MacLaren School Youth Saves 2nd From Drowning

SALEM — Jerry Griffin of Redmond, 17, MacLaren School boy, rescued an unidentified 7-year-old lad from the waters of the Necanicum River in Seaside Sunday, a school official said.

Griffin and several other MacLaren boys from the school's camp at Manzanita were in Seaside to attend church services when the incident occurred.

The boys were heading to their bus after church when they heard the youngster screaming for help in the river.

Witnesses said the boy fell from a small boat, and when he tried to grab it, the boat capsized. The MacLaren youth ran 40 yards to a bridge over the spot and plunged to the lad's aid. As the boy screamed for help in the 12-foot-deep river, Griffin brought him to shore.

Ray Rich, director of the camp, described Griffin as an average swimmer and added the 7-year-old could not swim.

Rich said the boy was in good condition and did not require artificial respiration.

Gasoline Prices Still Under Coos Bay Probe

COOS BAY — This city's port commission Monday said it will continue its investigation of wholesale gasoline prices here.

The commission said major oil companies here charge 1.8 cents a gallon more than in Portland. The commission said water shipping time here from the major refineries is 48 hours less than to Portland.

If the major oil companies do not disclose why the rates are higher, the commission said, it may ask for an investigation by Congress.

Negro Mother Campaigns To End Racial Bitterness

PHILADELPHIA — A campaign to help the victims of teenage violence and to rid the city of racial bitterness gathered force today.

Public agencies and aroused individuals, white and Negro, joined in an expressed determination to end "these senseless fights before more young people are hurt."

The quoted words are those of Mrs. Clara Baldwin, a Negro in her late 40s with a family of her own and a strong sense of social responsibility.

Mrs. Baldwin, cheered on by city officials and welfare groups earlier this week started canvassing her North Philadelphia neighborhood to raise money for the family of Billy Fluck, 15-year-old white boy, who was stabbed in an attack upon him by several Negro youths. The boy's spinal column was all but severed by a knife, causing paralysis of both legs. Doctors fear he may never walk again.

Living only a few blocks from the Flucks, Mrs. Baldwin said she was horrified by what had happened. In less than three days, she and her husband Thomas rallied to their efforts more than 100 volunteer solicitors, most of them Negroes.

About 35 canvassers gathered in the Baldwin home last night and reckoned up about \$100 in contributions. Approximately the same amount was raised the night before.

Mrs. Baldwin said one young Negro housewife contributed all she had — 36 cents. One of the volunteers is an elderly blind woman, who goes from door to door, led by a friend.

The Citizens Committee against Juvenile Delinquency and their Cause, a large and influential Negro agency, announced last night that it fully backs what Mrs. Baldwin and her associates are doing.
