Lumber Industry Shows Some Trend Upward This Week

EUGENE — The lumber industry showed some price improvement last week, but it was due to continued production cuts rather than increases in demand. Random Lengths reported Saturday.

Random Lengths is the weekly lumber market news letter published by the Lumbermen's Buying Service here.

Reduced work weeks—with some mills down to three days of operation—shut-downs for deer hunting and for economic reasons, and rain after almost 50 days of dry weather, all contributed their bit toward bringing production in line with demand. The letter said. As a result, most lumber prices took on firmness and there were some which showed a tendency to climb slightly.

Green fir mills were reported beginning to hold firmly to their asking prices. But big buyers were not hesitating to make volume purchases in the belief that prices are at their low point.

Green utility grade dimensions continues as the market leader, the letter said.

Western pine producers also were reported optimistic over market prospects for the immediate future. More orders were on file now than at this time last year and both mill inventories and production are down.

Plywood producers, after advancing their prices \$4 to \$72 a thousand feet, were reported optimistic that the new level would hold.

Soldier Claims Girard Fired Three Shells

MAEBASHI, Japan — A U.S. soldier testified today that William S. Girard asked him to lie about how many shots were fired when a Japanese woman was killed on an Army firing range.

Victor Nickel said the Ottawa, Ill., soldier fired "about three times" at Japanese brass collector before hitting Mrs. Naka Sakai with an empty cartridge case from a grenade launcher last January. Girard had admitted firing two shots, one of which killed Mrs. Sakai. He said the shooting of Mrs. Sakai was accidental.

Nickel, a specialist third class, was with Girard on the firing range at the time of the shooting. He is the prosecution's top American witness.

Girard seemed to startle the judge at one point today.

Girard replied "no, sir" when asked if there were any mistakes in Nickel's testimony.

Banker Predicts Lumber Boom By Next May

PORTLAND — The Oregon Bankers Assn. was told Friday that Oregon's lumber industry will start a climb next May to a period of boom market conditions.

Hillman Lueddeman, vice president of Pope & Talbot, Inc., said the industry will reach its low this winter and some additional mills may close down.

The situation will improve next spring and by 1962 the lumber industry will be booming, he said.

Marion Thomas, extension economist of Oregon State College, said that Oregon farmers will get better returns from a number of the crops in the period ahead. He said the market for dairy products, eggs, turkeys, truck crops, strawberries and potatoes would improve.

Frank M. Warren Jr., president of Portland General Electric, urged support of a campaign to eliminate the public power preference clause for federally built hydroelectric projects. He said this will deprive Oregon of power.

Carl W. Jordan, director of the Oregon State Highway Department, reported on tourist income. L. D. Cosart, president of a Portland auto sales firm, said there was no danger of the market for automobiles becoming saturated. As soon as an American grows up, he wants to get behind the wheel of a car, Cosart said.

ers, journalists and others with definite influence over the populace.

He said the U.S. Information Service is falling down on the job of telling Asians and Africans what the U.S. really is like, and added that "bureaucrats" in Washington "have the knack of not being understood."

Russians Straightforward
On the other hand, said Muzumdar, "the Russians are simple, straightforward language and the people of the world accept what they say."

U.S. embassies overseas, he said, are making the mistake of not joining in to celebrate national or religious holidays and celebrations. Turning the Russian "great psychologists," he said the Soviets take part in such national festivities and gain friends in doing so. As an example, he said the U.S. Embassy in New Delhi, India, was dark during the Indian festival known as the "Festival of the Lights," during which citizens keep lights burning as a symbol of "outgoing" toward the world.

Embassy Lift Up
But the Soviet Embassy in New Delhi was all lit up," he said, quipping, "possibly in more ways than one."

Muzumdar also said that U.S. embassies should see to it that natives celebrate U.S. holidays such as July Fourth and Thanksgiving along with Americans in foreign lands.

He said the gap in policies between Gandhi and present Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru is largely one of spiritual values.

"Nehru does not have that spiritual, religious insight that Gandhi had," Muzumdar said, and therefore for Nehru is more inclined to do things for "expediency" than was Gandhi.

