

Moulding Plant Employs Eight

While the pinch of the lumber market continues to plague the timber industry here, some respite and encouragement is being provided in small-scale lumber manufacturing on the local scene. In the face of big mill shutdowns and cutbacks operators of plants akin to the industry have expanded and developed new sources of income in lumber.

Rather unheralded but steadily over the past summer the local industrial scene has been marked by the expansion of small manufacturing and finishing plants which ultimately draw upon the timber resources for their economy. One of the latest to do so is a small manufacturing outfit, Roseburg Wood Products Co., located near Kelly's Corner.

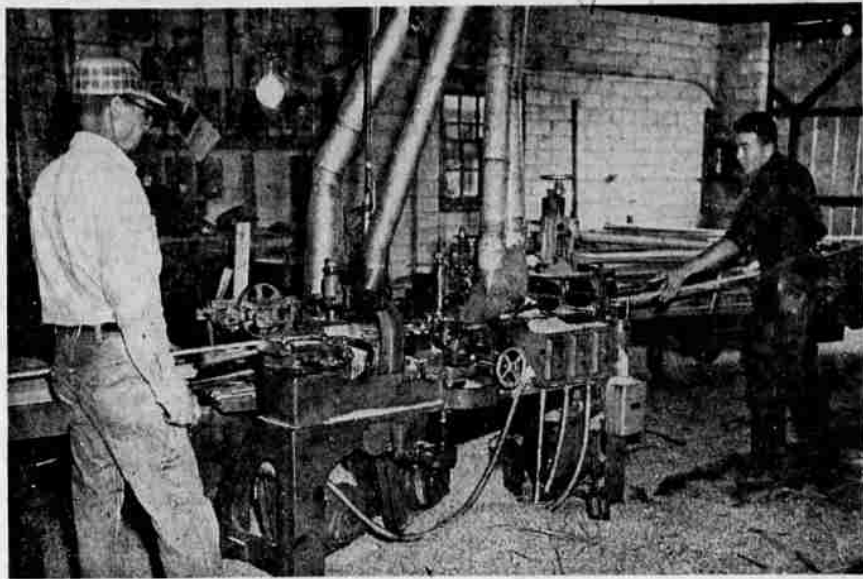
The company manufactures all kinds of interior and exterior mouldings of wood and ships them to points all over the United States.

Adds Five Men

In the summer past, Roseburg Wood Products employed five additional men in its expansion. It now employs eight men and future plans call for streamlining the plant into production-line process. Two more sheds will also be added for stocking.

At present, besides the stockrooms, the main part of the plant includes two moulders, a rip saw and a band saw. The company has its own kiln for drying and also does custom drying.

Production there averages about 20,000 lineal feet per day, according to foreman and part-owner



MANUFACTURING of mouldings at Roseburg Wood Products Co. serves a nation-wide market. The company, located near Kelley's Corner, produces all kinds of interior and exterior wood mouldings and recently expanded its facilities, hired additional help and increased production.

Bert Shoemaker, representing an increase in the plant's capacity of some 400 per cent over a year ago.

Among the products are such items as door jams, corner mouldings, rounds, screen door stock, cover seams for boats, ledges, covers for ceilings, window and door stops, casings and trim around doors and windows and base for floors.

Buyers are from points all over

the country, according to Shoemaker, but mostly from North Carolina and South Carolina and Tennessee. At present the company is filling an order for the federal government at Ft. Knox, Ky., for mouldings for houses.

The company moved to its present location off Highway 42S, near Kelly's Corner, about two years after it was founded in 1946. Bob Norton took over as president in March of 1956.

