

Senators Reject Khrushchev Charge Of Promoting War

WASHINGTON — Two senators rejected as unworthy of investigation today Nikita Khrushchev's charge that this country tried to push Turkey into a war with Syria.

The Communist party boss made the charge in an interview published Thursday by the New York Times. He suggested the Senate question Secretary of State Dulles under oath about this country's moves in the Middle East.

Sen. Mansfield (Mont.), assistant Democratic Senate leader and a member of the Foreign Relations Committee, said Khrushchev's charges "are without foundation and completely false."

Sen. Wiley (Wis.), senior Republican on the committee, said in a separate interview that Khrushchev was again proving he is "the master provocateur of our time."

The State Department also has called the charges "completely unfounded."

Khrushchev said Dulles sent Loy W. Henderson, deputy undersecretary of state, to Jordan and Iraq with instructions to incite them against Syria after leftist officers took control of Syria's armed forces last August.

Failing in this, Khrushchev said, Dulles then had Henderson apply pressure on Turkey, an American-armed ally, to attack Syria.

Maloney Defense Tries To Ban Tape Recordings

PORTLAND — The defense for Thomas E. Maloney tried Friday to ban tape recordings from his trial on a bribe conspiracy charge.

Raymond F. Clark, a former employee of Portland racketeer Jim Elkins, was questioned Thursday about the recordings, made after Elkins' employees planted a microphone in Maloney's apartment. Clark is a prosecution witness.

Clark said he believed Maloney's was one of the voices he heard in the recordings. He said he thought others were those of William Langley, former Multnomah County district attorney, for whom Maloney once was an undercover investigator, and Joseph P. McLaughlin, an ex-Seattle cardroom owner.

Bribe conspiracy charges also are pending against Langley and McLaughlin. They are accused of scheming with Maloney to open up Portland to gambling.

The jury was excused Thursday while attorneys and newsmen listened to the recordings on headphones. A loudspeaker also blared them out. Clark said the voices sounded like those of Maloney, McLaughlin and Langley.

Circuit Judge Martin Hawkins said he would listen Friday to arguments on a motion by Howard Loneragan, Maloney's attorney, that the jury should not be allowed to listen to the recordings in its deliberation.

McClellan Says Beck Dictated

WASHINGTON — Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.) says the Dave Beck enabled James R. Hoffa to win election as president of the Teamsters by dictating disregard of the union's constitution.

Hoffa, 44-year-old Detroit labor leader, was elected by a 3-1 margin last week at the Teamsters convention in Miami Beach, Fla.

McClellan, chairman of the Senate Rackets Committee, said records of the convention's Credentials Committee "reveal some situations which are just plain scandalous."

The committee subpoenaed the records immediately after Hoffa's election. It is inquiring into charges that delegates had been hand-picked to rig the election for Hoffa, as alleged in a court action which sought unsuccessfully to block the election.

Stock Market Suffers Severe Slump Thursday

NEW YORK — A sudden buying wave in aircraft and oils halted a fresh decline in the stock market Friday. By mid-afternoon the market hovered in delicate balance between gains of a few cents a share to as much as \$4. Losers were mostly small and fast disappearing.

Activity in aircraft was touched off by published reports that the Air Force apparently successfully launched a missile at its Florida base, Douglas Aircraft, which has the prime contract for building the missile, soared more than \$6 a share before settling back. Other companies engaged in similar work moved over to the advancing side. These include General Dynamics, North American Aviation, Boeing and Martin.

Standard issues were knocked down \$1 to \$3 a share Thursday in a sell-off which wiped about five billion dollars off the quoted value of stocks listed on the New York Stock exchange.

The shakeout occurred on the second anniversary of the third "Blue Monday" following President Eisenhower's heart attack. That was Oct. 10, 1955.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dropped \$4 to \$159.70, for its biggest decline since that "Blue Monday." The average was at its lowest level in 2½ years.

Trading was heaviest of the year despite the World Series game, which ordinarily would have been expected to reduce turnover during the afternoon.

Brokers attributed the drop to an assortment of bearish news from various fields. They mentioned layoffs and cutbacks in industry, including the furloughing of 4,000 workers by the Pennsylvania Railroad. They also voiced concern over the outlook in the Middle East.

Kidnap Slayer Found In Heart Of Mexico

JUAREZ, Mexico — Joe Franco, 24, charged with the rape slaying of a 5-year-old Roswell, N. M., girl, was captured Thursday on the farm of a relative just outside Torreón, deep in the heart of Mexico.

