Homeless Child To Get Million Dollar Program

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—A television show with a million-dollar cast goes on the air today for an audience of one—a sick little boy. It will be just about the biggest birthday party a youngster ever had.

Today is the ninth birthday of "Little Boy Blue," who is seriously ill of muscular dystrophy in Lakeville, Mass. Hospital. He is known to the public by that name only.

He was homeless and friendless when he became ill. His father is in prison for murdering his mother.

Comedian Jerry Lewis heard of an appeal for cards to ease the boy's loneliness. He decided "Little Boy Blue" ought to have more than cards for his birthday and the idea snowballed.

Jerry, who is national chairman of the Muscular Dystrophy Assn., asked Gen. David Sarnoff, head of NBC-RCA, for a closed television circuit linking NBC studios in Burbank, Calif., with the hospital room.

At 4:30 p.m. "Little Boy Blue" will have his birthday party. Performing just for him and singing "Happy Birthday" will be Lewis, Eddie Fisher, Eddie Cantor, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Hugh (Wyatt Earp) O'Brien, Jim (Gumshoe) Arness, Walt Disney's Mouseketeers, the Skylarks, a singing group, and an 18-piece orchestra.

Former State Police Officer Here Succumbs

A former Oregon State Police officer stationed in Roseburg and a native of Sutherlin, Roy M. O'Mara, is reported to have died in Reno, Nev., Sunday night.

District Court To Be Humming Next Monday

It will be a busy day in district court Monday.

Dozen cases have been set for trial for that day by Judge Warren A. Woodruff. Unless a number of the defendants request jury trials, his work will be cut out for him.

Five persons charged with vagrancy appeared before the judge Monday. They, along with a 15-year-old Roseburg girl, were arrested by deputy sheriffs Sunday after a highspeed chase from Roseburg to the Winston area.

The young girl was turned over to juvenile authorities, and the others were arraigned in district court. All pleaded innocent except Gale Hardy Carlson, 23, Roseburg. However, he changed his plea this morning and will appear for trial Monday.

we have even more things up our sleeves. You can't send human flesh and blood to fight things like that."

Like American Report
Osborne, who said he talked with President Eisenhower in the United States two months ago, said that what Khrushchev told them about rocket weapons "sounded almost exactly like what American officials told me when I visited Redstone Arsenal in Alabama two months ago."

Khrushchev, Osborne added, had described rockets which they said they could throw across the world with great accuracy. They could cover 3,000 miles and hit a baseball field.

Osborne said he had no comment on this.

At an East German embassy dinner Monday night, the party chief boasted Soviet scientific advances had made war planes obsolete and warned Turkey against warring on Syria.

He told the banquet some people scoffed when Russia announced it had successfully tested an intercontinental missile, and added:

President Briefed On Russian Moon, Plans Of U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower was briefed by government scientists Tuesday on Russia's launching of a satellite and on U.S. plans to put a "baby moon" into outer space.

After the hour-long session, presidential press secretary James C. Hagerty said in reply to a question that so far as he knows the President received no information which would lead to a speed up in this country's satellite program.

Present plans call for launching of a U.S. satellite early next year.

Eisenhower was briefed by Dr. Alan Waterman, director of the National Science Foundation, and Donald Quarles, deputy secretary of defense.

Waterman has overall direction of Project Vanguard, this country's satellite launching program. Quarles is an expert in the missile field.

Refuses Details
Hagerty steadfastly refused to provide any detail whatever regarding the specific nature of the briefing, Eisenhower got.

The press secretary said he preferred to let the President discuss the matter himself at his news conference Wednesday.

In addition to Waterman and Quarles, two other government scientists sat in on the meeting with the President.

At one point during his meeting with newsmen, Hagerty noted that he had said Saturday that Russia's launching of a satellite came as no surprise to the U.S. government. He also said then that this country's satellite program was proceeding on schedule. In reply to questions Tuesday, Hagerty declined to elaborate on those statements.

Fire Prevention Week Under Way

Fire prevention week is now under way and the Roseburg Fire Dept. expressed hope today everyone will cooperate in keeping down the fire rate.

Firemen are visiting local schools daily during the week to impress the importance of fire prevention on children. The fire dept. is passing out home fire safety check lists at the schools and the class at each school that returns the most check lists to the department will receive a certificate of merit at a later date.

"Get out of the house the minute you discover a fire or suspect one, and get everyone else out at the same time," warns Fire Chief W. E. Mills, adding, "Everyone should memorize this and other life safety rules about fire because they're your best guarantee of surviving a fire in your home."

Accused Man Ordered To State Hospital

Claimed to be an alcoholic, Robert Eugene Curtis, 20, Rt. 1 Box 170E, Roseburg, a laborer, was committed to the state hospital at Salem Monday by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

Curtis had faced two criminal counts — larceny from a person and probation violation. The first charge stemmed from an arrest made by Roseburg police Oct. 2 when Jack B. Applegate, Rt. 3 Box 685, Roseburg, claimed his wallet was lifted from his pocket by Curtis. Applegate allegedly caught Curtis in the act of taking the wallet.

A probation violation charge also was filed against Curtis. He had been granted probation last December after receiving a three-year prison term for a burglary conviction.

Glendale Asks County To Aid Street Design

A decision was made at the Glendale City Council meeting held last night to call in Fred Darby, county surveyor, to do the necessary surveying work for a proposed extension of Railroad Avenue in Glendale. Arlet Smith, city recorder, was to contact him today, according to Mrs. Gerald Fox, News-Review correspondent.

After the surveying is completed, right of way will be procured for the extension. Verbal promises have already been made for procurement of the right of way, but nothing official can be done until surveying is complete.

Democrats Make New Inroads Into Connecticut

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—Connecticut Democrats made further inroads into small towns, once considered almost unassailable Republican territory, in Tuesday's municipal elections, and held two cities they already controlled.

Torrington and Bristol, medium sized, heavily industrial communities, remained Democratic, although by smaller margins than in 1955.

Those two cities and 124 towns elected municipal officials. Six other city elections will be held Nov. 5.

On the basis of unofficial returns, 10 towns switched from Republican to Democratic control; 5 switched the other way, one by only one vote; 80 towns remained in the Republican ranks, and 34 remained Democratic. Two elections were held on a nonpartisan basis.

Maloney Trial Defense Attorney Cautions Jury

PORTLAND (AP)—Jury selection to try Thomas E. Maloney on a bribe conspiracy charge continued Tuesday with the panel cautioned that trial witnesses "don't come from the Portland Ministerial Assn."

Indeed, said defense attorney Howard Lonergan in going beyond that statement from Assistant Atty. Gen. Elliott Cummins, some of the state witnesses will turn up with "abominable" records. He agreed some defense witnesses may have records, too.

Maloney, a former Spokane and Seattle race track clerk, once worked as an undercover investigator for William Langley, who then was Multnomah County (Portland) district attorney. Langley was ousted on conviction of failure to prosecute gamblers.

Maloney is charged with being in a conspiracy to take a bribe in connection with efforts to open up the city to gambling.

Elkins Name Mentioned
Racketeer Big Jim Elkins got into the trial quickly. As prospective jurors were questioned at the opening of the trial Monday, Lonergan said Maloney had been an informer for the district attorney. Could not witness see from this, he asked, how Maloney would earn the enmity of Elkins, particularly if he informed on Elkins' illegal activities?

It was Elkins who touched off the vice investigation—Maloney came—by telling the Oregonian that Seattle gamblers were plotting to move down here.

This led in turn to a year-long investigation of charges of vice and corruption in which the underworld, officials of the Teamsters Union, and elected officials all were involved.
