

Worst Fish-Count In Years Seen Under Present Status

Unless current rains raise water levels and result in a speed-up of fish movement at the fish counting station at Winchester dam, the 1957 season will be entered on the records as the poorest of recent years.

Observers are of the opinion that the summer drouth, causing low water and high temperature, was in part responsible for the drop in migration for spring and summer species. Recent rains have raised the water level and lowered the temperature, which may cause an increased movement of steelheads and silver salmon.

The spring chinook salmon migration is near an end, according to the twice-monthly report from the Oregon Game Commission's regional office at Roseburg. No spring fish were tallied during the last two weeks of September. Inasmuch as spawning now is in progress, it is not expected that any large number of salmon will be counted during the remainder of the season. The spring chinook run this year is believed to have suffered considerable damage by flood as migrants were en route to the ocean four years ago.

The summer steelhead run is holding at about an average, picking up slightly during the latter part of September after a drop for the first half of the month.

Silver salmon movement still is slow.

A few fall chinook salmon have been tallied, but no indication of the size of the run has yet been gained.

Infield Hit Results In Milwaukee Victory

MILWAUKEE — Sunday, a smudge of shoe polish.

Yesterday, a slow bounding ball about 15 feet wide of first base. Both, at the time, seemed insignificant.

But both helped the Braves to a pair of victories over the Yankees in the World Series.

The smudge enabled Nippy Jones to prove he had been nicked by a pitched ball and thus opened the gates for the Braves' 10th-inning rally and 7-5 victory Sunday.

The bounce, handled cleanly, if not fast enough by second baseman Jerry Coleman, set up the only run of the fifth game and led to a 1-0 decision for Lew Burdette and the Braves.

Eddie Mathews hit the ball with two out in the sixth inning and beat it out on a close play at first. Singles by Hank Aaron and Joe Adcock moved Mathews around with the run that gave the Braves a 3-2 edge in the series.

"I blew it," Coleman said afterwards in the Yankees' clubhouse. "I played it badly. I should have taken one step in. He fooled me with his speed. He should have been out."

Ailments May Keep Mick Mantle Sidelined

NEW YORK — It was a grim —almost heartbroken — Mickey Mantle who returned here today with an ailing shoulder that could keep him out the remainder of the World Series.

His bad leg had been coming around and the star New York Yankees' outfielder had thought he was about ready to start operating at full blast.

"That's what makes it so tough," he said. "Just when my leg was coming around nicely and I felt I could run at top speed, this has to happen."

His right shoulder was hurt in Saturday's game when Bob Buhl threw low to Red Schoendienst trying to pick him off second. Reaching for the throw, Schoendienst jammed his knee into Mantle's shoulder.

He had to pull himself out of yesterday's game against the Milwaukee Braves. He can't throw or bat without sharp pain.

Manager Casey Stengel hasn't given up hope of playing Mantle in tomorrow's sixth game.

Sanders was exposed to this melancholy sight again and again while his Bruins were whipped 21-0 by Oregon last Saturday night at Portland, he told the weekly meeting of the Football Writers Assn. Monday.

And the Westwood fox placed some of the blame on the UCLA coaching staff.

"We coaches... overstuffed a green, inexperienced team with too many defenses in preparation for Oregon," Sanders told the writers.

"I got the team together in the dressing room and told them to take a shower, wash it off and forget it," said Sanders, whose Bruins face Washington here Saturday in Memorial Coliseum.

Another sad-eyed coach was young Don Clark, whose University of Southern California Trojans have yet to win a game this season.

"I expected problems before the season started, but the problems have exceeded my expectations," Clark said.
