

UAW Has Offered To End Lengthy Kohler Co. Strike

DETROIT (AP)—The United Auto Workers Union has offered to end its bitter 23-year strike against the Kohler Co. But the union says the Wisconsin plumbing ware firm in return must accept the findings of a National Labor Relations Board examiner as a basis for settlement.

Acceptance by the company of the examiner's recommendations, said UAW President Walter Reuther in a telegram to Kohler President Herbert V. Kohler Monday, would open the way for new union management meetings which Reuther proposed be called within "the next several days."

"If the company is prepared fully to implement the recommendations of the trial examiner," Reuther said, "then the union is prepared to bring about a prompt termination of both the strike and the legal primary boycott, which it has been conducting."

The company said it had no immediate comment.

Trial examiner George A. Downing of the NLRB ruled last Thursday in Washington that the Kohler Co. prolonged the strike at its Kohler, Wis., plant in violation of the Taft-Hartley Act by a series of unfair labor practices.

At the same time Downing found that the company lawfully discharged 43 strikers.

Downing's findings went to the full five-member NLRB board for action.

The strike was called by UAW Local 833 April 5, 1934 and is still in progress.

Broadcaster Hits Back At Law Suit Of Wanamaker

WASHINGTON (AP)—Radio broadcaster Fulton Lewis Jr. accused Mrs. Pearl A. Wanamaker, former superintendent of public instruction in Washington state, of malicious prosecution Tuesday.

In a petition filed in federal district court here, Lewis asked permission to file a counterclaim for \$150,000 against Mrs. Wanamaker. Mrs. Wanamaker has pending here a libel suit against Lewis asking damages of one million dollars.

Mrs. Wanamaker claims she was libeled in a broadcast made by Lewis Jan. 6, 1956.

Mrs. Wanamaker was not immediately available for comment at her Seattle home.

Lewis, through attorneys, said that subsequent to the filing of the complaint here, Mrs. Wanamaker instituted seven civil actions against radio stations in various parts of the country which carried the broadcast.

Lewis' petition said the actions against the seven radio stations were instituted by Mrs. Wanamaker maliciously, without probable cause, and were terminated in favor of the radio stations.

In addition to Lewis' defendants in Mrs. Wanamaker's suit here include the Mutual Broadcasting System and radio station WWDC.

The papers filed in Lewis' behalf disclosed that Lewis has a contract with the Mutual Broadcasting System under which Lewis agrees to indemnify the network and its affiliated radio stations against any and all liability, loss and expense arising from any claim or litigation growing out of his radio program.

Long-Time Resident Dies Monday Evening

First Commercial Flight Headed For Antarctica

The first commercial flight to the earth's last continent was winging today across the bottom of the planet from New Zealand to Antarctica.

Capt. Ralph Savory, a veteran of 25 years of Arctic flying, lifted the 73-ton Pan American Stratocruiser from the runway at Christchurch and set his course for McMurdo Sound 9½ hours away.

There are two pretty stewardesses aboard. They are dark-haired Patricia Hepinstall, 25-year-old former San Francisco model, a native of Houston, Tex.; and blonde Ruth Kelly, 25-year-old former school teacher of Holyoke, Colo.

(They are not the first women to set foot in Antarctica, however. In 1946, Mrs. Finn Ronne, wife of a U.S. Navy researcher, and Mr. and Mrs. Harry Darling, went into the frozen reaches on a map-making trip. They spent 15 months there. A Russian Antarctic team, now making International Geophysical Year studies, is reported to include three women.)

Judge May Rule Today On Legal Issue In Trial

PORTLAND (AP)—State Circuit Judge Martin Hawkins may rule Tuesday on an important legal issue in the bribe conspiracy trial of Thomas E. Maloney—whether to admit a tape recording as evidence.

The matter was argued behind closed doors by attorneys Monday. Previously the trial had been delayed several days by a preliminary hearing on the same issue.

Maloney, a 54-year-old former Seattle and Spokane race track clerk, once served as an investigator for former Dist. Atty. William Langley. Langley later was ousted for failure to prosecute gamblers.

The state contends the tape recording is needed to link Maloney, Langley, and Joseph McLaughlin, Seattle card room operator, in a plot to open Portland to gambling, defense attorney Howard Longman has argued that the court should not permit the playing of the tape recording before the jury.

The state says the recording is of conversations picked up by a microphone that had been planted in Maloney's apartment.

\$28,448.24; Salem Sand and Gravel, \$65,978.63; and Todd Building Co., \$49,951.39.

