

Southern States Hard Hit By Pupil Placement Ruling

Several Southern states with pupil placement laws on the books adopted an "it can't happen here" attitude Tuesday following the U.S. Supreme Court's voiding of the Virginia pupil placement law.

That state, of course, was hardest hit by Monday's court action. Some officials began searching for other ways of preventing mixing of the races in the public schools.

Leaders in Alabama and Florida said they did not think school placement laws in their states would be affected. A South Carolina official said the state's schools would close rather than integrate.

Won't Permit Integration
Georgia relied on a so-called private school plan. Gov. Marvin Griffin has maintained he never would permit school integration while he is the state's chief executive. A school placement bill was killed in committee by the Legislature in 1955.

This is what the Supreme Court did in Virginia. It refused to review lower court decisions ruling unconstitutional the state's pupil placement act, thereby dealing a severe blow to the state's declared policy of massive resistance to school integration.

The act placed in the hands of a state board the power to assign pupils to all public schools in Virginia on any basis except race.

Creates 'Emergency'
Ted Dalton, Republican candidate for governor in the Nov. 3 Virginia election, said the court's action created "an emergency situation which calls for emergency action." He said a special session of the Legislature should be held to formulate a new program for averting integration.

Gov. Thomas B. Stanley of Virginia, however, said state statutes not affected by the decision provide an orderly course of action "in the face of these continuing attempts to force integration, and there is no cause for school patrons, faculties or pupils to be apprehensive."

He said the pupil placement act was "only one phase of the program enacted by the General Assembly for the preservation of our system of public education."

We shall continue to use the law and proper means to carry out the mandate of the general assembly.

Religion Said Holding India From Communists

Ali Beg, a native of Aligarhi, India, told members of the Roseburg branch of the American Assn. of University Women last weekend that the Indian mind basically is religious and as such it cannot accept Russian ideology.

Beg, a graduate student in psychology at the University of Oregon, said Indians and Russians do not see eye to eye because of this difference in religious temperaments, despite a racial affinity.

He said India appreciates the cooperation the U. S. is extending it, but still is trying to get the best out of the incoming ideologies of West and East.

He concluded by saying, "India is at the crossroads. She will not choose without thinking."

The group next will meet Nov. 6. Guest speaker will be Laura Olson, a member of U. S. Rep. Charles O. Porter's staff and former News-Review reporter.

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THERE'S A GREYHOUND AGENT NEAR YOU

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supreme Court action Monday included the following:

Refused to interfere with public disclosure of a tape-recorded conversation in Westchester County, N. Y., jail between extortionist Joseph Lanza and Sylvester Cosentino, a lawyer. Lanza and Cosentino appealed after the New York State Court of Appeals decided the state Legislature's "watch dog" committee had the right to make the conversation public. The committee had been holding hearings to determine whether a political fix was involved in a temporary restoration of Lanza to parole in February, 1957.

Agreed to rule on the validity of a California law which takes away tax exemption from churches if they refuse to sign an oath stating they do not advocate violent overthrow of the governments of the United States and California and do not advocate support of a foreign government in event of war.

Validity of the law was contested in separate appeals filed by the First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles and the Peoples Church of San Fernando Valley.

To Eye Death Sentences
Agreed after previous refusals to review two death sentences cases from California. Both involve the issue of sanity.

One case is that of William Francis Rupp, who was convicted of fatally shooting a 15-year-old girl during a rape attempt, in Orange County. The other is that of Bart Carriativo, Filipino houseboy convicted of killing Camille and Joseph Banks, his employers, at Stinson Beach.

In the case of the California oath taking law, the churches appealed after the California Supreme Court upheld the oath requirement.

The churches contended the oath violates the U. S. Constitution's guarantees of freedom of religion, speech and assembly and breaches the wall of separation between church and state.

Craig Eliminated, Now Seeks GOP Seat In Congress

NEW YORK (AP) — Harold Craig, 25-year-old Granville, N.Y., dairy farmer, eliminated from a national TV quiz show with \$100,000, says he is available as a Republican candidate for Congress.

Craig was defeated Monday night by David Mayer, a 36-year-old New York City psychologist, on NBC's "Twenty-One" show.

Immediately after the program, Craig announced that his friends had asked him to run for Congress and that he planned to do so next year.

Mayer, 21-18 victory lopped \$13,500 from the \$119,500 the dairy farmer took into Monday night's game. The two had tied in eight previous games, upping the playing stakes to \$4,500 a point.

The victory meant \$13,500 to Mayer, who now can try to add to his winnings next week.

In Monday night's game Craig could have lost a maximum of \$94,500. Both correctly answered all their questions — on presidents and women — but Craig chose an eight-point question after Mayer reached 21.

The congressional seat up on which Craig cast his eye is held by another Republican, Rep. Dean Park Taylor, of Troy, N.Y. Taylor was first elected to the seat in 1942.

Supreme Court Issues Rulings On Several Cases

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The California Supreme Court said it found nothing which interfered with the free exercise of religion. The opinion said:

"The plaintiff (the church) is affected (by the oath law) not because it is a religious organization but because it is a taxpayer favored in the law by an exemption for which it has refused to qualify."

