Coquille High Coach Spike Leslie Dies

COQUILLE — Earl E. "Spike" Leslie, 63, football and track coach at Coquille High School the past 20 years, died in a hospital Friday from a heart ailment.

He was a noted athlete when he graduated from the University of Oregon in 1922. Later he coached at Milton-Freewater and Eugene high schools. He also was freshman coach at Oregon and a coach at Penn State before coming to Coquille.

Miller Jayvees Defeat Locals

The Roseburg and Springfield junior varsities emulated their big brothers Saturday at Springfield, with both teams putting on a defensive show. Springfield won the football game, 18-6.

Two blocked punts and a roughing the passer penalty resulted in the Springfield touchdowns, one in each of the first three quarters. Roseburg finally broke over the goal line with about five minutes left in the fourth, a pass from Mike Stone to Halfback Sylvanus Hunt going for 70 yards.

Each team managed only about five first downs.

The junior Millers broke the ice in the first period after a Roseburg punt was blocked and downed on the 18. Moments later, right half Ron Sales packed the ball over from the six-yard stripe.

A variation of that scoring method came in the second when tackle Neil Easton blocked another Indian kick and fell on the ball in the end zone.

The third Springfield score was set up by the penalty. Shortly afterward, left half Jim Roper ran the ball over from the 15 on an off-tackle play.

The Stone-to-Hunt pass went only about 6 yards, but Hunt sped the remaining 64 when he found an open field ahead of him. Another Roseburg drive was stopped in the third quarter by Springfield. The Indians lost their opportunity after a 30-yard play to the Springfield 15 was called back by a penalty.

DeMarco-Akins Title Fight Gains Support

BOSTON — The Boston Globe Monday reported the coming Tony DeMarco-Virgil Akins 15-round fight will be for the world welterweight title despite recent denials.

The bout is scheduled for Oct. 29 at Boston Garden. The paper quoted Massachusetts Boxing Commissioner Joe Reardon as saying: "It definitely is a title fight. There can be no question about it. The Executive Board of the NBA has it in black and white, having decided so at the July meeting in New York. Recently,

Lou Radienza (Illinois commissioner and past National Boxing Assn. president) wrote and stated emphatically it was to be for the title. Actually, we at the commission never have heard from any source it wasn't a title fight."

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
