

Gov. Griffin Tells Crowd He Was Warned Ike's Vote Meant 'Bayonets For South'

CLARKSVILLE, Ga. (AP)—Gov. Marvin Griffin told an audience here Wednesday that he was warned soon after President Eisenhower entered the White House that Eisenhower's election "means bayonets for the South."

Griffin said he questioned the warning but that his informant, a personal friend with whom he often had differed politically, had this to say:

"You know the part that Eisenhower played in 1932, at Anacostia (a suburb of Washington) when he was aide to the chief of staff, and American soldiers turned poison gas on the children of American veterans. You know, too, that the last time America has a professional soldier in the White House, the South had bayonets at its throat."

Reference Made

The governor's reference to 1932 presumably referred to the bonus march when soldiers under Gen. Douglas MacArthur used tear gas against the marchers. Eisenhower was an aide to MacArthur at the time.

Griffin said he still remained doubtful at the time of his friend's warning, but went on to tell his listeners at a bridge dedication: "Today we all remember. We remember the grim days when Grant, the only other professional soldier to whom America has given the presidency sent troops into the South."

It was Griffin's first speech since he refused to go with a committee of southern governors to discuss the racial crisis with Eisenhower.

Denies Criticism

Griffin later denied that he had criticized the 101st Airborne troops sent to Little Rock, Ark., in the present integration troubles at Central High School.

The governor was also quoted as saying in a speech prepared for the bridge ceremonies that "elite corps soldiers" have been arrested in cities "somewhat distant from Little Rock as they engaged in drunken brawls."

For several years it has been the practice of Capitol messengers to deliver prepared texts of speeches by the governor to the office of the Associated Press.

Griffin said last night, however, that he had not authorized the issuance of the manuscript, and that he had spoken from no prepared text. He said he did not use the prepared speech because he was unable to check some of the statements it contained.

Death Takes Three Premature Quints

TOULON, France (AP)—Death during the night took three of the quintuplets born prematurely here yesterday.

A doctor said the chances for survival of the other two babies, Roland and Michele Cristofle, were "not too bad."

The 29-year-old mother, Mrs. Camille Cristofle, was reported doing well. The husband, 33, is a social security worker. They have been married eight years and the quints were their first born.

The two boys and three girls, born three months prematurely, ranged in weight from 2 to 2.3 pounds.

Tiny Philippe died shortly before midnight. An hour and a half later Helene died. Genevieve died at 6 a.m.

Only two sets of quints are known to have survived more than a few days—the Dionnes of Canada, born in 1934, and the Diligentis of Argentina, born in 1932.

The two boys and three girls of the Diligentis family are all flourishing. Four of the five Dionne girls are living. Emilie died three years ago.

Regular Army Engineers Company Stops In City

Italians Move Up Tanks To Border Of San Marino

SAN MARINO (AP)—Italian police moved up tanks and armored cars to the blockaded border of this ranch-size republic Thursday and a few Italian jets made quick passes over the country where two governments, Communist and anti-Communist, are disputing control.

A second Italian national police battalion also moved into the area from Florence. There was no official explanation of these moves, which included the appearance of 20 or more armored vehicles at the border.

"It's just routine fall maneuvers," said one of the national police officers, with a broad grin. But Domenico Morganti, interior minister of the Red government, said he wished Soviet Russia was "in a position to retaliate for this intimidation."

"But unfortunately we have no airfield and sadly Russia is too far away," he said.

For the first time since Italy set up her blockade five days ago, no good trucks were allowed to enter the little country. Outgoing mail also was turned back by the Italians.

Zaccaria Savoretti, one of the anti-Communist leaders, said he had unofficial word that the United States, Britain and France had recognized the new anti-Communist government.

one, has said he will do just that. Hickey's withdrawal statement said he has been a candidate against Hoffa because he firmly believes the union owed an obligation to its members to "restore the good name of the Teamsters Union" and keep it within the AFL-CIO.

"These objectives are shared by Vice President William Lee, a good Teamster and a good trade unionist," he added.

Teamster delegates showed little disposition to attach significance to the AFL-CIO expulsion threat. In a tumultuous session yesterday, they gave Hoffa a clean bill of health by angrily voting to expunge the corruption charges from the convention record.

On the other hand, Hoffa forces in firm control of the convention, eyed the coming court action more cautiously. They denied convention seats to 251 delegates whose credentials have been questioned.

Delegates also indicated in a lengthy demonstration that Hoffa is an overwhelming favorite when the convention reaches its major item of business—election of new officers—probably today.

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President Gets Warm Message From King Saud

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower said Tuesday he received a message of warm friendship from King Saud within hours of the time when a representative of the Saudi Arabian king broke with the U. S. policy line on Syria Wednesday.

Eisenhower left no doubt that he was surprised and bewildered by the United Nations speech of Saudi Arabian spokesman Ahmad Shukairy. He told his news conference he did not know what particular thing inspired it.