"Since this oath is obviously not a test of religious opinion the plaintiff is not excused from making it any more than any other taxpayer."

Chief Justice Warren, former governor of California, disqualified himself from consideration of the appeals.

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Maloney's Aid Of Little Value, Langley States

PORTLAND (AP) — Former Dist. Atty. William Langley Monday testified that Thomas E. Maloney, a former Seattle and Spokane race track clerk, was of little help in his 1954 campaign.

An earlier witness said that Maloney, who is being tried on a charge of bribe conspiracy, was brought to Portland to aid in Maloney's successful campaign for office.

Langley testified that Maloney worked in his campaign, but was of little help.

"He was from Spokane. He did not know anybody. He couldn't introduce me anywhere," Langley said.

After Langley's election to office Maloney was for a time an investigator for him.

The state has charged that Langley, Maloney and Joseph McLaughlin, a Seattle card room operator, were in on a plot to open up gambling here.

Maloney's trial—in its third week of testimony—is an outgrowth of Portland's long vice probe. Earlier in the probe, Langley was removed from office for failure to prosecute gamblers.

Langley later said he hired Maloney as an investigator after the late Gov. Paul Patterson suggested he use informers in an effort to close up vice here.

Langley said that he sought Patterson's advice after then police chief Jim Purcell refused to co-operate in his plans for cracking down on vice here.

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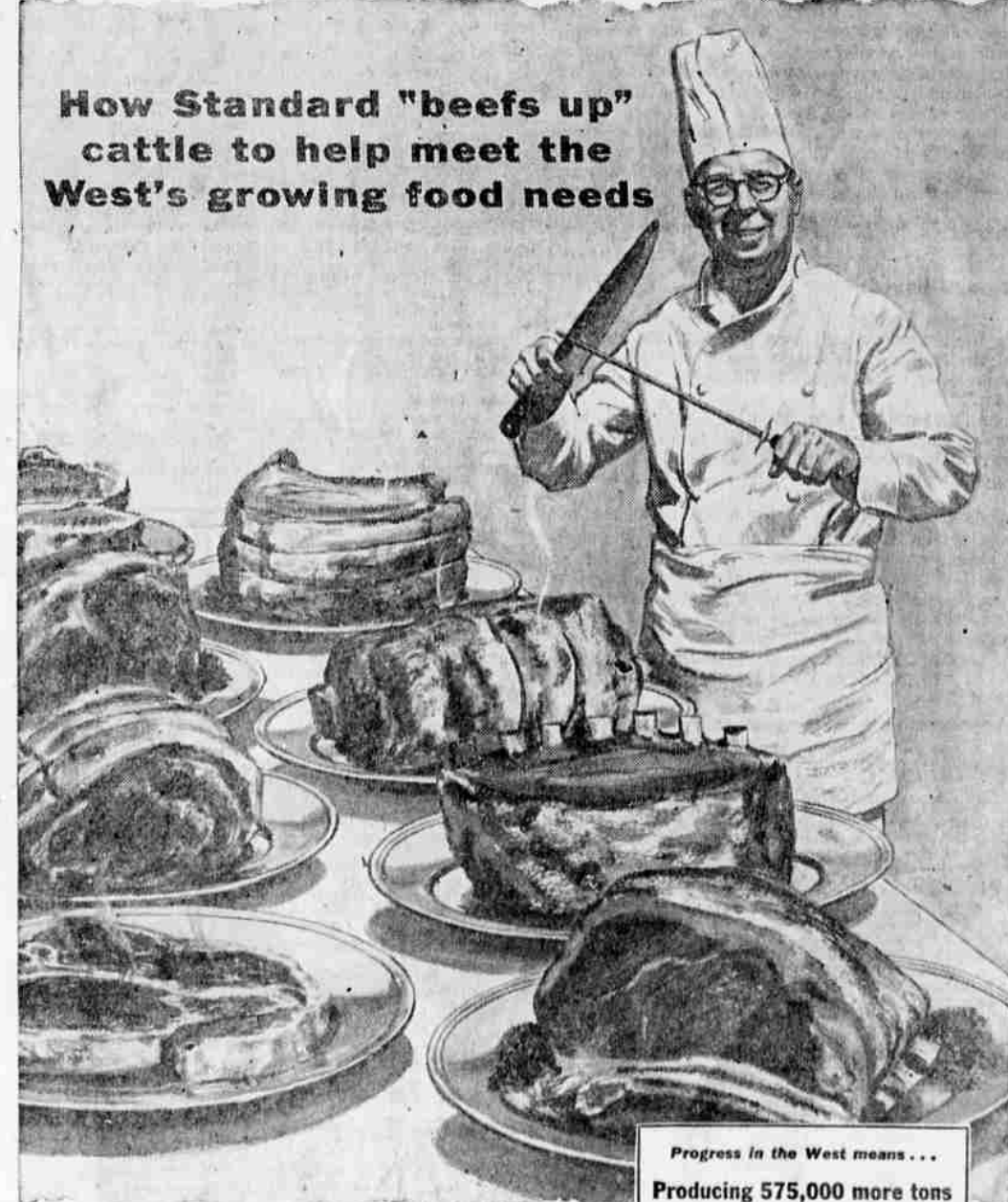
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
