

National Guard Replaces Army Men

Teamsters Maneuvering For Power In Election; Warren May Rule Today

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — The first major test of strength in the heated battle for the presidency of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters was in prospect at the sprawling, sunbaked Miami Beach Auditorium today.

In Washington, Chief Justice Warren may act on an effort by a group of Teamsters' union members to block the election of national union officers. Warren has under advisement an appeal by 13 Teamsters members in New York for reinstatement of an injunction delaying the union election.

Contenders To Collide

Two of the leading contenders for the post being vacated by Dave Beck — Vice President James R. Hoffa of Detroit and Thomas J. Haggerty, Chicago milk truck drivers official — probably will collide head on today as the convention Credentials Committee makes its final report on contested delegates.

A coalition move to unite the strength of three candidates in an effort to block Hoffa, the heir ap-

parent of Beck, showed new signs of significant gains.

Rep. John S. Shelley (D - Calif) withdrew as a candidate for president with an appeal to the other candidates to unite in a stop-Hoffa rally of strength.

Ignored Overtures

But Vice President William A. Lee of Chicago ignored overtures of the coalition block and Vice President Thomas L. Hickey of New York snubbed it although he did engage in some conversation about such a move.

Hoffa opponents are banking heavily on the threat that the Teamsters will be expelled from the AFL-CIO if Hoffa is named to succeed Beck.

As a battle over validity of the number of delegates, sparked by Haggerty forces, neared the convention floor, Sen. McClellan (D-Ark) chairman of the committee investigating labor racketeering, offered the Teamsters evidence which he said indicates 50 per cent of the delegates were illegally named.

Porter Says Transportation Most Vital To Development In 4th Congressional Dist.

Rep. Charles O. Porter continued Monday noon on the development theme of his tour in Douglas County when he spoke before the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce in the Hotel Umpqua.

The congressman named transportation as one of the major problems to be licked in the Fourth Congressional District before a new surge of industrial growth can start.

He repeated his Sunday statement that Gov. Robert D. Holmes is interested in seeing the completion of about 12 miles of Highway 225 realignment between Tye and Elkton. That is a 3-million-dollar project.

He also said the building of the North Umpqua Highway between Highways 99 and 97 and a new route to Coos Bay from Roseburg over the old Coos Bay Wagon Road are necessities.

Pointing out that the final distribution of federal forest road funds for major highway construction is largely in the hands of the State Highway Commission, Porter promised he will do all he can to see that the funds are well-spent in Southern Oregon.

Funds Used By Agreement

The forest road fund distribution is made by agreement among the U. S. Forest Service, the Bureau

of Public Roads and the Highway Commission.

Porter said reconstruction of the south jetty at the mouth of the Umpqua River probably will be authorized by Congress soon. The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers have been allocated \$7,000 to start a study of the project.

He reiterated his stand that the United States should renew trade relations with Red China, adding that a "department of Commerce" man had informed him that West Coast businessmen are "unanimous" in wanting trade embargoes nullified.

The congressman said that an adjustment of railroad freight rates by the Interstate Commerce Commission is "fundamental to us in getting out of a peasant status in the Northwest." He said he has introduced a bill to start percent.

3 Juveniles Held On Burglary Counts

Three Roseburg juveniles were charged with burglary Monday following the alleged admission of the theft of a cash register and record player in September.

Lodged in the Douglas County jail were two 16-year-olds, a boy and a girl. A 13-year-old girl was released to her parents by Roseburg police.

Police say the trio has admitted breaking into a storeroom at 105 S. Mosher Ave. on two occasions. The first time, about Sept. 19, a record player was taken, while the cash register was removed on Sept. 23.

The cash register, hidden on the bank of the South Umpqua River at the end of Mosher, was discovered the day it was stolen and was taken to the police station while the owner was sought.

Mrs. Martha Thompson, 320 S. Pine St., owner of the stolen articles, said she had left them in a locked upstairs room when she rented the place to tenants.

Police reported that screws holding a hasp had been removed and then replaced.

The record player was recovered at the home of the 16-year-old girl. She allegedly had told her parents the machine had been loaned to her by the younger girl.

Glendale Man Dies In Highway Crash

Truck, Car Hit; Wife, One Child Seriously Hurt

A freak collision during Monday afternoon's rainstorm resulted in the 18th traffic fatality of the year for Douglas County.

Killed was Arthur Vincent Handley, 40, Glendale.

Injured in the accident which occurred on Highway 99 at the entrance to the Tri-City Drive - In Theater were the victim's wife, Irene, 33, and a two-year-old son, John. They are hospitalized at the Myrtle Creek Clinic where their injuries are listed as serious but not critical.