Farrell said some blasting still needs to be done on the projects. He said the weather has not held up progress to any great extent and the projects are "in good shape."

The council also approved final payment for paving of SE Kane, West Maple and West Union Streets. Costs of all three projects were under the city engineer's estimates.

Farrell suggested the widening of the intersection at Sheridan and Oak so that vehicles would have more room to make turns.

He also said the city will have to borrow between 32 and 34 thousand dollars to carry it to the end of its budget year. A resolution was adopted that the city borrow equally from Roseburg banks a sum not to exceed \$10,000 for the purpose.

Khrushchev Sends Letter To Britain On Middle East

LONDON (AP)—Soviet Communist Party chief Nikita Khrushchev was reported Tuesday to have sent a message to Britain's Labor Party leaders on the Middle East situation.

Hugh Gaitskill, Labor Party leader, and Aneurin Bevan, the party's spokesman on foreign affairs, called on Prime Minister Macmillan Tuesday and were said to have relayed the Khrushchev message.

Khrushchev's addressing the Labor Party leaders on a matter of international importance was regarded here as highly unusual. He apparently did it as the leader of the Soviet Communist Party, rather than in behalf of the Soviet government.

Letter One of Series

Labor Party informants said they understood the message was one of a series Khrushchev sent to European socialist parties emphasizing what he called the danger of aggression by Turkey against Syria.

The Netherlands Labor Party leader Exort Vermeer announced in Amsterdam Monday night that he also had received a personal letter from Khrushchev.

Dutch Labor Party sources said the Khrushchev message was "pure propaganda reflecting the well known Soviet views on the Middle East." Details of the message were not disclosed.

Dutch labor circles speculated that Khrushchev was utilizing Soviet achievements with an earth satellite and an intercontinental missile as a position of strength for wooing Europe's socialists.

Western officials here have speculated, too, that the Soviets inspired Egyptian President Nasser to send troops reinforcements to Syria as part of Moscow's Middle East diplomatic campaign.

Floods Hit Spain, Many Persons Die

VALENCIA, Spain (AP)—All rivers along 150 miles of Spain's Mediterranean coastline were over their banks Tuesday, flooding the nation's richest agricultural region. At least 33 persons were dead and authorities believed the toll might reach 100.

The racing Turia River swept into Valencia, a port of 500,000 inhabitants, for the third time in 30 hours.

Much of the city was a vast lake, stretching as far as five miles inland, without lights, drinking water, or gas. Only one long distance telephone line was functioning.

An official count listed 22 dead in Valencia and 11 in surrounding villages, with more than 100 injured in the city.

AUGUSTA, Kan. (AP)—A station wagon and a Frisco passenger train collided in the rain at dusk last night, killing six members of an Oklahoma family.

The dead were Mr. and Mrs. S. P. Bushy Jr. of Shidler, Okla., their three sons, from two months to five years old, and Bushy's grandfather, Charles Carringer of Kaw City, Okla.

COMMANDO RAID

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—The Defense Ministry today reported that Chinese Nationalist commandos carried out an intelligence patrol on the China mainland on the night of Oct. 3 and killed a Communist soldier and a police dog in a brief clash.

President States America Must End Racial Differences

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower—quite possibly alluding to school integration troubles—says Americans must wipe out differences based on prejudice and on "unreasonable adherence to our own beliefs."

The President made that statement to several hundred Republican party workers who went to the White House late Friday to salute him on his 67th birthday anniversary.

Eisenhower spoke informally to party workers assembled on the south lawn just a few hours before his chief aide, Sherman Adams, swatted indirectly by hard at Arkansas' Democratic Gov. Orval Faubus on the integration situation at Little Rock.

Adams Lashes Out

Adams, addressing an Eisenhower birthday dinner put on by Republicans in San Francisco last night, spoke of "tragic events" in Little Rock and called them "dramatic additional evidence of the bottomless chasm that cleaves the Democratic Party in two" on civil rights and other issues.

As Eisenhower himself did on Sept. 28, Adams lit into Faubus without mentioning him by name. But there was no mistaking Adams' target as he said that in Arkansas:

"State soldiers were used to block the orders of a federal court . . . actions have been condoned that encourage lawlessness in major regions of our country . . . there, before all the world, America's shining symbol as the land of liberty and justice has been besmirched."

Present Him Bib Cake

The party workers Eisenhower addresses presented him with a five-tier, 500-pound cake with the inscription in icing: "Happy Birthday, Mr. President—Neighbor to Neighbor."

