Spread Christian Faith, Roman Catholics Urged

ROME — The Roman Catholic Church's second world congress for the lay apostolate ended Monday with an appeal to Catholics everywhere to bolster the church's mission of conserving and spreading Christian faith.

A closing declaration issued by 2,000 delegates from all continents pledged allegiance to the Pope's call for an expanded lay apostolate movement.

Pope Pius XII opened the congress Oct. 5 with an address in St. Peter's Basilica in which he called Catholics to "fight to the finish" against atheistic communism.

Since then delegates have listened to Catholic leaders outline how lay members of the church could best serve in the struggle to conserve and spread Christian faith.

United Guided Missile Research, Norblad Says

SALEM — Rep. Norblad (R-Ore) said Saturday the Army, Navy and Air Force should combine their guided missile research programs.

Norblad, a member of the House Armed Services Committee, said he has told Defense Secretary McElroy the research and testing programs should be merged.

"Missile development is unbelievably expensive and a great saving of the taxpayer dollar, as well as results in this field, could be achieved by this co-ordination," he said.

Each of the services maintain separate scientific staffs as well as different test sites, Norblad told the executive council of the Oregon Reserve Officers Assn.

Eugene Flier's Body Found In Plane Wreckage

CHITTENDEN, Vt. — Searchers who struggled up the rugged side of Lookoff Mountain Saturday found the bodies of three Army officers and what was presumed the bones of a fourth in the wreckage of their plane.

The quartet perished when the L-29 struck the mountain Oct. 2 while en route from Governors Island, N.Y., to Burlington, Vt.

Searchers believed one of the officers—probably Col. David M. Perkins of Wichita Falls, Texas, may have lived two days.

A body, clothing of which bore a colonel's eagles was found about 200 yards from the tangle of wreckage. The officer had bound a handkerchief around his head from which an ear had been torn. The handkerchief bore the letter "P."

It also appeared the dead officer had tried to light a fire. There were scraps of charred paper nearby. His face had a beard of about two days growth.

Other officers who the Army said were aboard the plane when it left for Vermont were: Capt. Eual A. Cathley, 33, Brooklyn, N.Y., the pilot; Col. Emery E. Hyde, 46, Eugene, Ore., and Lt. Col. Clinton G. Merrill, 44, De Witt, N.Y.

The wrecked plane was spotted Friday by an Army aircraft.

Indications were it came down on a long angle, hitting trees and then flaming over. It apparently burst into flames immediately with flaming gasoline pouring over the occupants.

Col. Emery Hyde was the son of Clarence Hyde, Oregon state real estate commissioner.

Small Business Quiz May Include Portland

Brando's Wife Is Really Irish Lass, Says Pop

CARDIFF, Wales — A Welsh factory worker named William Patrick O'Callaghan claimed Saturday night that Anna Kashfi, dark-skinned bride of actor Marlon Brando, is really his 23-year-old daughter Joan.

The news of Miss Kashfi's quiet marriage Friday to the Hollywood star created a stir in the unpretentious little house where O'Callaghan lives with his wife and 21-year-old son Bosco.

"I can't believe it, it's incredible," said O'Callaghan, 37. "Anna Kashfi is my daughter Joan."

The beautiful young actress went to Hollywood just over a year ago to complete scenes for the movie "The Mountain" in which she appeared with Spencer Tracy.

O'Callaghan said his daughter, a former model, took the name Anna Kashfi for the film. He said Joan was born in Darjeeling, India, where he was a traffic superintendent for the Indian state railways. Ten years ago O'Callaghan retired from the job and brought his family home to Cardiff, capital of Wales.

Douglas Fir Lumber Market Again Declines