Mrs. Handley suffered fractured ribs and multiple lacerations, while the youngster received multiple lacerations. Two other children, Mary, 11, and Rodney, 4, were examined at the clinic for possible injuries and were released to Glendale residents, neighbors of the Handleys.

Chest Injuries Fatal

Taken to the clinic by Ganz ambulance, Handley died at 6:05. Death was attributed to chest injuries, according to Oregon State Police, who investigated the accident.

The accident occurred, according to police reports, when a 1949 Copco ton-and-a-half flat bed truck driven by Earl Wilford Lauer, 57, 231 NE Malheur Ave., skidded on the wet pavement and swerved into the path of a car.

The Handley car, with Handley at the wheel, struck the rear of the truck. Time of the accident was listed at approximately 4:25 p.m.

Neither the driver of the truck nor his passenger, Lawrence Adams, 40, Tualuma, were reported injured.

Truck Goes Into Skid

State police reported that the truck was headed north following a line of traffic and attempted to reduce speed, causing the truck to skid. It swerved in a forward direction for a short distance and then swung into the south-bound traffic lane and reversed ends. Lauer attempted to drive the truck south moving with traffic, the instant Handley's car hit the rear of the truck.

Both vehicles were reportedly badly damaged. The Handley car was towed to Myrtle Creek and the truck was taken to Tri-City.

The fatality put this year's Douglas County traffic score two ahead of 1956. At the same time last year, 18 traffic deaths were listed. Handley's death was the 18th this year.

Polygamist Is Granted Probation In Sentence

Probation was granted Monday to Charles H. Decker after he was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary after pleading guilty to polygamy.

The 50-year-old Canyonville man admitted marrying a second time without benefit of divorce from his first wife. An express condition of his probation granted by Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich is that he properly support a child by his first wife.

Maximum Penalty Meted Van Alstyne On Liquor Count

The maximum penalty — six months in jail and a \$500 fine — was imposed Monday against Arthur G. Van Alstyne, 27, after he pleaded guilty to furnishing liquor to a minor.

The Roseburg man received the full penalty despite a plea by his attorney for leniency and probation. In imposing sentence, Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich noted that leniency had been extended when the charge facing Van Alstyne was reduced from contributing to the delinquency of a minor. "Probation is denied," said the judge.

The stiffer charge, leveled in a grand jury indictment, was dismissed by Judge Woodrich after the defendant had entered his plea. Moving for the dismissal was Dist. Atty. Avery W. Thompson.

The contributing charge was a felony and carried a maximum penalty of five years' imprisonment upon conviction. Van Alstyne was scheduled to stand trial on the indictment this week.

Demurrer Filed

His attorney, Donald S. Kelley, had endeavored to attack the contributing indictment in a demurrer, he charged that because of the liquor furnishing statute on the books, that should have been the charge against his client.

Arguments on the demurrer were held on two occasions last week before Judge Woodrich who overruled Kelley's demurrer.

It was after this ruling that Van Alstyne evidently decided to enter a plea to a reduced charge. This was prepared in a district attorney's information by Thompson and

Two Policemen, Gunman Killed, Four Wounded

NORTH VERNON, Ind. (AP) — A killer's cross-country holdup spree ended in meek surrender in a thick Tuesday after a nightmare of gun battles that had killed his partner and two state troopers in two states.

Victor Wayne Whitley, 26, Granger, Tex., had only scratches and bruises when his capture ended the horror of a series of Michigan and Indiana shootings that killed the three and wounded four policemen.

Taken to a nearby state police station for questioning, Whitley put most of the blame for the shootings on his dead partner, Ralph Walker Taylor, 36, convicted rapist from Kenova, W. Va. He gave police a list of 21 holdups he said they had staged since June, from Wilmington, Del., to Texas.

Trooper Killed

Already dead after the gun battles in two states were troopers Dugald A. Pellot, 23, Clinton, Mich., and William Kellems, 27, Scottsburg, Ind.

Four other officers were wounded, three of them around the scene of the final shootings, manhunt and capture.

Bourges-Maunoury Quits As Premier, Following Vote

PARIS (AP) — A lame duck Cabinet governed France again today after the National Assembly defeated Premier Maurice Bourges-Maunoury on his proposal to give partial self-rule to Algeria.

Bourges - Maunoury, in office only since June 13, immediately handed his resignation to President Rene Coty.

Coty refused to accept it "at this time and in the present circumstances," Bourges - Maunoury agreed to stay only until his successor can be found.