Announcement of the capture came from Police Inspector Domingo Holguin of Juarez.

Officers who arrested Franco said he admitted the crime, the inspector said.

Franco has been sought by the police of two nations for the kidnap slaying of 5-year-old Sandra Jo Lucero of Roswell.

The child was kidnapped from her home near Roswell early Sunday. Her body was found Monday night.

Ottawa Ready To Greet Queen

OTTAWA — This capital of Canada, its population mushrooming overnight to almost twice its normal 200,000, is a bustling, decked and excited city on the eve of the arrival of Elizabeth II, queen of England, and her husband, Prince Philip, duke of Edinburgh.

The royal plane carrying Britain's Queen will land at nearby Uplands Airport tomorrow afternoon for the beginning of a four-day holiday, prelude to a six-day visit to the United States.

Preparations have been in progress for months.

Five miles of fluttering bunting is strung on government buildings alone. Flags of Canada are brilliant red as they wave throughout the city.

PRO-ACTION MAN DIES

NEWPORT, Ore. — Robert Kenneth Evans, 68, free-lance newspaper advertising and business promotion director, died here Wednesday night of a heart attack.

Evans, whose home was in Beaverton, had directed programs for many Oregon newspapers.

Survivors include the widow, Alice, of Beaverton.

Funeral services will be held at 10:30 a. m. Saturday at Beaverton.

Porter, Neuberger Request End To Cuts In Access Road, Timber Sales Funds

Rep. Charles O. Porter and Sen. Richard L. Neuberger today revealed the text of a telegram they sent Thursday to President Eisenhower calling for the cessation of cuts in access road and timber sales processing funds.

They said the "impoundment" of some \$468,000 by the Budget Bureau will force reduction in Forest Service timber sales in Oregon by 300 million board feet, with the economic impact expected to be felt next year.

"This makes evident that present alarming drops in Oregon's economy will be prolonged with its attendant adverse impact on federal tax revenues, on welfare funds and on such phases of the economy as postal receipts," they said in the telegram.

An opinion that Forest Service budget cuts seriously hurt Oregon and that such recent cuts by the Administration had "kicked Oregon when she was down" was voiced in a joint statement Thursday by Eugene by Rep. Porter and Lane County Commissioner Robert Straub.

The two officials conferred in Portland Wednesday with members of the O & C executive committee, U.S. Forest Service Regional Forester Herbert Stone and the Bureau of Land Management's state director, Virgil Heath, and their staffs.

Chief topics for discussion were the cuts in the U.S. Forest Service budget for access roads and timber sales in Oregon which amounted to nearly half a million dollars. Specifically, the cuts were \$288,000 for access roads and \$180,000 for timber sales processing, Porter said.

More Cuts Said Due

Porter said Thursday that he and the commissioner learned that not only would timber sales be cut this year, but that the effect of the budget cuts would be more drastic next year. Porter said he would take the matter up with Sens. Neuberger and Morse to promote restoration of the cuts.

The congressman and Straub asked BLM Director Heath specifically about the charges by lumbermen in Southwestern Oregon that the cuts would hurt them.

Control Major Producers

The bill would prevent major producer - suppliers from selling their gasoline at wholesale "at any price they might desire," said Baker.

He said only certain stations receive these rebates and added that "many supposedly independent service station operators have been drastically hurt by the discriminatory way these rebates have been granted."

BLIND RIVER, Ont. — A combined reward of \$127,500 drew more guns today into the hunt for two bandits who shot and killed a bank manager here Wednesday.

A posse of 135 men was led by provincial police.

The search began Wednesday morning after J. J. Walters Bridges, 50, was slain in his Royal Bank branch here. The search leader, Sgt. J. K. Brenna, said he believed the killers were still in a wooded region 15 miles from here.

SHOOTS WIFE, SELF

THE DALLIES — Carl Edward Pierson, about 54, The Dallis, died Thursday of bullet wounds inflicted on himself after he shot his ex-wife, Mrs. Alice Pierson.

Detective Ernie Brock said Pierson fired four shots at the woman. Only one hit her, in the hand, Brock said.

Attempt Made To Block Hoffa As President

WASHINGTON — Attorneys for a rank-and-file Teamsters Union group said they intend to apply for a federal court order Friday barring James R. Hoffa from taking office as Teamsters president.

