Spring Chinook Salmon Run Still Sub-Average

Fish counts at the Winchester dam counting station remained low through the first half of October, according to the twice-monthly report from the regional office of the Oregon Game Commission at Roseburg.

Low water level and high temperature, coupled with damage from four years ago, are factors believed to be responsible for the very poor showing in fish migration so far this year, observers state. Angling success on fall salmon in the lower river, indicates a large migration, fully up to normal. The fish, however, had not moved upstream through the counting station in average numbers.

The disappointing showing on spring chinook salmon is believed due to floods at the time year-old fish were en route to the ocean. This is the first season since gill-net fishing was stopped that spring chinooks have shown less than 50 per cent increase.

Other migrations are slow but are nearer average and are believed by observers to have been retarded by water conditions.

Wildlife Fishing Funds Available

PORTLAND — Federal aid funds for six Western states, to be used to develop sport fishing and wildlife restoration programs, total \$4,012,361.

This is the largest federal total available to the states of Oregon, Washington, California, Montana, Idaho and Nevada. They can get the federal money by setting up conservation projects which, if approved, bring 75 per cent federal financing, said Leo L. Laythe, Pacific regional director of the Bureau of Sports Fisheries and Wildlife.

Sports fishing program for the six states will receive \$88,838 in fiscal 1958, and the wildlife program \$3,128,522.

Funds for the program come from excise taxes on hunting and fishing equipment.

Totals for Oregon, \$130,363 for fishing, \$484,815 for wildlife; for Washington, \$127,096 for fishing, \$414,828 for wildlife; for Idaho, \$84,203 for fishing, \$354,522 for wildlife.

Stanford Red Faces Big Job In UCLA Bruin

Of all the Pacific Coast Conference football teams on the practice field this week, the Stanford Indians perhaps have the biggest job cut out for them.

"We must shift our thinking and strategies to meet UCLA's single wing," Stanford Coach Chuck Taylor explained. "There's an advantage. We admitted, 'to using a single wing in a predominantly T-formation conference.'"

Taylor ran a brief Monday practice session, boning the Indians on that single wing and working on some "semi-secret" plays.

Air Attack Planned

UCLA Coach Red Sanders was boning the favored Bruins for an air attack against the Indians.

"If we continue to improve," he said, "we have a good chance." The experts, favoring the Bruins by two points, agreed. The Bruins will be pitching a fast aerial game against the Indians' determined ground offense.

California Coach Pete Elliott also followed tradition for Monday practice, running the Bears on loosening up exercises and light scrimmaging.

He said he will alternate quarterback Gabe Arrillaga and new-ly returned Joe Kapp on first and second strings for the Oregon game at Eugene. He said the Duck backfield "is one of the fastest in the country" and he wants to be ready for anything.

End Ron Stover was back in action for Oregon's light workout. He missed the winning game against Washington State because of a chest congestion.

Coach Don Clark was still without a victory as he started USC's practice week on a defense theme. He said there will be some lineup changes before Troy's battle with Washington State Saturday.

New Abortion Charge Faced By Ruth Barnett

PORTLAND — Ruth Barnett, Portland naturopath, was arrested Saturday on a charge of manslaughter by abortion.

She is accused of performing an illegal abortion in September, 1956.

Still pending against Mrs. Barnett is a charge filed last August accusing her of conspiracy to commit manslaughter by abortion.

She posted \$5,000 bail on the latest charge and was released.

Tuition Boosted

PORTLAND — Reed College will increase its tuition \$250 a year, next fall. That will put the total at \$1,050.

President Richard Sullivan said Monday the boost is a result of rising costs of college operation and faculty maintenance.

Phoenix Sought By SF Giants As PCL Farm

SAN FRANCISCO — The San Francisco Giants want their spring training home, Phoenix, Ariz., for their entry in the Pacific Coast League.

Shift of the Dodgers and Giants of the National League to Los Angeles and San Francisco means the PCL, highest minor league in baseball, must be realigned or go out of business.

President Horace Stoneham of the Giants Monday bought the Phoenix franchise and his office here said PCL permission will be sought to locate a team there.

It was the second recent move by Stoneham. A week ago, the Giants and Boston Red Sox traded their minor league franchises. The Giants are to get the San Francisco one in exchange for Minneapolis of the American Assn.

Needs Approval

Since players are not involved in the shifts, the Phoenix club would be manned by many who played for Minneapolis this past season and the Minnesota metropolitans will have the former San Francisco Seals, PCL champs this year.

All this needs approval by six votes in the PCL meeting scheduled for Sacramento on Nov. 1. At this same time the compensation to the PCL will be discussed.