He urged Americans to go overseas and become "citizen ambassadors." As he put it, "One American living abroad can tell our story better than 50 American officials."

FORMER JUDGE BEATEN
NEWPORT, Ore. — Chester N. Anderson, 47, a former Lane County district judge, is in serious condition in a Newport hospital from injuries suffered in a beating in a night club Thursday night.

State police are investigating, but were unable to question Anderson because of his condition.

SALUTES TURKEY
ISTANBUL, Turkey — The Russian cruiser Kuibyshev, carrying Marshal Georgi Zhukov on a visit to Yugoslavia, passed through the rain-shrouded Bosporus today and fired a 21-gun salute to Turkey.

Former Yugoslavia Vice President Gets 7 More Years

SRERMSKA MITROVICA, Yugoslavia. — Milovan Djilas, former vice president of Yugoslavia, was sentenced Saturday to seven additional years in prison for writing hostile propaganda against Communism and the Yugoslav government abroad.

He was brought into court here after a one-day trial Friday—after the penitentiary where he is serving a prison sentence of three years for a similar offense. The court decided to connect his previous sentence and Saturday's into a new sentence of nine years.

The maximum sentence could have been 20 years.

The specific charges against him Friday arose from publication of a book in the United States called "The New Class." He told the court he stands by every word of what he wrote. In the book, Djilas said Communism, like capitalism, creates an elite class.

Djilas, 46, was once considered in Yugoslavia to be a top ranking leader second only to Tito.

He arrived at court wearing a blue suit. He had a pallor characteristic for prison inmates and a very short haircut.

He listened unmoved to the sentence, which he has the right to appeal to the Supreme Court of the Province of Vojvodina.

Unander Would Return \$60 Million Taxes

PORTLAND — A special session of the Legislature should give Oregon a \$60 million dollar tax refund, State Treasurer Sig Unander said here this week.

Legislators, called into special session later this month, should meet only briefly and concentrate on tax reduction, Unander told a conference of the Oregon Bankers Assn.

Gov. Robert D. Holmes called the session to deal with an estimated 70 million dollar surplus the state is expected to have by next summer under the present tax program.

"Give the taxpayer maximum relief," the treasurer said. "If approximately 10 million dollars was considered sufficient cushion by the governor and Legislature in May why not the same figure in November?" he asked.

The 10 million dollars was the original estimated surplus, but now this has been boosted to 70 millions.

Unander said he gathered from newspaper reports that Gov. Holmes wants the Legislature to cut six million dollars from the personal income tax and do some increased spending.

"Now is the time for less, not more, government spending," Unander told the bankers.

Others scheduled to address the conference were Richard E. Mann, secretary of the state Tax Commission, and William E. Bade, manager of Oregon Tax Research.

GUARANTEES SUSPENDED
BUENOS AIRES — The government today announced that constitutional guarantees have been suspended in the Buenos Aires area in a move to check spreading labor unrest. About 150 leaders of recent labor strikes were reported under arrest.

DIES IN FIRE
ALBANY, Ore. — John Maxwell, 70, a retired railroad worker, apparently died in the fire which destroyed his cabin near the east city limits of Albany Friday.

Cause of the fire was not determined. The body was recovered inside the charred cabin.

DRIVER IN JAIL
In the court jail until he can pay a \$50 fine for driving without an operator's license is Joe Estep Covey, 18, 1833 Short St., Roseburg. The fine was imposed on Covey, a logger, by District Judge Warren Woodruff.

Unusual Sets Used For Play About Young Ben

Three sets, described as "the most ambitious and beautiful yet used" in any production of Children's Theater of the West, will be the backdrop tonight when the play "Young Ben, Printer" is presented at Roseburg Central Junior High School.

Tickets for the 7:30 production, sponsored by the Roseburg chapter of the American Assn. of University Women, will be available at the door.

The sets consist of a family "keeping room" in early Colonial Boston, a cove on the New England Coast and the print shop of an early newspaper, the New England Courant.

