ed 61 yards off tackle to score. The count remained 7-6.

On the third play of the second chapter, Douglas' Terry Counts capped a 56-yard sustained drive by going seven yards through the middle of the line. Schroeder missed the kick and the score stayed 13-6.

Still far from out of the game, the Vikings exploded again, but for the final time in the game, the next time they got the ball, Cearley gained three yards on the first scrimmage play after the kickoff, then Bishop dashed 59 yards up the middle to score. But the conversion by running failed and it stayed 13-12 until the Trojans scored again.

The winners closed the first half scoring as defense toughened on both sides, by going 63 yards in 17 plays. Terry Counts scored from the 14 off tackle. Schroeder passed to Miller for the conversion.

Final offensive statistics indicated what a wide open type game it was with the winners getting 17 first downs to 13 for Myrtle Creek while the Vikings had the net yardage advantage, 310 to 308.

Bulldogs Rap Riddle, 27-13, Irish Rugged

Offense was the keyword for half the ball game at Sutherland Friday as the Bulldogs raced to a 27-13 non-league victory over Riddle's Irish.

That was the score at halftime, too, as both teams pulled out all the stops early, then struggled to a scoreless draw in the final two periods. But the damage was done, as far as Riddle was concerned, with the winners having piled up a 13-6 first period advantage and a 14-7 difference in the second quarter.

Sutherland actually had to turn victory out of defeat as the win-hungry Irish took charge of the early going.

The losers struck with a 65-yard touchdown play on the game's second play with Fred Wilcox throwing to Carl Cassidy for the score. Sutherland tied it moments later on a five-play drive. Jerry Perez drove over from the one after Joe Wright's 30-yard run had set it up.

Both sides missed the conversions.

Riddle took up again, getting all the way down to the Sutherland 10 on a drive. But then the Irish progress backfired, and Warren Slayton broke Riddle's backs by picking up an Irish fumble and rambling 90 yards to score.

Warren Slayton converted through the line for 13-6.

Sutherland took charge in the second period. Joe Wright again set up the scoring by running 65 yards on a quarterback keep to the Riddle two. John Arana went over from the 30 and also added the extra point for 20-6.

Riddle continued to make a game of it by driving 30 yards to score, capped by Wilcox's 10-yard pass to Cassidy. Wilcox ran the conversion also for 20-13.

Sutherland ended the scoring by driving 70 yards, highlighted by Wright's 25-yard pass to Jay Lillie and his nine-yard payoff run. Perez converted.

Slayton with 144 yards and Wright with 124 were the big gainers as the winners netted 499 yards to 221 for Riddle. No serious threats marked the second half defensive battle.