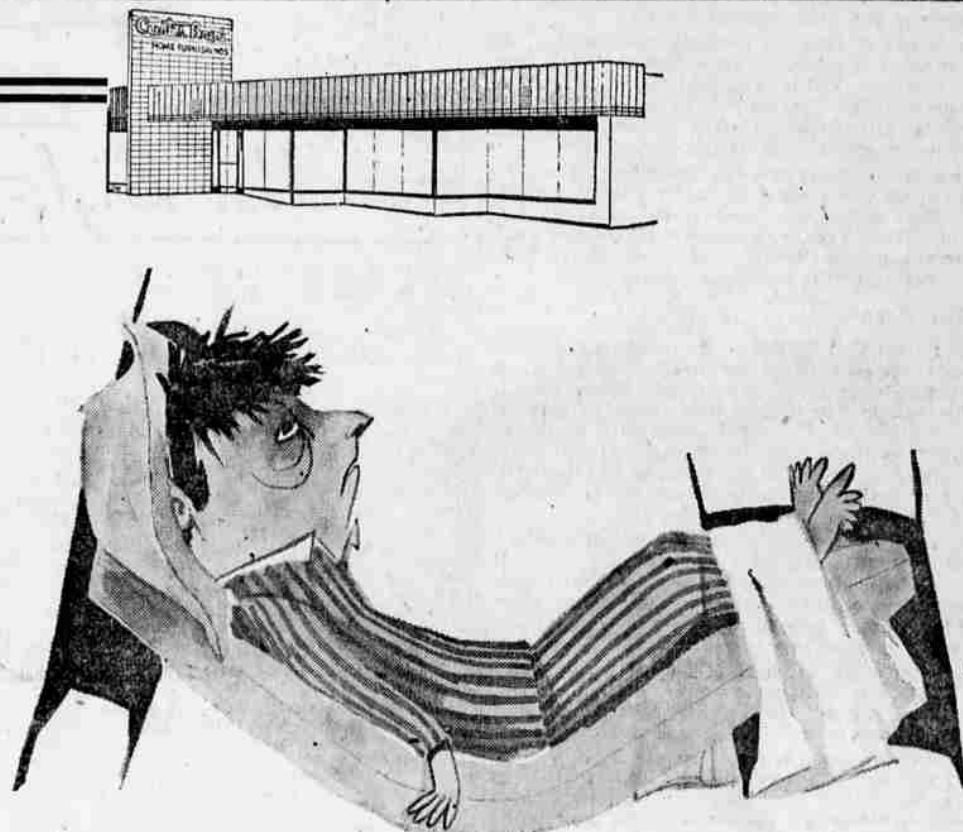

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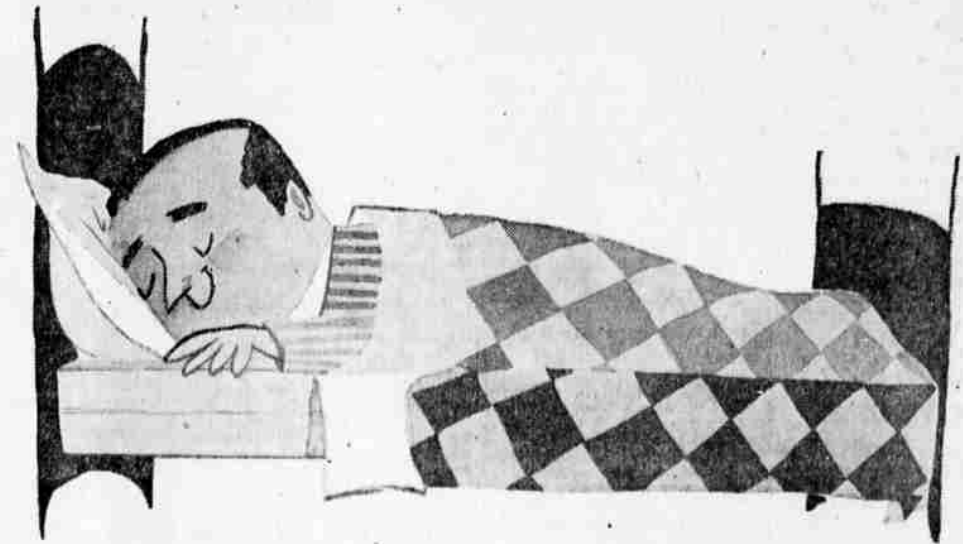