The no-confidence vote of 279-253 was short of the absolute majority of the total 596 deputies which would have forced Bourges-Maunoury to resign. This left Coty free to ask the Premier to stay in office.

The Assembly's rejection of even partial self-rule for Algeria promised France a rough time in the current U.N. Assembly, where Arab demands for Algerian independence are mounting.

Bourges-Maunoury had hoped to present his plan to the Assembly as evidence that France was trying to meet the demands of the Arab nationalists, at least in part.

Volkswagen Bus Service Must Increase Patrongae If It Is To Be Continued

Roseburg's Volkswagen bus service may go out of business after the first of the year unless there's an increase in business.

J. W. Sayre, president of the Roseburg City Bus Co., said today that the company needs a 25 per cent increase even.

He said that he will keep the service running if it reaches the break-even point.

The bus service has been operating since mid-July on a franchise from the Roseburg City Council. The present franchise agreement will end Jan. 1.

Sayre said the company has been losing money steadily since it started operating.

However, he gave credit to Roseburg businessmen and the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce for support.

Issues Statement

"We are aware that there is some concern as to the continuance of the Roseburg City Bus service, since we have had many inquiries and suggestions concerning the service. We feel that a statement regarding the success of that service is in order.

Lafferty urged that hunters keep in mind the slogan, "Think and look before you shoot."

Negroes Go To Central Unescorted

Gov. Faubus Still Considering Calling Legislative Session

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Federalized Arkansas National Guardsmen replaced regular Army troops at Central High School Tuesday as Gov. Orval E. Faubus still considered the possibility of calling a special legislative session to deal with integration here.

For the first time since the troop-enforced integration began at the school last Wednesday, the six Negro girls and three boys walked into the school without a military escort.

Faubus, at a news conference later, said the Guardsmen could no longer be considered National Guardsmen.

"They're not the National Guard," he said. "They are U.S. Army troops."

Faubus said he expected to decide "this week or next" on whether to call a special session of the Legislature to deal with the integration problem at the school. Talk of such a session began over the weekend but Faubus appeared Monday to have cooled off on the subject for the time being, at least.

The governor said he had no plans of his own to reach a compromise in the integration crisis here and he did not know how it would end.

Faubus accused J. Edgar Hoover, FBI director, of using "lawyer language" in denying that his agents had held teen-age high school girls incommunicado last week for questioning. He said Hoover placed that denial next to one he had made that his agents had not tapped the telephone lines of the governor.

"The way he placed the two statements together does not mean that I lied in any respect," Faubus said.

School Supt. Virgil Blossom reported attendance rose to 1,696 at the school which has an enrollment of 2,000. When integration began last week the attendance dropped to 1,250 the first day.

They were homeward bound, in high spirits, and the speedy downhill ride seemed like fun.

An instant later they were screaming in terror as the bus, its brakes apparently gone, spun off into a 35-foot-deep ravine at the foot of a grade on the city's East Side. The big yellow vehicle somersaulted and rolled, landing ultimately on its top in a shallow creek.

Two of the children, Steven Marjore, 8, and John De Santis, 7, were killed outright. A third, Edward Ulwelling, 6, died two hours later. And 24 others were injured, some seriously. The bus driver, Meldon Smith, 53, also was hurt.

Screams of the youngsters were heard more than a block away. Rescue workers said the boys and girls—ranging in age from 5 to 12—were jumbled together in a bloody mass in the bus.

A corps of ambulances rushed the injured to three hospitals. After emergency treatment, a few were released and the remainder admitted among half a dozen hospitals.

Home Of Negro Chairman Bombed

COLP, Ill. (AP) — A night club operated by the Negro president of the Colp school board was bombed last night, and police investigated for a possible connection between the bombing and local school integration.

Williamson County sheriff's police, investigating the incident, reported the club, operated by William Hatchett, was rocked by a blast about 10 p.m.

Police said the Colp school board late in August voted 4-3, along racial lines, to integrate the small community's two schools. The all-white Standard school was ordered closed and its 80 pupils were supposed to attend the Attucks school, along with its 115 Negro pupils.

The three white members of the school board have since resigned, and white parents have boycotted the integrated Attucks - Standard school by sending their children to neighboring communities.

State Board Ok's Plans For State Deaf School

SALEM (AP) — The State Board of Control approved final plans Tuesday for construction of a \$115,000 pre-school unit at the State Deaf School here.

The next step is to call for bids. Secretary of State Mark Hatfield was absent from the meeting. He is in Cleveland, Ohio, attending an American Psychiatric Assn. institute on administration of state hospitals.
