

Two NW States Plan Crackdown On Tax Evaders

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — The tax commissions of Washington and Oregon are swapping information in a crackdown on state tax evaders in border areas, the chairman of the Washington commission said Sunday.

William S. Schumacher said the campaign has been successful and that 1,100 businesses and professional offices had been forced to start paying business taxes to the state.

He said his office has found that out-of-state corporations should have paid more than 7 million dollars to the state but that there are no "moral implications" in their failure to do so.

He said past tax commission auditing practices had been "confused" and that this resulted in failure to collect the money.

Schumacher, speaking to a Benton County Democratic meeting, said the major problem has been with out-of-state firms selling merchandise to Washington residents. He said such cases are found in the Tri-City area, Spokane, Clarkston, Walla Walla, Vancouver, Wash. and other border areas.

"It is unfair to Washington merchants to permit others to sell without collecting the tax," he said.

He said the Tax Commission has been checking conditional sales contracts filed in Washington courtrooms and forcing those who buy, but do not pay, to sell the 3.3 percent tax levied in lieu of Washington's sales tax.

Sanatorium Now Training School For Executives

SARANAC LAKE, N.Y. (AP) — A former tuberculosis sanatorium was opened today as the nation's first training school for business executives.

The American Management Assn. dedicated the two-million-dollar center to "enlightened management philosophy and improved management practices as a service to humanity."

The 60-building center covering 90 acres on an Adirondack mountainside was designated as the AMA's Academy of Advanced Management. It had been the Trudeau Sanatorium.

The association plans to inaugurate next Monday a two-week course in "decision making," somewhat like army "war games."

Twenty company presidents gave the course a trial run today with a "decision - simulating game."

Starting with the same product and the same financial position, they made spending and price decisions according to their own judgment.

An electronic computer kept score and told them how they were doing, business-wise.

A four-week management course opened today. About 1,000 are enrolled for both courses.

In a message to the association, President Eisenhower expressed confidence "in the activities of your organization and the plans for the academy of advanced management."

Gov. Averell Harriman said he thought the training center was "destined to become one of our nation's great business landmarks."

Drag Strip Car Racers Cause Crash Of Plane

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — A small plane crashed at a private airport just north of here Sunday as the pilot frantically tried to dodge drag strip car racers in his path, the state highway patrol reported.

He said the Piper Tri-Pacer, piloted by Gene Shroyer, 29, Ottawa, Ohio, ground looped about 10 feet from two hot-rodders and flopped upside down. Shroyer and his two passengers, Jim Davis, 31, Lima, and Cleur Klauising, 31, Ottawa, escaped serious injury.

The accident happened at Northway Airport, which hot-rodders use as a drag strip raceway.

"They should close the field or stop the drag racing," said a police sergeant.

A move by county commissioners to end auto racing at the airport is pending in the courts.

Lightning Kills Oregon Woman Picking Apples

Lightning killed a woman picking apples Sunday as a series of thunderstorms moved into Southern Oregon.

Mrs. Elaine Graham, 33, was killed outright when a bolt of lightning hit her as she picked fruit in a storm near her Klamath Falls home.

The heat was so intense it melted metal buckles on her gasholes, the Klamath County coroner's office said. Her husband, Steve, standing nearby, was not injured.

Asian Flu Hits School Attended By Boy Prince

HEADLEY, England (AP) — Five suspected cases of Asian flu have developed at Cheam School, which Prince Charles entered a week ago.

A school spokesman said the 8-year-old heir to the British throne and other boys who have so far escaped the disease have been ordered to stay out of the school sick bay where the five are under treatment, "although the outbreak is not regarded as serious."

Propaganda Gain Obtained From Little Rock Affair Doesn't Meet Soviet Hopes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Russians may not have gained as much as they hope from the Little Rock affair.

They made all the propaganda they could out of it, they used the photographs and the eyewitness accounts of violence in an obvious effort to hurt the United States. The point they tried to make — especially with the nonwhite majority of the human race — was that cruelty and intolerance are the rule of life in this country.

This isn't true, of course.