The law firm of Dodd, Kaplan and Schmidt said it will seek the order Friday afternoon from Federal District Court Judge F. Dickinson Lettis.

The firm represents a 13-man teamsters member group from New York City which has a suit pending challenging validity of the recent Teamsters Union convention at Miami Beach, Fla., on grounds delegates were illegally hand-picked to rig the union elections for Hoffa.

The law firm said that besides asking Lettis for an order barring Hoffa from taking over, it will ask the court to hold the Teamsters Union in contempt of court.

This injunction was set aside by the federal Court of Appeals here, with a warning, however, that the union should not go ahead with its convention if illegal delegates were seated.

The plea for a contempt finding against the union will be based on a contention this Appeals Court order was ignored and improperly chosen delegates were seated and allowed to vote for Hoffa and his slate of officers.

Poisoner Dies In Electric Chair

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — A plump, 50-year-old waitress who killed three daughters, her mother and two husbands with rat poison died in the electric chair early today.

She left behind a wish for her body to be turned over to a medical institution. She said she wanted to be buried "where I committed the crimes I have committed."

Mrs. Rhonda Belle Martin died clutching a New Testament in her left hand.

Mrs. Martin was put to death for the poisoning of her fourth husband, Claude C. Martin, in 1951.

After her arrest in March 1956, she signed a statement admitting that she fed rat poison to two of her husbands, three of her children and her mother.

Her fifth husband, Ronald Martin, survived the poisoning, but the other victims died. Ronald Martin is the son of the victim for whose killing the waitress paid with her life.

Neuberger Sees Need For Price, Wage Control

MILWAUKIE, Ore. — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) Thursday night said price, wage and profit controls may be necessary "if we are to retain the purchasing power of our dollars."

Neuberger said "government controls require discipline and they are unpleasant, but people may have to decide whether or not the constant erosion of their pay checks and accounts is not even more unpleasant and undesirable."

He made the comments in a speech to retired federal workers.

21 Nations Call For Renewed Talks On Disarmament

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — Twenty-one nations proposed formally Friday that the U. N. call for renewed talks as soon as feasible toward a disarmament agreement including control of outer space objects.

They submitted a resolution asking the General Assembly to call on the disarmament subcommittee to give priority to reaching such an agreement and report any progress by next April 30.

The resolution said the disarmament agreement should provide for six essentials. These amounted to the proposals Britain, Canada, France and the United States put before the Soviet Union in the subcommittee in London last Aug. 29.

The four Western subcommittee members were among its sponsors. The others were Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Colombia, Cuba, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Honduras, Italy, Laos, Liberia, Netherlands, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru and Tunisia.

Western diplomats were hopeful the Russians soon would accept the proposal to discuss international control of outer space missiles within the framework of the U. N. America is pushing the idea.

Pastor Of Azalea Church Resigns

He and his family will leave early next week for Tillamook where he has accepted the pastorate of the Tillamook Baptist Church. Rev. During the term of Rev. Heinison's service, the church moved from the small building on the L. A. Worley ranch to the Azalea Grange hall. A building property was purchased and work began on erecting a new church. Windows are yet to be installed, but the group has held part of its services in the new building since last summer when it was first occupied by the vacation Bible school classes, reports correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox.

Azalea Community Church has scheduled a Community Night at the Azalea Grange hall Sunday evening.

The evening's program will include the showing of two pictures, "Assignment, Jerusalem," a travelogue, and "The Story Behind a Bottle," a picture on glassmaking. There will be musical numbers, have charge of refreshments.

TESTS ANOTHER BOMB

"Another nuclear test has been conducted in the current Soviet series, the latest test was a small explosion on Oct. 10 at a site north of the Arctic Circle."

Little Rock Quiet, Tension Remains As 3rd Week Ends

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Negro students were escorted into Central High School Friday for the windup of their third class week of integrated education.

The relatively few students on the campus paid little heed to the Negroes as they entered. However, a carload of teen-age white girls hooted "Niggers" as they drove by the front of the school.

Armed soldiers around the massive building bore silent witness that the legal stalemate was unsolved as the first third of the current school semester ended. The Negroes have been attending school under federal troop protection since Sept. 25.

Neither President Eisenhower, who sent federal troops to enforce integration at the school, nor Gov. Orval Faubus, who had called out the Arkansas National Guard to prevent integration, was showing any sign of retreat from diametrically opposed stands.

Faubus has declared that only the withdrawal of the nine Negro students will settle the dispute.