Eisenhower's attitude coincided with suspicions privately expressed at the State Department that Shukairy had distorted Saudi Arabia's real policy.

Eisenhower told questioners he thought the Arab's U. N. speech was correct on one thing—that Middle Eastern affairs should be handled locally and internally.

Somewhat Variance

This presidential view appeared, superficially at least, to be somewhat at variance with Secretary of State Dulles' appeal to the United Nations Sept. 19 to consider and discuss the shipment of Soviet arms to Syria. Shukairy sharply opposed that.

Nevertheless Eisenhower said the United States must continue to watch the Red arms buildup in pro-Soviet Syria with concern, must confer with friendly nations and must see what can be done about the whole situation.

The Shukairy speech was delivered at New York shortly before the State Department announced that Secretary Dulles will meet here late Saturday with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko for a far-ranging discussion of world problems.

A circuit court jury returned a guilty verdict against the 24-year-old man on the second day of his trial. Sentence was imposed immediately by Judge Charles S. Woodrich.

Noblin's attorney, Randolph Slocom, served notice of appeal on Dist. Avery Thompson and filed notice in circuit court.

Executive committee chairman Alice Rust says district presidents from Portland, Salem, Eugene, Coos Bay, Medford and Pendleton have accepted invitations to attend the pre-convention session.

Olive Dornier of Roseburg, general chairman of the convention committee, will direct all activities having to do with the April confab.

Fire-Created Hazards Being Fixed At Yoncalla

Mrs. Oscar Hubbard told Yoncalla City Council members recently that safety hazards created by the burning of the old theater building are being eliminated.

She said during a special council session that she has cleaned up parts of the razed structure which were hanging over sidewalks and plans to finish the clean-up job as soon as possible.

During another special meeting, the council discussed the need of sidewalks where old sidewalks have been removed and in other areas. Letters have been sent to property owners concerning the proposed new walkways.

Refuge For Deer In City May Soon Come To An End

Open deer hunting season may someday be common within the city limits of Roseburg, if the feeding habits of the four-footed creatures follows a current trend.

One special kill permit has already been issued within the city limits in one district of town, and citizens in another section of the city are considering the possibility of applying for permits.

Gets Permit

The special permit was issued to Mrs. V. J. Micelli at 1300 SE Washington St. after the deer-feeding problem became too destructive in the immediate neighborhood.

Mrs. Micelli, Deputy Sheriff James White and John Busenbark Jr. bagged four deer between the city limits and the "critters" between the special dates of the permit late last month.

Permits to Mrs. Micelli had been issued in past years as well, according to local district Oregon Game Commission Supervisor James Vaughn, but apparently they had never been used for their purpose until this year when the problem became overly aggravating.

Vaughn said that he had received 30 complaints from residents in the Laurewood district in West Roseburg recently. The inhabitants there, he said, were debating whether or not to take any action, with about half of them favoring and half of them against killing the deer.

Flowers Attacked

Flowers and shrubs have been the common city prey.

Vaughn also pointed out several deer have been killed in the Mt. Nebo area from being hit by cars on the new Pacific Highway. But for the time being, he stated, the only actual permit for killing in the city had been the one awarded Mrs. Micelli. A city ordinance allows the use of such a permit for the protection of individual property.

Youth Hurts Shoulder In Machinery Mishap

Larry Lane, 17, Box 1433A, Roseburg, suffered a dislocated right shoulder Wednesday when his arm became caught in a belt as he attempted to install a belt guard on machinery at Toner's Heating and Sheet Metal Works in Roseburg.

The youth was reported in satisfactory condition today at Douglas Community Hospital. He is the son of Morris Lane of Roseburg.

Dulles To Meet With Gromyko On Saturday

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles will meet with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko here Saturday for a far-ranging discussion of world affairs.

Disarmament may provide one subject, but the talks are expected to focus primarily on the tense situation in the Middle East.

Dulles may take the opportunity to tell the top Soviet diplomat directly and forcefully that the United States intends to do everything possible to prevent the spread of Soviet power and influence in the Middle East.

He also is expected to urge the Soviet leadership through Gromyko to avoid letting big power negotiations on disarmament be broken off completely.

Disarmament talks broke down in London in September, but discussion was switched to the U.N. General Assembly with the Western nations hoping they can be resumed next year.

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Edward Murphy Named To Bar Examiners Board

SALEM (AP)—The appointment of John J. Coughlin, Portland, as chairman of the state Board of Bar Examiners was approved by the Oregon Supreme Court here Wednesday. He has been on the board for two years.

Other members of the board are Jack H. Dunn and Howard Rankin, both Portland; Edward M. Murphy, Roseburg; William Gannon Jr., Klamath Falls, and Reginald S. Williams, Salem.

The board conducts the annual state bar examinations.

All Mountain Passes Remain Open, Report
