Haskins is 37 years old, 5 feet 11 inches tall, weighs 175 pounds, and has brown hair and eyes.

The band's new uniforms have been seen often in public. Besides appearing in Roseburg at athletic contests and in parades, the band represented the University of California at a football game at Oregon State College last fall and will represent Stanford there this year.

Army's Anti-aircraft Missiles Taken Over

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Army's anti-aircraft artillery battalions went out of business on the West Coast this week.

They will be replaced by Nike-Hercules and Hawk guided missiles.

Inactivation of the anti-aircraft rifles was expected earlier to take place over the next nine months. The program was stepped up by the Army because of economy requirements.

Maj. Gen. E. J. McGaw, commander of the 6th Region, said he had received information from the Army Air Defense Command at Colorado Springs that the battalions were to become inoperative this Tuesday.

Sites occupied by units under leasing agreements are to be returned to the owners. Most of the personnel will be transferred to other Air Defense Command units for retraining.

Battalions affected are the 77th in Los Angeles, 20th in Seattle, and the 518th and 519th in Hanford, Wash. The West Coast with 13 air defense battalions, all of which are equipped with nikes. They include three in Seattle, and one each at the Hanford, Wash., Atomic Works and Fairchild Air Force Base at Spokane.

Douglas Has 4 Members On BLM Advisory Board

Enrollment Reaches All-Time High At Oregon Schools

EUGENE (AP) — Enrollment at institutions in the Oregon state system of higher education reached an all-time high Wednesday.

The office of Chancellor John R. Richards said Wednesday's total of 18,826—with perhaps two more weeks of late registrations to come—exceeded the previous record of 18,590 which was the final enrollment last year.

New freshmen total 5,240, an increase of about 10 per cent over last year's 4,722 at this same stage in registration.

Portland State College had the biggest percentage gain—an increase of 18 per cent, but Oregon State's increase was the greatest numerically at nearly 800.

Eastern Oregon College was the only one with a smaller registration this year than last, but the falloff was slight. Early totals at the University of Oregon medical and dental schools also are less than last year, but that, officials said, is due to a change in procedures.

In the medical school, the nurse's registration was counted last year at this time. This year they will register later.

Bushel Will Continue To Be Measuring Unit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The traditional bushel will continue to be the measuring unit of the government for measuring grains handled under its price support program.

The Agriculture Department announced Wednesday that it has abandoned for the time being a proposal that it shift to the hundredweight. Advocates had contended the latter unit would simplify bookkeeping and reduce government costs.

But sharp opposition voiced by the grain storage industry coupled with the fact that some states require the use of the bushel in measuring grains moving in trade led to the official decision to keep the bushel.

The department said, however, that it will consider making such a change at a later time.

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Mailing Plan Is Changed For Employment Tax Forms

Ralph C. Grandquist, district director of internal revenue for Oregon, announced recently that the Internal Revenue Service has changed its methods of mailing employment tax forms to employers who report and pay income tax withheld from wages and taxes under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act.

Early in 1957, Form 941, Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return, was printed in a "self-mailer," and the practice of enclosing the forms in envelopes was discontinued.

On or about Oct. 15, there will be a special mailing of employers of a booklet, captioned "Employer's Tax Information Forms," containing the following forms and publications which, in past years, were enclosed with Form 941:

For immediate use of employers: Form W-4, Employee's Withholding Exemption Certificate, for use by new employees or by employees whose exemptions will be different next year. Six forms are provided in the booklet.

Publication No. 213, a bulletin board poster for use by the employer in reminding his employees of the importance of claiming their withholding exemptions correctly.

Form 941a, the continuation sheet of Form 941, for employers who have more employees than can conveniently be listed on Form 951.

Form 7018, Order for Employer's Tax Information Forms, for use by the employer in requesting additional forms from the district director.

For use at the end of the year: Form W-2, Withholding Tax Statement — 1957, to be furnished to employees not later than January 31, 1958. The booklet contains enough forms for six employees.

Form W-3, Reconciliation of Income Tax Withheld from Wages, to be filed by the employer not later than January 31, 1958.

Check list, for use by the employer in determining whether or not he is required to file Form 940, the annual return for employers of four or more employees under the Federal Unemployment Tax Act.

The booklet will not contain Forms W-2 for 1958, but district directors will furnish supplies of the form upon request made during the year. The employer must furnish Form W-2 to each employee whose employment is terminated before the close of the calendar year, on or before the thirtieth day after the last payment of wages to the employee.

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Charles Wilson, secretary of defense, said in Washington, D. C., earlier in the day the cut in monthly payments to aircraft manufacturers would be made.
