Chairman Anthony Brandt, thaler of the centennial commission said he believes that an additional 600,000 cars from out of state can be brought to the state in 1959. That would mean 60 million dollars more in tourist revenue, he said.

Two Fires Extinguished By Roseburg Fire Dept.

The Roseburg Fire Dept. answered two alarms over the weekend but no damage was reported in either fire.

Umpqua River Listed For Study For Pollutants

The Umpqua River is one of nine Oregon estuaries to be studied this year by Oregon State College for "flushing," or rate of drainage of water pollutants.

Study of the estuaries will be made under a \$10,000 grant from the office of naval research, the fourth such research grant received by OSC for an extensive study of Oregon's ocean geography.

The study, under the direction of William B. McAlister, is expected to produce information of interest to various industries, fishermen, sports groups, engineers, cities, state and federal agencies. Data will be provided on the rate of removal of pollutants that drain into the rivers and then into the sea along Oregon's coast. Also provided will be information on the oxygen content of the water, inlets, water temperature and salinity of the state's coastal waters.

Some rivers "flush beautifully" in the middle of the winter, it is explained, but drainage almost stops in the summer when water gets low. Oregon's runoff tends to be highly seasonal compared to some eastern U.S. areas, according to Dr. Wayne V. Burt, who is in charge of the research.

Estuaries besides the Umpqua to be studied include the Columbia, Alsea, Siuslaw and Nahalem rivers, and the Coos Bay, Tillamook, Netarts and Newport inlets.

Defer Little Rock Visit, Churchmen Tell Billy Graham

NEW YORK (AP)—Billy Graham says Little Rock church leaders have advised him not to visit the Arkansas city until "the heated tension is past."

The advice came in a telegram. It was in response to a statement by the evangelist that he would be willing to visit Little Rock if church leaders thought his appearance would help lessen racial tension there.

The telegram, as released Sunday night by Graham's New York headquarters, said in part: "We appreciate your concern for our Little Rock people in this crisis and your offer to come to our assistance. After prayerful consideration it is our conviction that you can be of more help to us when the heated tension is past."

The 10 church leaders replying included U.S. Rep. Brooks Hays (D-Ark.), president of the Southern Baptist Convention. The telegram, received Thursday, added: "We eagerly anticipate your visit for the evangelistic campaign at a later date in accordance with previous plans. Your coming will help heal the wounds and restore Christian unity to our community."

the direction his efforts are taking to find available capital.

To aid the housing market, Porter said he has introduced a bill in Congress to release some of the Railroad Retirement Fund into a direct loan program, with the principal and interest to be paid back into the fund. It would make more than a billion dollars available for borrowing by home buyers.

His predecessor in office, Harris Ellsworth of Roseburg, came in for some criticism from Porter, who said that if Ellsworth had been re-elected last November, there would have been no public housing bill authorized in Congress this year.

Ellsworth's Ouster Lauded

He said Ellsworth was in a position to have tied up any such legislation. "What we did get (in the bill) was the result of my predecessor not returning to Congress," he claimed.

A specific proposal for more processing of the Southern Oregon lumber product was termed by Porter as "pre-prefabrication." He explained that an Indiana firm he visited last spring had sold 60,000 pre-built houses in a 500-mile radius of the factory.

Although there probably isn't a population enough in Oregon to support such an assembly line enterprise, Porter stated that mill men here "should be thinking about" cutting lumber to predetermined dimensions for sale to California, a market which he said is ripe for a similar manufacturer.

After viewing the Indiana manufacturing plant, Porter said he'd "never be able to see carpenters again" building houses individually "without thinking I am watching a primitive process." The "prefabs" are carefully designed and soundly constructed, he said.

Meeting At Coos Bay

The development of Oregon into a maritime state is a subject which will be taken up in Coos Bay next month.

Porter said he and Sens. Richard L. Neuberger and Wayne L. Morse will meet with union manufacturers from several points along the coast.

The importance of that development was illustrated the past few months at Florence, where the difference between bargaining (which was done to California points) and rail shipment of lumber kept mills in western Lane County in business.

The lumber was moving by water to as far away as Hawaii, and Porter said trans-oceanic large shipments of lumber is possible.

That would mean that major shipping from shallow-draft ports like the Siuslaw and Umpqua is possible.

And he pointed out that "there's a huge foreign market waiting in Red China and South America." Later, he said privately that he believes trade ties with red China should be reinstated by the United States. The congressman said that could be done without recognition of the Red Chinese government.

It would mean, according to Porter, that American shippers could trade directly in the Orient. Now, he said, American products are sold behind the Bamboo Curtain by other foreign nations with which the U.S. has maintained trade relations.

Relationships Scored

Early in his talk, Porter pounced on the U.S. State Department for its relationships with the Dominican Republic and other Latin American dictatorships.

He said he has received much mail from South American leaders, who are "disturbed that the U.S. has abandoned the principles of Jefferson and Lincoln to play ball with the dictators." He called the U.S. foreign policy toward certain Latin American countries "irresponsible and immoral."

Drainage Bids For Clear Lake Sought By Board

Bids for improving drainage in the vicinity of Clear Lake, about six miles south of Reedsport, will be taken in Salem Thursday by the State Highway Commission.

Plans call for additional drainage systems to pick up highway surface runoff and dissipate it in the sandy soil rather than to allow it to run off into Clear Lake. The drainage is designed as a protective measure to avoid polluting the lake, which is the source of water supply for Reedsport.