For all that we may be going through a revolution in race relations, and for all that Negro-white dealings have seldom been satisfactory to either side, the races from Little Rock is not as the Little Rock pictures tell a true, sad story. But:

As everybody in this country knows a Negro can walk down a main street of any town or city without a thought of being molested. And the Little Rock experiment notwithstanding, American children do normally go to school without protection from bayonets.

Real Lesson Emerges

The lesson gradually emerging from Little Rock is not as the Communists would have it — that this is a country torn by racial violence.

Rather, it is that in spite of occasional missteps this is a country governed by law and not by the whims or prejudices of men.

The men in the Kremlin can hardly, with a straight face, make the same claim for their part of the world. Not after the iron rule of Josef Stalin, the crushing of resistance in Hungary — well, the list of atrocities is too well known to need detailing.

As for the missteps in this country:

There was the "mob of extremists," as President Eisenhower put it over the weekend, which stopped some Negro adolescents from going to school at Little Rock. The mob was dispersed, and in short order.

Nuclear Tests To Continue Until Soviet Union Ceases Own Output, U. S. Declares

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — The United States will continue nuclear test explosions until the Soviet Union agrees to stop producing atomic and hydrogen weapons.

In a speech before the U. N. 12-nation Disarmament Commission, U. S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said the United States is not prepared to agree to a ban on stockpiling weapons if it really wants to end the nuclear tests.

Soviet Delegate Arkady A. Sobolev insisted on an immediate and unconditional test ban.

He said the United States was frustrating the hopes of millions of people by linking this question to other disarmament problems.

If the Soviet Union is not prepared to agree, Dulles said, "Then say with all the solemnity that I can that I can face with a present major danger."

He added:

"Such unwillingness could confront us and other nations of the Free World with a powerful nation whose conduct would only be explained by a determination to impose military domination on the world."

French Delegate Guillaume Georges-Picot supported Dulles and urged the Commission, as well as the General Assembly, to support the step-by-step disarmament proposals submitted by the United States.

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order, by federal troops.

Not — and this is important — because the President necessarily favors mixing of white and Negro pupils. He has been careful to avoid a strong personal opinion one way or the other, he called out troops on the ground that a federal court order directing integration was being flouted. The troops were sent to enforce the court's decree in being carried out.

No Defender For Mob

Some, notably Arkansas Gov. Orval E. Faubus, thought the President's action unnecessary. But such counteraction is now in prospect is all on the legal level. Nobody is defending the mob, least of all Faubus, for all that Eisenhower practically accused him of fomenting the violence.

Even if Arkansas takes the step of closing Little Rock's Central High School as a way of getting the federal troops out — it would be done by legal means. The State Legislature would be called on to take the action, and then presumably it would be fought out in the courts.

All this falling back on legal processes is far less dramatic, of course, than mob violence or military force. Will the point get across to the rest of the world that Americans are, after all, proving themselves a people who depend on courts and legislatures rather than fists and bayonets?

One hint that this may happen came from an Asian — India's Defense Minister V. K. Krishna Menon, who has often been pictured as anti-American, or at least as "neutral" with leanings toward the Communists. Menon said in a television interview that in the Little Rock affair: "I was impressed by the fact that no outstanding statesman of any party has come out in favor of mob rule."

It may surprise and dismay Americans that we have to prove we are not hooligans. But if we do have to prove it, we seem, in the eyes of the Russians, to be making some headway.

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The Soviet Union, India and Japan have submitted resolutions to have the Assembly call on the atomic powers — Britain, the Soviet Union and the United States — to suspend nuclear tests subject only to inspection. The Soviet proposal would start the suspension next Jan. 1, the others on conclusion of an inspection agreement.

The four Western members of the subcommittee — Britain, Canada, France and the United States — have agreed to work on a resolution of their own asking the Assembly to endorse the "proposals for partial measures of disarmament" they put before the subcommittee Aug. 29.

Their proposals also would require an inspection agreement before tests stopped. But the Western proposals would not start the suspension until the "contingent force" of a broad disarmament convention covering step-by-step cuts in armed forces, a cutoff of production of nuclear materials for weapons and tight international control.
