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Bazooka Rocket Explosion Kills One, Injures 12

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif.

One Marine was wounded fatally and 12 others less seriously injured in a premature explosion of a bazooka rocket shell on a firing range late Tuesday.

The name of the dead Marine, an 18-year-old private first class, was withheld pending notification of next of kin.

Capt. William Duncan, 1st Marine Division public information officer, said none of the other wounded was in serious condition. All were attached to the 1st Battalion, 1st Marine Division.

Three were identified as Sgt. Edward W. Dixon, Chowchilla, Calif.; Pfc. Paul S. Sheffield, Brunswick, Ga.; and Pfc. Donald K. Pearce, Pontiac, Mich.

The others, whose hometowns were not available, were listed as Pfc. Herman D. Cook, Pfc. Roy L. Bell, Pfc. Lawrence Green Jr., Pfc. George D. Olson, Sgt. Peter J. O'Neill, Pvt. R. E. Thomas, Pfc. Freddy H. Wilson, Cpl. Michael P. Denoyer and Pfc. James W. Bailey.

Duncan said a 3.5 inch bazooka rocket shell exploded during a training class.

Paris Without Electricity, Gas

PARIS — Electricity and gas were cut off over much of France today as workers in the state-operated systems went on a 24-hour warning strike for higher wages.

With telephone communications also affected, it was difficult to gauge the extent of the strike in the provinces. But the midnight cutoff hit hard in the Greater Paris area, which has more than five million inhabitants.

At the Atlantic port of Le Havre a general strike appeared to be developing. The striking gas and electric workers were joined by dock workers, metal workers and even employees in Le Havre's main hospital, although the operating staff remained on duty. Four oil tankers were discharging their cargoes when the dock workers walked out.

Flashlights and candles provided the only light for most Parisians who arose before dawn. With the gas very low or out, breakfast was a cold meal.

Air Hostesses Return From Antarctica Flight

CHRISTCHURCH, New Zealand

Two American air hostesses who went on the first commercial plane flight to the Antarctic returned today delighted with their reception of 301 ice-bound men.

Ruth Kelly, formerly of Houston, Tex., and Patricia Hopstall, formerly of Holyoke, Colo., said they especially impressed 82 men at McMurdo Sound who hadn't seen a woman in 6 to 18 months.

The two hostesses flew from Christchurch to McMurdo yesterday on a Pan American Constellation that took 37 U.S. Seabees for duty at American Antarctic bases.

The young women told of judging a beard-growing contest among the men as well as being elected "Queen Bees of the Sea Bees" in Antarctica.

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Arkansas University Cancels Satchmo Play

PAYETTEVILLE, Ark. — The University of Arkansas student government last night canceled a scheduled spring appearance of Louis (Satchmo) Armstrong because of what was termed "the unfortunate remarks" made by the Negro trumpeter on the Little Rock integration crisis.

Dr. John T. Caldwell, university president, said the faculty supports the students in their decision.

He called Armstrong's comment and criticism of Gov. Orval Faubus "a blunder which obviously can help no one and just as obviously does much mischief."

Armstrong had said he would be glad to play at the university but sorry that Faubus might enjoy the program. The governor said this week he considers Armstrong "a very fine musician" and hopes he gets courteous treatment in Arkansas.

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
