Only the final major league wind-up, known as the World Series, remains before the official winter shutdown of baseball season. Then next year, we look for the local area to have its best representation ever in the pro diamond sport.

Two of Douglas County's four professional baseball athletes, when they both report to Brooklyn Dodger camp at Vero Beach, Fla. in early March. The two are Dr. Jerry Cade and Glide's Dick Smith.

Presently Mike Coen expects to report back to the Sacramento ball club, while Buddy Peterson, the former Redford High performer, has already sprung his major league career by playing in a couple of Baltimore Oriole games after being sent up by the Vancouver Mounties.

THE VETERAN PETERSON, of course, had the most successful season of the four in terms of moving up, but all showed promise. We don't have exact figures on the veteran shortstop's performance in the Pacific Coast League, but in addition to being the top fielding shortstop in the circuit, he also clipped the ball well over the 300 mark, placing among the top five hitters.

Roseburg's Coen is back at work in the local family supply firm with as he puts it "a big education behind him."

Despite a losing 2-1 season pitching for Sacramento's seventy-place team, Coen looks back on the year as one in which "I got a lot of experience."

"It didn't quite work out the way we wanted it to," Mike said. "But we weren't completely dissatisfied with the season. At least they were enough impressed to keep me there all year."

IN MID-YEAR, Coen incurred a shoulder hurt which probably didn't help his cause any. But he says that it was all healed after a couple weeks. The accident occurred when he slipped and fell while trying to field a ball.

He is officially contracted to the Sacramento team, but the Detroit Tigers, who first purchased rights to him, still have first call on him. His final 1957 PCL record, much of it relief pitching, gave him an earned run average of 4.00, 80 strikeouts, 60 walks and he gave up 105 hits.

THE 25-YEAR OLD former all-around Roseburg star added a fitting note in regard to his future, pointing out that much depends on the future of the Pacific Coast League, as to where he might be next year. Coen also commented that he had heard of Dick Smith's departure for Los Angeles soon after the Glide boy had signed with the Dodger chain in August. And, he added, that he (Smith) was acknowledged as "having a lot of power for a young guy."

Dick was getting lots of good background in developing power. In addition to having lots of the well-known natural variety, it seems that young Smith had a chance to work under the wing of a couple guys named Steve Bilko and Tommy Saffell while working out with the Los Angeles Angels.

SMITH STAYED with the Angels for two weeks after he reported to them in mid-August, and while he didn't get to play, made a trip to San Diego and San Francisco with the team. At the same time, Bilko helped me "straighten out" my stance and showed me to swing real good," relates Dick. "And Saffell gave me a lot of outfield tips."

When Smith finally did swing into action, he was shipped to Reno where he joined one of the top teams in the Class C loop there. The Reno team finally finished the season as runnerup to Salinas, Calif. in the final playoffs, losing three out of four contests in the playoffs.

STRANGELY ENOUGH, Smith, who had been originally signed up as an outfield prospect, got in most of his licks pitching—a stint for which he gained no little renown in earlier days hereabouts.

World Series Start Set By NY, Braves

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Yankees, playing in their 23rd October classic, ruled an 8-5 favorite today to defeat the Milwaukee Braves, winners of their first National League championship, in tomorrow's opener of the 54th World Series.

A capacity crowd of some 67,000 spectators was expected to jam Yankee Stadium to witness a battle of left-handers.

Whitely Ford, winner of four series games in six decisions, has been nominated by Manager Casey Stengel to pitch his third straight opener. He will be opposed by Warren Spahn, the only Milwaukee pitcher with series experience.

Each team is prepared to use essentially the same lineup that carried them to the pennant. Stengel raised some doubt about Mickey Mantle and Bill Skowron, but he indicated both would be ready tomorrow.

Mantle Starter Skowron, who had been bothered by a sprained back during the past few weeks, worked out yesterday and reported he was swinging freely. His back, he said, felt fine except when he tried to run hard.

Mantle, plagued by shin splints for more than a month, was an almost certain starter, although he admitted his left leg still bothered him when he tried to exert extra pressure.

If Skowron cannot make it, the first base assignment will go to Elston Howard over either Joe Collins or Harry Simpson. That's because Stengel is anxious to insert as much right-handed power as he can against Spahn's southpaw pitching.

Milwaukee's starting lineup with six right-handed hitters, is all set for Ford. The only left-handed starter, besides Spahn, are Eddie Mathews and Wes Covington.

The only surprise in the Yankee opening lineup was Stengel's selection of Kubek, a rookie, over Enos Slaughter, a veteran of many campaigns in left field. Both

Oregon State Holds Down Ninth Spot In AP Poll; Sooners Lead

Oklahoma never stirred from the practice field last week, but still ruled the roost today as the nation's No. 1 college football team in the second weekly Associated Press poll.