The backdrops were designed and painted by Richard Mier of Sacramento, Calif. His set designs reportedly have been on display from San Francisco to New York.

A new type of theatrical design will be used which includes the use of aluminum sets. Use of the light metal cuts the weight of the sets from the 500-pound weight required for traditional staging to a mere 200 pounds.

The action concerns an incident in the boyhood of Benjamin Franklin.

Korean Woman Shot And Killed In 3rd Incident

SEOUL — The U. S. Army said today that a guard had shot and killed a Korean woman found stealing supplies. The announcement came as the Korean press denounced "senseless shootings by American soldiers."

The Army Pvt. Ronald Smith of Chicago fatally shot 23-year-old Yi Chung soon before dawn today at Camp Casey.

Smith surprised a group of Koreans removing supplies from the U. S. Army engineer compound. The Army said the man and Smith fired. Smith told investigators he fired only after the Koreans ignored his repeated warnings.

Four Koreans later were caught and turned over to Korean police. One was wounded in the upper left arm.

The incident was the third fatal shooting by U. S. soldiers within three days.

SP. 3. Raymond L. Bailey of Brownsburg, Ind., killed a Korean boy while guarding bus cars Oct. 3, the Army said. It also reported that M. Sgt. Joseph E. Woodin of Fayetteville, N. C., fatally wounded a Korean woman Thursday in a hunting accident near the village of Jaju.

Massive Rock Slide Kills 3 In Washington

About 40, of Roslyn, Wash., was recovered Friday night and crews worked cautiously Saturday to find the bodies of the two other victims. Clarence Sluder, 35, a highway department road crew foreman, and Carson R. Mundis, 44, of Yakima, Wash., a truck driver.

Extreme care had to be taken lest the 50-foot high slide start moving again. No start on clearing the highway could be made until the bodies all are recovered.

Snow began falling in the Cascades Saturday morning, threatening to delay the rescue and clearing work.

Without Warning
The slide broke loose without warning at 5:09 p.m. Friday along a stretch where the highway was being widened to four lanes and traffic was limited to one-way travel. The regular work crew had quit four hours earlier, but some maintenance men still were on duty.

Some of Yakima, survived by diving behind an 8-foot boulder. His doctor at Cle Elum, 15 miles from the slide scene, said he was bruised from head to toe but apparently suffered no broken bones and was "doing real well."

The workman near Sauve, Duke Wright, 45, also of Yakima, escaped by diving underneath a power shovel.

A score or more motorists were saved from possible death because an alert flagman saw dust spilling from the mountainside and trees "swaying in a crazy pattern."

Killed by the grinding chunks of rock were Clarence Sluder, 35, a State Highway Department road foreman; Knute Johnson, about 40, and Carson R. Mundis, 44, a truck driver. The injured man is Ed Sauve, 45.

Eisenhower said in a statement addressed to the newsboys: "In appreciation of your faithful service to the public, your friends set aside one day each year in your honor. This year, on Saturday, Oct. 5th, I am happy to join them again in paying tribute to your enterprise."

Survivors include the widow, Carolla; son, Stanley; father, Alvin; mother, Trina; brother, Ben, and sister, Mrs. B. Bocanar.

Forest Service Sells Timber

Umpqua Forest timber sales personnel managed to sell a tract of timber Friday they had been unable to sell before, but couldn't get rid of at a regularly-scheduled sale.

Sold was a tract of 3,100,000 board feet on 48 acres in the Little River Ranger District 43 miles east of Roseburg. Buyer was E. T. Cone Logging Co. of Roseburg which paid the appraised price of \$56,520.

The tract contained 2,400,000 board feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$18.10 and 700,000 feet of western hemlock and other species appraised at \$5.35.

Meanwhile, the sale scheduled for Friday drew no bidders. It is 5,800,000 feet of timber located 30 miles northeast of Glendale on 136 acres. The tract, containing 5,400,000 board feet of Douglas fir and pine, is appraised at \$104,570.

The tract was held open by the Forest Service to be sold at the appraised price for a period of time as was the tract which sold Friday.
