

U. S. Set For Multi-Nation Talks On Missile Controls

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — The United States declared Thursday it is ready to begin multi-nation talks immediately on steps to harness space missiles for peace.

The statement was made by Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge as the U. N.'s 82-nation Political Committee plunged into debate on disarmament.

Lodge asserted the United States was willing to separate the discussion of space missiles from the general disarmament debate and proceed with it independently.

The U. S. delegate reminded the committee that the United States ten years ago took the initiative in proposing international control of atomic energy. If this proposal had been accepted, he said, widespread international anxiety could have been avoided.

Lodge told the committee international control of the "newest devices of science—outer space missiles"—was urgent because they were either restricted to peaceful uses "or they can be used to blow us to bits," he added.

"We already know that the prospect of an outer space missile armed with a nuclear warhead is too dangerous to ignore."

On other phases of the disarmament problem, Lodge said:

1. The United States would agree to suspend nuclear tests only after

the Russians had agreed in principle to other related matters, including a ban on the production and stockpiling of atomic and hydrogen weapons.

2. The United States is ready to halt the production of fissionable materials for weapons purposes and to reduce its armed forces as soon as proper safeguards can be set up to prevent surprise attacks.

Lodge was followed by Japanese Ambassador Kato Matsudaira who formally presented a proposal for suspension of nuclear tests.

The committee adjourned after hearing Lodge and Matsudaira and scheduled an afternoon meeting to hear the Soviet Union's main declaration.

National Guard Units To Get Nike Missiles

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army announced this week that National Guard units which have been manning conventional anti-aircraft guns guarding the nation's cities will be equipped with Nike guided missiles as soon as training of guardsmen can be completed.

At present, Guard units man 101 batteries of World War II gun equipment in ten states including California and Washington.

Nike installations now are operated by regular Army units.

The Army said the majority of members of National Guard Nike units will receive training at Army Nike sites in their home areas.

Polio Victim Becomes Portland's Top Citizen

PORTLAND (AP) — A bank employee who was stricken with polio when he was 17 was named Portland's Citizen of the Week Wednesday.

Patrick Rogers, 26, also received a scroll for the part he is playing in observance of National Employ the Handicapped Week.

Rogers is in the accounting department of the Portland Trust Bank.

'Moonwatch' Spots Rocket Of Satellite

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — A moonwatch team here spotted the Russian satellite Sputnik's third stage rocket Thursday in the first such sighting in the United States.

Two men atop the New Haven State Teachers College building saw the rocket at 5:23 a.m. (EST) as it moved in the sky some 650 miles behind Sputnik itself.

Gave Final Push

The rocket, larger than Sputnik, was used to give the satellite a final push that sent it spinning around the earth. Observers consider both it and Sputnik as earth satellites. Sputnik still hasn't been seen in this country.

"It looked like a star moving across the heavens," said James Plato, the first man to see the rocket. He is a telephone equipment engineer and an amateur astronomer for 20 years.

"It could not have been seen with the naked eye, but appeared to be about as bright as a third magnitude star," Plato said. "It was in our field of vision for 30 or 40 seconds. It seemed to be moving slowly."

Spokane Misses

(The two moonlets escaped the spying eyes of the Spokane, Wash. moonwatch team.)

(The team had been advised by the Smithsonian Institution's Astrophysical Observatory at Cambridge, Mass., that Sputnik would pass over Spokane in the half light dawn at 5:34 a.m. (PST).)

(The observers, stationed at a farm owned by Preston Adler at Peone Prairie, near Spokane, had all seven of its telescope stations manned in an effort to catch a glimpse of the objects, to no avail.)

(Adler said they scanned the heavens until after 6 a.m. without sighting them.)

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Offutt Air Force Base officials identified the victims of a T33 jet trainer crash Wednesday night as Maj. Dan E. Baker, 40, Wenatchee, Wash., and Capt. Leslie L. Lundberg, 36, San Bernardino, Calif.

They were killed in Iowa about 10 miles east of here when the trainer crashed while making an instrument approach to the Offutt base.