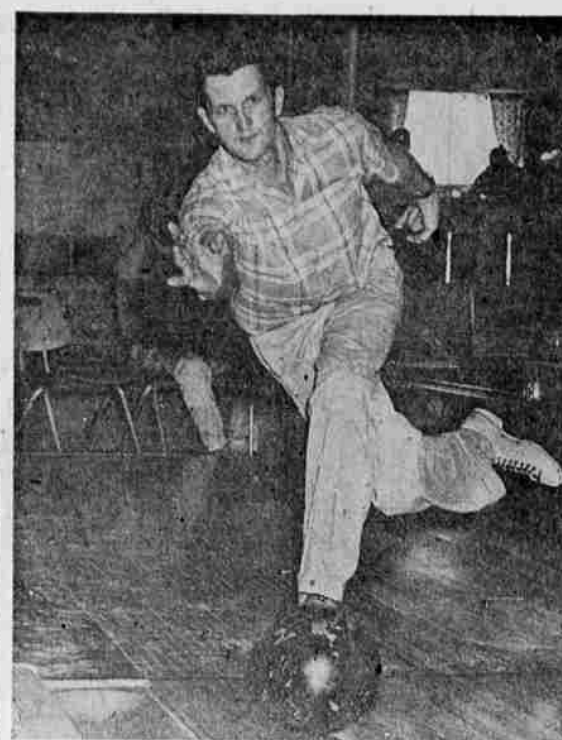

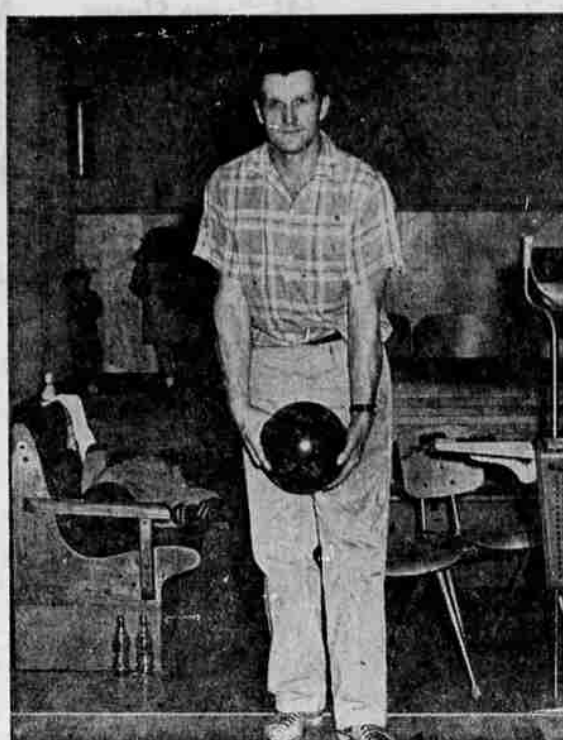

A disputed safety gave Marshfield a 2-0 victory over Springfield and extended its undefeated string to 40 games in the high-level of Oregon high school football action Friday night.

But Springfield immediately wired a protest to the Oregon School Activities Assn., contending Marshfield's winning points should not have been allowed.

Springfield, beaten only once previously this season and leading the Midwestern League (district 5), had played defending champion Marshfield on even terms until the score came with 2 minutes and 44 seconds left to play.

Jerry Haugen, Springfield halfback, signaled for a fair catch of a Marshfield punt on his 3-yard line. He fumbled the ball, it rolled into the end zone and he fell on it there.

Awards Safety

Referee Gene Handy and other officials ruled that the ball had been in play and awarded Marshfield a safety.

Hal Whitebeck, Springfield coach, argued that a touchdown should have been ruled. That would have given his team the ball on its own 20-yard line and left the score 0-0.

Dale Parnell, Springfield principal, said he served notice of a protest of the ruling in a telegram to Oden Haves of the OSAA.

It was the 12th straight victory for Marshfield. No. 1 in the Associated Press poll, Marshfield has not been scored on this season.

South Eugene, the No. 2 team, will play Hudson's Bay of Vancouver, Wash., Saturday.

Others of the top 10 teams in the poll that played came through with victories. But Jefferson, No. 4, and Grant, No. 6, had real con-

For almost a half, Drain's Warriors appeared to be on their way to a stunning upset over the 28-point favored Elmira's Falcons Friday. But the Warrior upset dreams exploded suddenly, and the home team went on to a convincing 48-6 victory.

Midway in the first period, the Warriors sprang a 6-0 lead on the favorites after recovering two fumbles.

First a fumble recovery was made on the Elmira 25, but the ball was lost on downs. But a few plays later the Falcons fumbled again on a play which began on their own 17, and when Drain rested on the eight, From there, Rusty Painter passed to Frank Jacobs for a six-yard gain and on the next play Dick Crites slammed into the end zone to score.

Still Going

Observers at the pin plant this morning viewed Eaton as "looking tired and maybe a little sleepy-eyed," but they were quick to point that he's "pretty determined" and had given "no indication of quitting."

One of the amazing aspects of Eaton's performance is the game average of 172.5 he was maintaining at the 175-game mark. For the 175 games he had felled 30,716 pins, had hit a high game of 223, a low of 116 and had bowled 22 games of 200 and over and 24 games of 150 and under.

The 172.5 average represented a figure above his regular season's average of 170 and his last year's mark of 153.

Friday evening the 35-year old local trucking operator had his first solid food since starting the "no-rest" marathon at 12:45 a.m. Friday. He ate steak with the trimmings and had two glasses of milk between throws on alley No. 16.

Eaton's diet since starting has consisted mostly of liquids, candy, orange juice and milk.

Friday afternoon, after having completed 84 games, he said he felt "pretty good." He said he couldn't understand "what all the fuss was about" at that stage. He said he could understand someone getting excited if he had reached 270 games.

Three Elmira touchdowns in the third period came on Don McCarr's seven yard run, a 45-yard pass from Prather to Smith and a 30-yard aerial from Worden to Toby Martin.

Eaton was swinging easily through his paces, but still was managing to maintain his six-game per hour average. This was slightly behind the 6 1/2 game average per hour he had set earlier.

A small audience at the alleys cheered him on as he threw ball after ball down the 16th alley. During the small hours of Saturday he shifted to alley 13 for his throws when the houseman came around for his regular alley-cleaning.

When Eaton completed his 119th game Friday it gave him a new third-place national record for consecutive games rolled. The previous mark of 118 was set by Walter Phillips of St. Louis at Saratoga Recreation in Maplewood, Mo. over a period of 39 hours in 1931.

The second place mark is 299 games in 57 hours by Ed Zahnow of St. Louis, also was set in 1931 when the national mark was set by Gargiolo.

The Tigers, long dominated in football by Elton, went right to work Friday and turned in a workmanlike performance, grinding out 20 points in the first period, adding seven in each of the middle periods and finishing off the afternoon with 14 more in the final panel.

Give Up 6