However, Michigan State served notice it will be a strong contender. The Spartans moved down Indiana in its opener last Saturday 54-0, and moved up from fourth to second place.

Oklahoma, idle after walloping Pittsburgh a week earlier, takes on Iowa State Saturday.

With a total of 134 votes from sports writers and sportscasters, Oklahoma got 81 firsts and 1,223 points based on 10 for first, 9 for second, etc. Michigan State received 24 firsts and 989 points. The Spartans met California this week.

Minnesota, 48-7 winner over the University of Washington, moved up from sixth to third place with 867 points. The Duke Blue Devils, who made it two straight by thumping Virginia 40-0, vaulted from seventh to fourth place, and edged out Texas A&M, which dropped from second to fifth, although defeating Texas Tech 21-0.

Auburn, not even in the first 20 teams a week ago, and Iowa barged into the top 10, replacing Georgia Tech and Tennessee. Auburn's 7-0 upset of Tennessee knocked the Volunteers clear out of the top 20, while an 8-0 tie with Southern Methodist dropped the Engineers to 14th place. Auburn took over No. 7, and Iowa jumped from No. 12 to eighth place.

Navy, fifth a week ago, made it two straight by whipping William and Mary 35-6, but skidded a notch to No. 8. Oregon State held on to ninth, and Michigan remained No. 10. The Beavers won their second in a row, a 34-6 decision over Kansas, and Michigan defeated Southern California 16-6.

Pirates Retain AP Poll Lead; Eugene Second

Marshallfield, which tied a 29-year-old record last weekend, again is the No. 1 team in the Associated Press' Oregon high school football poll this week.

By overwhelming Lebanon, 39-0, Marshallfield stretched its unbeaten string to 38 games, equalling the state class A mark set by Medford.

Marshallfield, state champion the past two years, drew first place votes from 13 of the 15 sports writers and broadcasters who balloted.

South Eugene, which finished No. 2, and Milwaukie, No. 3, got the other first place votes. There was only one newcomer to the top 10. That was South Salem, which defeated North Salem, No. 2 last week, 13-0. The loss dumped North Salem out of the select 10. South Salem moved in, although only to ninth spot.

South Eugene, which overwhelmed Cottage Grove, 41-0, and Milwaukie, a 31-0 victor over Hillsboro, each advanced a notch. So did Jefferson of Portland, Medford, McMinnville and Grants Pass.

Jefferson trampled Cleveland, 32-7, to run its two-game scoring total to 88 and become No. 4. Medford moved up to fifth, although idle. McMinnville earned its advance to No. 6 with a 27-0 defeat of Forest Grove. Grants Pass, a 13-7 victor over Roseburg, went into seventh place.

Beaverton vaulted from tenth to No. 8 after downing Astoria 29-7. Benson, defending Portland city league champion, dropped 43 from No. 9 to tenth despite a 22-0 trimming of Franklin.

Of the top 10 teams Marshallfield, South Eugene, Milwaukie, Jefferson, McMinnville and Benson have perfect season records. Medford, Grants Pass, South Salem and Beaverton each have lost once.

Fred Haney Predicts Brave Series Win

NEW YORK (AP)—Milwaukee Manager Fred Haney flatly predicted his club would win the World Series.

"We didn't come here to lose it," he said while surveying Yankee Stadium, where the Braves meet the New York Yankees in the first game of the series tomorrow.

Haney was calmed down after a verbal hassle with a reporter last night. The newspaper asked if he thought the Braves would "choke up" in the series.

Haney told the newspaper he'd be thrown out if he showed up in the Braves' clubhouse during the series.

Haney still is touchy over the "choke up" charges that go back to last year, when the Braves folded at the end of the race, permitting the Brooklyn Dodgers to win it.

"But that's all over now," Haney laughed, "although I still think it was a stupid question."

As for his team, Haney said all the celebration ended with the big parade in Milwaukee yesterday and that there wasn't even any hilarity on the plane coming in to New York.

"The boys realize it's strictly business now," he commented. "I have a few problems that I've got to solve and it's no time for fooling around."

In another development, Horace Stoneham, president of the New York Giants, formally notified Commissioner Ford Frick that the Giants are moving their baseball franchise to San Francisco.

The move was a foregone conclusion but formal notice had been delayed until the last possible day.

If the Dodgers do move out of Brooklyn, Commissioner Ford Frick says, New York will remain open territory to the National League at least until Dec. 1 and perhaps longer.

The formalities of moving, Frick estimated, would take at least two months.

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