Ghana Minister Breakfasts With Ike And Gets Apology

WASHINGTON (AP) — The finance minister of the Negro republic of Ghana had breakfast with President Eisenhower Thursday and received a personal apology from the chief executive for a Delaware restaurant's refusal to serve him because of his color.

It "makes up for what happened," the minister, K. E. Gbedemah, said as he left the White House.

Gbedemah, talking with reporters on the front portico of the White House, made reference twice to a personal apology from Eisenhower. He said the President was "a little worried" over the snub in Dover, Del., last Monday evening.

Quotes Ike

Gbedemah quoted Eisenhower as saying there are "little things like that all over the place and you don't know where they're going to blow up or when."

He also said he enjoyed the breakfast of bacon and eggs.

Vice President Nixon also was a guest at the one-hour breakfast session. One reason was that Nixon was entertained at lunch at Gbedemah's home in Ghana last March on the occasion of the celebration of the former British Gold Coast colony's independence. Gbedemah had mentioned that fact in connection with the Dover incident. Nixon also entertained the 44-year-old Ghana official in his home here last month.

Gbedemah postponed his departure for Ghana to attend the White House breakfast.

Discusses Other Things

Gbedemah said the President discussed a lot of other things about Ghana and expressed an interest in the new country's development.

Bill Sutherland, an American Negro from Glen Ridge, N.J., who is personal secretary to Gbedemah, told reporters the owner of the Howard Johnson chain of restaurants — the Dover restaurant was operating under a Howard Johnson franchise — called personally on Gbedemah at his New York hotel Wednesday night and apologized for the incident.

Sutherland said "there is a great reservoir of good will toward America in Ghana and I don't think one incident like this will offset it."

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Judge Rules For Truckers In Suit Against Railroads, Gives Firms 18 Cents Each

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — U.S. District Judge Thomas J. Clary ruled in favor of trucking interests Thursday in their multi-million dollar suit against the railroads.

The federal jurist dismissed a counter suit brought by a group of Eastern railroads against trucking firms. Judge Clary declined to award the truckers the 250 million dollars they had sought from the railroads, contending a conspiracy to drive them out of business. Instead the jurist granted each of 37 trucking firms 18 cents in nominal damages.

Follows By Year

The court ruling came just a year and 10 days after the suit brought by the Assn. and the trucking firms went on trial here. The trial also combined a counter 120 million dollar damage suit against the truckers by the railroads, charging a similar conspiracy in detriment of trade. The dual trial lasted four months, after which Judge Clary had reserved decision.

Judge Clary decreed that any damages decided on in favor of the truckers would have to be paid in the ratio of 80 per cent by the railroads and 20 per cent by Carl Byoir and Associates, New York public relations firm which handled the railroad account during

their long struggle with the truckers.

Conspiracy Charged

The truckers had contended that the railroads, through an advertising campaign and by means of a lobbying program at the state capital, Harrisburg, sought to deprive the trucking interests of the opportunity to do freight business.

The railroads countered with the charge that the truckers sought through a campaign of "vilification" to adversely affect the railroad freight business and gain it for themselves.

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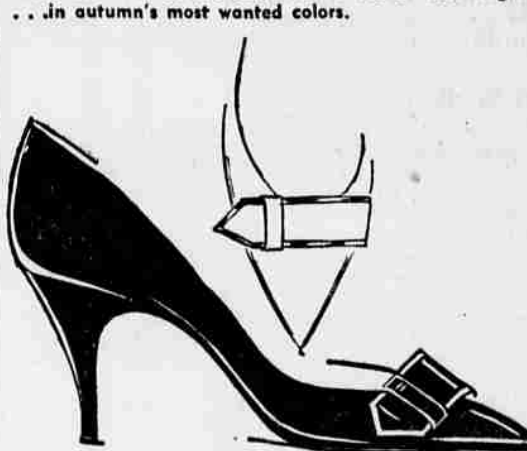
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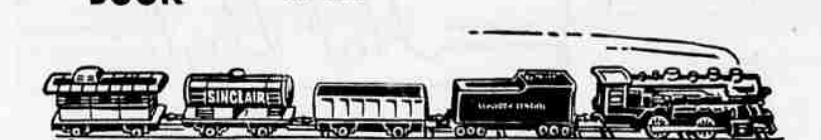
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
