The commission said a number of exceptions have been filed to the decision announced July 23 by examiner Edward B. Marsh.

Portland Zoo Director On Quest For Penguins

PORTLAND (AP) — Zoo director Jack Marks will leave here Tuesday for the Antarctic, where he hopes to capture 20 Emperor penguins for the Portland Zoo.

Marks said the penguins will be flown back to the United States by the Military Air Transport Service. He said the penguin-gathering trip will take about a month.

A house now is being built at the zoo here to house the penguins, which weigh 95 pounds and are four feet tall, when fully grown. Marks estimated the house will cost \$50,000.

No freezer will be needed for the penguins on the trip here from their chilly homeland, Marks said. The penguins will be kept cool by a fine mist or fog sprayed over them, he said.

Penguins are susceptible to respiratory diseases, Marks said, and if they become ill, they will be treated with antibiotics.

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
