Cleveland, Colts Shoot For Wins

Power-laden Baltimore and defense-minded Cleveland will try to stretch their unbeaten streaks to four tomorrow against opponents they handled with quick dispatch the first time around.

The Colts, leading the National Football League's Western Division, meet the second-place Detroit Lions (2-1) before an expected 54,000 in Detroit's Briggs Stadium. Baltimore crushed Detroit 35-14 in the season's opener.

The Eastern Division leading Browns, who defeated Philadelphia 24-7 last Sunday, face the cellar-dwelling Eagles (0-3) on the road. In other games on a full program, defending champion New York, currently runner-up to Cleveland in the East, opens its home season against Pittsburgh. San Francisco meets Green Bay at Milwaukee, Los Angeles and the Bears go at it in Chicago, and Chicago's Cardinals are at Washington.

The awards which total \$2000, are sponsored annually by the Sears Roebuck foundation in cooperation with the Oregon Council of Churches. Judging is based on improvements made during the year in buildings and grounds and in service programs for people of the community.

The Dillard-Winston Methodist Church, Rev. William O. Walker minister, won a third place in the open country class and the Olivet Presbyterian Church of Glendale, Rev. Wayne Wattman minister, won third place in the under 2500 population class.

Creek. Then the wall of the Cascade Mountains is reached, and the problem then becomes one of finding a proper grade.

Grade, Curves at Minimum
The BPR has set a 6 per cent grade as maximum. Curves, he said, would be held to a minimum of 12 degrees, if possible.

The advantages of the river route would be less exposure to the elements and less upkeep of the road. The Copeland Creek route would mean more winter snow removal and additional maintenance on parts of the road exposed to winter damage. It would be about three miles longer than the river route, but much cheaper per mile to construct. Less rock work would stand in the way.

The reconnaissance survey is about eight miles in length, but will be the toughest section to build of the highway, which has been proposed for many years by the Forest Service and Roseburg interests.

Difficulty in designing the road is illustrated by the differences in elevation at Soda Springs (1,825 feet at the dam's crest) and on the plateau above Clearwater Camp (3,700 feet). That's a rise of 1,875 feet in only eight miles or so.

When the reconnaissance information is at hand, Montgomery said, regional engineers may decide whether to complete a full survey this fall. That could be completed this fall if: (1) The reconnaissance shows the river route to be favorable, and (2) if bad weather holds off.

Actual construction on either route is in the future. The road now has been graded to about 15 miles west of Dry Creek, east of Steamboat.

Washington State Has First Hunting Fatality
PORT ANGELES (AP) — Danny Ray Anderson, 26, Port Angeles, became Washington state's first hunting fatality of the 1957 season when part of a bullet fired by his uncle struck him.

The uncle, Walter B. Anderson, told Clallam County sheriff's officers he and his nephew, the father of four small children, had separated. The accident happened 10 miles west of here.

The elder Anderson said he saw a movement in the brush and, believing it to be a deer, fired. After the shot he found his nephew on the ground.

Deputy Coroner Gil Harper said the bullet fired by Anderson hit some brush and shattered. One of the pieces, Harper said, hit young Anderson in the right shoulder and penetrated to his lungs.

The accident occurred about 2½ miles east of Glendale near the weighing station, according to Mrs. Gerald Fox, News-Review Glendale correspondent.

The car went through a fence and into a field on the W. B. Garrett ranch. The car, an older model, was presumed to be a total loss. Young suffered one cut on the side of his face and scratches. His daughter received a black eye and cut lip.

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