Completion of the work is scheduled for late fall.

Bids will also be received on the same date by the commission for work in Coos and Josephine counties.

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The Coos County work is for 6.96 miles of grading on the relocated section of the Oregon Coast Highway between Beaver Lookout and Bullards Bridge. This is the section to be contracted on the new routing of the Oregon Coast Highway which leaves the existing highway just north of Davis Slough and extends in a generally southerly direction to Bandon. Completion is scheduled for the fall of 1959.

Bids will also be received for the grading of the Windy Gap Section of the Galice County Road about 16 miles northwest of Grants Pass. Plans call for grading the section to a width of 31 feet, eliminating the present narrow road that is located on a steep side hill cut around the Windy Gap rock bluff overlooking the Rogue River. Completion date is scheduled for the fall of 1958.

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Senator Asks Probe Of Outside Efforts At Integration

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Olin Johnston (D-SC) urged Saturday that Southern states raise several million dollars to investigate what he termed a drive by Communists and fellow travelers to force integration, discredit the South and set up a dictatorship.

In a letter to Gov. Leroy Collins of Florida, chairman of the Southern Governors Conference, Johnston said such subversive elements support the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People "both physically and financially."

"The South needs to show in solid evidence that organizations causing such situations have occurred at Little Rock, and which will be caused to occur in other places, are subversive in nature and have Communist backing," Johnston told Collins.

"The South needs such a program to counteract the propaganda of the NAACP and other elements and organizations which are constantly besmirching the people of the South."

Johnston said that deeper than the goal of complete integration, subversives seek "to completely destroy the power of state governments and to establish a dictatorship."

The powers being assumed today by President Eisenhower will be used in the future by more intelligent ones than he to take over this nation for other reasons than to enforce integration," Johnston wrote.

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isators to abolish the Arkansas National Guard, presumably to have them replaced by an organized militia with no federal connection. The governor said he did not favor such a move at the present.

Faubus said that between 600 and a thousand students were refusing to attend the high school in apparent protest of the enforced integration. When a newsman pointed out that Faubus's figure of absenteeism was higher than reported by school officials, Faubus snapped:

"I wouldn't accept (School Supt.) Virgil Blossom's statement for anything."

Blossom's office reported that 1,415 of the 2,000 students attended classes Friday. The first day of integration, the attendance was reported at 1,250.

There have been suggestions that the legislature be asked to close Little Rock Central High School and have the school reopened as a private institution.

Some parents said they kept their children home, fearing they would be harmed if more trouble comes. Others said they kept their children away because of the presence of Negro students.

A special session, the governor said, could legally wipe out the state public school system. Presumably the schools would be taken over by private groups on the theory the federal government would have no control over them and would therefore remove the soldiers.

Another proposal is to withdraw state financial aid from schools which integrate.

Eisenhower and a committee of Southern governors are to meet in Washington tomorrow to discuss integration generally.

Lumber Pay Discussed

Other topics in the discussion concerned the Southern Pacific Co. and labor.

Paul McKee, general manager of Pacific Plywood Corp., Dillard, told Porter that unions will have to recognize eventually that if they want full employment in the lumber industry, they must make concessions independent of penalty premium pay for Saturday and Sunday work.

McKee said it takes between \$20,000 and \$30,000 in capitalization to put one man to work in the lumber and related industries. Because of the high capitalization, machinery has to be kept operating continuously.

Overtime pay on weekends makes that nearly impossible, he said, and unions must recognize that fact.

He pointed out that two consecutive days off can be arranged in most industries.

McKee also said that the SP is "doing a good job building cars." But many eastern railroads aren't keeping up with the demand for new cars, and that has resulted in his company's having to spend several hundred dollars each month repairing cars to be ready for shipping.

Hoffa Continues To Lead Running At Convention

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—California Congressman John F. Shelley withdrew Monday as a candidate for the Teamsters presidency to aid what he said he hopes will become a combined opposition against James R. Hoffa.

Shelley's withdrawal, coming after Teamster convention sessions got underway, left three men in the race against Hoffa, the union's Midwest boss and vice president charged by the Senate Rackets Committee with misusing union funds and powers.

Hoffa was the front running candidate, however, to succeed retiring President Dave Beck, himself enmeshed in corruption labor organization.

Beck won a standing ovation from the nearly 2,000 convention delegates after an emotion-packed defense against corruption charges pending against him, Hoffa and other Teamsters leaders.

Wants 'Stigma' Erased

Shelley, Democratic congressman from California, pledged himself to work among Hoffa's opponents to select "a single victorious candidate whose election will repudiate the stigma which our present leadership has brought upon our organization."

"My fight for a clean union," Shelley said, "has been against those who would discredit and dilute the international and certainly against the one man, James Hoffa, who represents a disastrous threat against continued labor unity in this country."

Hoffa, however, seemed well in command of the convention situation as he was cheered, along with Beck.

Beck, in a keynote address, said he and other Teamster leaders, including Hoffa, had been unfairly dealt with by the Senate rackets probes.

He said they had been condemned on unproved charges before court trial.

Quoting liberally from Scriptures, Beck said: "He who is without sin can cast the first stone."

Beck is under indictment for alleged evasion of some \$250,000 in federal income tax and faces other court charges.