Tomorrow, at least 85 churches in the Little Rock area will hold a special one-hour service to pray for a solution to the crisis.

A number of other Arkansas churches and some outside the state will take part in the Columbus Day service, which begins at 11.

Little Rock clergymen of several different faiths worked together in setting up the special service.

Missile Program, Dollars To Speed It Up Discussed

WASHINGTON — The U. S. missile program and dollars to speed it up were discussed at White House meetings Friday between President Eisenhower and key advisors.

First on the agenda was a half-hour meeting between the President, Secretary of Defense Neil McElroy and William M. Holaday, the Pentagon's missile chief.

Then Eisenhower met with his cabinet. The Pentagon had extra representation. In addition to McElroy, assistant secretary Wilfred J. McNeil, the money controller, and deputy secretary Donald A. Quarles attended.

The White House would not comment officially on the meetings. The Pentagon announced Thursday night it will continue testing on a speed-up basis—two versions of the intercontinental intermediate range ballistic missile. One was developed by the Army, the other by the Air Force.

How soon a decision can be made, a spokesman said, will depend on what future tests show. A choice of one or the other, or a combination of both had been sought within the next few weeks.

Reasons were given for the change of plans except the need for more data. The announcement made no mention of Russia's firing of the first earth satellite, sent aloft by a powerful rocket.

Secretary of Defense Neil McElroy announced last night that he had approved a recommendation to continue testing of the Jupiter and Thor intermediate range ballistic missiles until a better technical basis is established for an IRBM program decision.

Fireball Search Proves Futile

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — A day-long search for some trace of a startling ball of fire that alarmed residents of several Rocky Mountain states proved fruitless Thursday.

Spokesmen at the North American Air Defense Command here and at the Civil Aeronautics Administration in Denver said they are satisfied the object sighted by early morning observers Thursday was a huge meteorite.

Air and ground parties searched a mountainous region all day Thursday east of Mytan, Utah, about 55 miles west of the Colorado-Utah border.

The Air Defense Command spokesman said Air Force searches "are satisfied there is nothing on the ground in the area of supposed impact."

San Marino Communists Surrender To Rivals

SAN MARINO — San Marino's Communist government surrendered its power to a rival anti-Communist regime today, ending 12 years of rule over this tiny republic.

The Communist leadership announced capitulation in a proclamation read in San Marino's village square.

The proclamation said the Communist government had "decided to give up its useless resistance as a sacrifice to the welfare of the state."

Teamwork Needed To Get Necessary Electric Power For U. S., States Seaton

SAN FRANCISCO — Secretary of Interior Seaton said Friday that nearly 100 billion dollars must be spent on new electric power facilities in the next 20 years to meet the nation's skyrocketing power requirements.

The effort must be shared by federal, state and local governments and private investors, he said.

"We have to put every power dollar available from every public and private source to work to build the power plants America will need 20 years from now," Seaton said.

"Otherwise the job can't be done. It's just that simple."

In a speech prepared for an 11-state Young Republican conference, the secretary said federal spending alone would be "too little and too late. Only teamwork will work."

Teamwork Essential

Seaton said the Democrats had favored a "theory of federal preemption of hydroelectric sites" and adhered to a doctrine of federal dams or no dams at all.

But he went on, the Eisenhower administration favors "the principle of teamwork."

"We believe that the federal government should build some new power facilities; the state governments some, local governments some, and private utilities some, each one undertaking projects appropriate to it, in accordance with its ability and with the public good," Seaton said.

The speaker reviewed the controversial proposal for federal development of the Hells Canyon area of the Snake River in the Pacific Northwest. Efforts have been made in several sessions of Congress, including the one this year, to enact a bill providing for a public power dam in Hells Canyon.

Hits Canyon Critics

Idaho Power Co. has been granted authority to construct three Hells Canyon dams and some work is under way.

"The latest proposal for a federal dam," Seaton said, "was simply an attempt to get around the unanimous decision of the bipartisan federal Power Commission that the three dams of the Idaho Power Co. would best assure comprehensive development of the Snake River basin."

"What the proponents of a federal dam were really arguing for was a return to the discredited theory of federal preemption of hydroelectric sites."

He said Democratic power policies had resulted in a "power crisis" in the Pacific Northwest. He added that in 4½ years, the Eisenhower Administration provided that region with almost "three times as much new licensed power capacity as it got during the 20 talkative years" of Democratic administrations.