The Giants have held their spring training in Phoenix since 1947.

A spokesman for the PCL said it has not been officially approached on the proposed inclusion of Phoenix in a realigned league.

The spokesman said Phoenix was one of many cities on which the league has compiled information.

"We have studied all those cities which have been mentioned in the press, on radio or on television as possible sites of relocated PCL teams," he said.

Three Needed

At least three new cities must be added, one to replace San Francisco, a second for Los Angeles and a third for Hollywood.

Although Phoenix sources said it was understood the present Phoenix Municipal Stadium did not have sufficient seating capacity for PCL baseball, Stoneham's office noted that the Phoenix park accommodated 9,000 fans for the spring training games.

The PCL seeks to stay in business as a triple-A classification minor league, a notch below its present "open" status.

Local Bank's Deposits Exceed \$18 Million

H. E. Schmeer, manager of the Roseburg branch of the United States National Bank of Portland, reported that the branch had deposits of \$18,637,201.53 as of Oct. 11.

Total deposits for all branches of U. S. National were more than 744 million dollars. Schmeer said this represents an increase of more than 33 million dollars since the last statement of condition report on June 6.

An increase of more than 31 million dollars was noted in Oregon's statewide banking system. Schmeer said the total stood at nearly 822 million dollars on Oct. 11.

A figure of more than 328 million dollars for loans and discounts represented an increase of some 14 million dollars since June. The Roseburg branch reported loans and discounts totaling \$7,350,854.97.

Schmeer said the 63rd branch of U. S. National will be established Nov. 9 in Klamath Falls. The branch, in the suburban Town and Country shopping center, will be the city's second U. S. National office.

Deposits in the Drain branch of the U. S. National Bank stood at \$3,488,132.01 on Oct. 1, according to E. J. Resch, manager.

Portland Fish Market Cash Taken By Thieves

The money was taken from two hidden cash boxes. The empty boxes were found in a nearby street later.

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Gunshot, Heart Attack Kill Two More Hunters

A heart attack and a rifle bullet killed two Oregon deer hunters Sunday. Two other hunters were wounded.

Ernest McKinley, 45, Portland, died Sunday shortly after a rifle bullet hit him in the back as he hunted in the Pringle Falls area, 15 miles south of Bend on the Deschutes River.

State Police recovered the bullet and said it came from a .30-06 rifle. A coroner's inquest was scheduled Monday in Bend, Coroner George Winslow said.

State Police said there was no indication who fired the shot.

McKinley is survived by his widow and two children.

The state's other Sunday hunting death occurred near Ukiah in Eastern Oregon, when an 81-year-old Hermiston farmer, Joseph Henry Crampton, died while hunting deer, apparently of a heart attack.

Five Oregon hunters have died of heart attacks this fall. Four other persons have died of gunshot wounds since the fall hunting season opened in Oregon.

In Sunday's woundings, State Police said Ray Baker of Toledo, Ore., was shot in the leg 50 miles south of Bend. He was reported in good condition.

W. C. Harris, 43, Noti, was reported in critical condition Monday after he was shot Sunday about 15 miles west of Eugene. State Police said Harris was shot in the stomach with a .30-30 bullet.

Buck Gundy of Salem escaped injury Sunday when a horse was shot from under him while he hunted near Bend. The horse was killed.

Governor Asks For Study Of State Building Plans

SALEM — Intensive study of the state building program to prevent what he termed "wasteful or makeshift solutions," was called for by Gov. Robert Holmes Friday.

The governor made the request in letters to Lane County Rep. Keith Skellon, chairman of the legislative Interim Committee on Administrative Reorganization, and to John Richardson, head of the State Department of Finance and Administration.

Analysis of the present building program and of future construction planned for the next 10 years by all state agencies, except the road and bridge programs of the highway department, was sought from Richardson.

Call for the survey of the building situation came only a few days after the two Republican members of the state Board of Control blocked Richardson's plan to construct a new building for the Department of Motor Vehicles near the state penitentiary.

The plan had been favored by the governor.

Secretary of State Mark Hatfield and State Treasurer Sig Unander, who with the governor make up the board, favored leasing temporary quarters for the department, which is now scattered through several buildings in the Capitol Mall area.

In his letter to Skellon, the governor said "the state has on too many occasions resorted to wasteful or makeshift solutions to building needs of public service."

He said that because basic authority over various aspects of plant construction, operation and maintenance is spread among several executive offices, only the legislative branch can conduct a truly comprehensive study of these activities.

The governor cited confusion and sometimes overlapping authority of the various responsible agencies.

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
