Durden, Francis Lead OSC To Win

EVANSTON, Ill. — Oregon State College, defending football champion of the Pacific Coast Conference, sped to a 22-13 victory Saturday over penalty-plagued Northwestern.

Halfbacks Earnel Durden and Joe Francis accounted for all of Oregon State's touchdowns. Oregon State held a 15-0 lead before Northwestern broke loose for its first touchdown. That was a 16-yard pass from sophomore quarterback John Talley to rookie end Fred Williamson near the TD line in the third quarter.

Northwestern's other TD came in the third period on a 79-yard run by halfback Ron Burton, also a sophomore.

Oregon State clinched its third win of the season with a 58-yard march in six plays in the fourth quarter. The advance was aided by a 15-yard personal foul infraction against Northwestern. It was one of six 15-yard penalties imposed on the home team. Northwestern lost 115 yards Saturday on penalties.

Co-starring for Oregon State with Durden was halfback Joe Francis. A 38-yard pass from Francis to Durden gave Oregon State its first TD and a 10-yard run by Francis accounted to the second first period touchdown.

Ted Seagle, who missed the first two conversion attempts, booted a field goal in the second quarter from the Northwestern 16.

Huskies Look Good In Losing 35-7 Tilt

SEATTLE — The University of Washington Huskies looked good during the first half of Saturday's game here against Ohio State, but an attack of fumbleitis in the second half sent them down to a 35-7 defeat.

The score was tied at halftime, 7-7. Washington had driven 87 yards in 17 plays in the second period for the first score of the game. Before the period was over the Buckeyes had matched it.

Early in the second half Dom Sutherland broke the tie with a weaving 81-yard punt return. Before the third period was over Ohio State had scored again, and two more TDs were pushed over in the final quarter. Sutherland made four conversions. Ernie Spychalski made the fifth.

Ohio State led on nearly all the statistics—290 yards gained rushing to 161 for Washington, 63 yards gained passing to 60; 7 of 12 passes completed to 3 of 8; and 29 first downs to 8.

Washington's Coach Jim Owens said he hopes his team will play the full game at Los Angeles next Saturday against UCLA the way it played the first half of Saturday's game here against Ohio State.

Hawks Tip Cougars In 20-13 Contest

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Iowa grabbed a Washington State fumble on the Hawks 46 and drove 54 yards in 11 plays for the winning touchdown with four minutes left in their football game Saturday and a 20-13 victory.

Alex Karras, All-America tackle, who had recovered Bob Newnam's fumble, made the conversion.

Washington State's Cougars tried desperately for another score, but were driven back and lost the ball on their 29. Iowa played it safe with conservative ground maneuvers.

At one time last week 27 Iowa players were afflicted by the flu. But it wasn't apparent in the way the Hawks played. They grabbed a 13-0 lead early in the first half, getting touchdowns in both the first and second periods.

Then Washington State, with Bunny Aldrich completing four passes for 50 yards, scored its first TD with 19 seconds to go in the half on an Aldrich to Don Ellersick eight-yard pass in the end zone. The second TD came on the first play of the final period.

The upstart and unbeaten Baltimore Colts and Cleveland Browns Monday were a step ahead of a logjam of eight National Football League teams.

The Colts pace the Western Conference and the Browns the Eastern Conference with 2-0 records. The rest of the league is virtually in one big second place tie after weekend play.

Sunday's results compounded the tangle as last week's losers turned on the winners. The Detroit Lions defeated the previously unbeaten Green Bay Packers 24-14; Washington's rookies powered the Redskins to a 37-14 triumph over the Chicago Cardinals, and the San Francisco 49ers reversed a lopsided exhibition performance and whipped the Los Angeles Rams 23-20. All six teams have 1-1 records.

The New York Giants, defending champions, evened their record Saturday night, winning their first game, 24-20, against winless Philadelphia. In other Saturday games, Cleveland moved into familiar first place quarters after overpowering Pittsburgh 23-12 and the Colts repeated a 1956 upset of the troubled Chicago Bears 21-10.