With the President for the presentation were Mrs. Eisenhower, their daughter-in-law Mrs. John Eisenhower and the presidential grandchildren—all four of them. The smallest, 18-month-old Mary Jean, spoke away from her mother at one point and came within an eyelash of digging into the big cake.

Eisenhower chuckled in delight as the party workers, led by Vice President Nixon and GOP Chairman Meade ALCORN, serenaded him with the song "Happy Birthday to You."

A quiet family dinner at the White House last night climaxed the President's birthday celebration.

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Oregon Folks View Sputnik

Oregonians at such widely separated spots as Portland, Depoe Bay and Baker Tuesday reported sighting the Russian satellite rocket.

Robert Boardwell, head of the moonwatch operation in Portland, reported the sighting at 5:16 a.m. He said it was "brighter than the North Star," moved directly overhead from northwest to southeast and was visible about a minute.

Boardwell said binoculars helped identify it as the third-stage rocket that carried Sputnik aloft. He said an attempt to sight the satellite itself was unsuccessful. The satellite is believed to be three minutes behind the rocket.

At Depoe Bay, on the Oregon coast, Ashton Roberts, a Navy Reserve pilot, said he sighted the rocket at 5:15 a.m. He also reported it directly overhead, moving from northwest to southeast. He said he thought it was visible about five minutes. His wife also saw it, but they were unable to spot Sputnik.

At Baker in Eastern Oregon, R. J. Stockdale said he and his wife sighted the object by naked eye over the Blue Mountains to the northwest at 5:15 a.m. He said it appeared as a bright star, moved to the southeast, and was visible for a few minutes.

Negro Seaman Is Convicted On Murder Charge

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Seaman Jimmie Henderson was convicted by a general court martial Monday night of premeditated murder.

A life sentence or the death penalty are the only alternatives for the conviction under the uniform code of military justice.

The 21-year-old Navy clerk from nearby Marin City was convicted by a seven-member court which deliberated one hour and 24 minutes. It was the 16th day of trial.

Henderson's attorney, Lt. Donald C. McCullough, admitted in his closing argument "there is little room for argument" that the Negro sailor shot and killed Ensign Arthur Morris of Stow, Ohio, last May. But Henderson, he said, was too emotionally disturbed to premeditate the killing.

Henderson killed his division officer and wounded another officer aboard the USS Albatross in San Francisco Bay and terrorized the ship for more than an hour before he was captured. Witnesses said he bore a grudge for disciplinary action.

He had to be quieted by his guards several times during the long court martial, but on the final day he sat quietly at the defense table reading a book or writing on a pad of paper.

Bail Rewritten

After Hoffa pleaded innocent to the perjury charges, a previous \$2,500 bail bond, covering the writtap case was rewritten to cover the perjury indictment.

Hoffa recently was elected president of the 1,400,000-member International Brotherhood of Teamsters, but has been barred by court order from taking office.

Shortly after Hoffa entered his plea, Benjamin Franklin Collins, secretary-treasurer of Teamster Local 299 in Detroit, pleaded innocent to a separate 12-count perjury indictment returned by the same grand jury.

Collins was charged with lying in testifying before the grand jury that original minutes of the local's city cartage division for March 11, 1953, had not been altered.

Hoffa was grim-faced as the perjury indictment against him was read.

"Not guilty," he responded, in a loud voice.

Charged with taking a female under the age of 16 without her parents' consent, Kenneth F. Eckley, 19, Empire, was ordered held for the grand jury Monday by Robert H. Goodwin, Reedsport justice of the peace.

Eckley is alleged to have taken a 14-year-old into the State of Washington.

County Clerk Explains Jury Selection Method

Charles Doerner, Douglas County clerk, reports that he has been receiving calls from citizens wishing to be picked for jury duty, but his hands are tied by law in this situation and cannot make any personal selections for jurors.

He refers any one wishing to be picked for jury duty to section 10.080 of the Oregon Revised Statutes, that reads in part, "No person shall ask or request any sheriff, constable . . . whose duty it is . . . to select or summons any jury or juror, to select or put him upon the jury . . ."

The law further reads, "The jury list is selected by lot from the latest tax roll and registration books or either . . . from the preliminary list those not qualified by law are deleted and the remaining names constitute the jury list."

Doerner states that he picks names for jury duty alphabetically and divides the county into three sections for making selections. He staggers these three areas each time a list is to be drawn, to give all individuals a fair chance. According to Doerner, he uses the registration books for picking jurors because they contain more information than the tax roll.
