BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP)—Four people flying to Las Vegas, Nev., where two were to be married, were killed late Saturday night when their plane plunged into China Grade Bluff.

The partly buried wartime four-seater Cessna trainer was found yesterday with the bodies of Kathleen Moore, 19, the bride to be, of La Crescenta; Hilding Andrew Linde, 22, her fiancé, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hans Lawson Linde, 47 and 42, of Bakersfield. Deputy Sheriff Art Cross said the plane apparently broke up in the air.

CUTS PAPER PRODUCTION
OREGON CITY (AP)—A decreasing market has resulted in a production cut by Publishers Paper Co.

The firm reported it had shut down two paper-making machines for a six-day period, starting Sunday. Earlier, the company said it was going on a five-day work schedule for a two-week trial period.

Educational Secretaries Talk Work Coordination

Members of the Oregon Assn. of Educational Secretaries Saturday held discussion during which the school employees learned ways of making their jobs more efficient by using short cuts.

The discussion groups met at for one of five regional meetings. Mrs. Gloria Jirel of Corvallis presided over the day's activities. She said other sessions will be held at Portland Nov. 2 and at Turner March 1.

Dog Will Be Passenger In Next Russ Satellite

COPENHAGEN (AP)—A dog will circle the earth in the next Soviet satellite, three top Russian rocket experts say.

Lt. Gen. A. A. Blagonravov and Professors S. M. Poloskov and A. M. Kasatkin made the comment as they passed through Copenhagen on the way home from an international meeting in Washington on peace problems.

Blagonravov said radio messages will report to ground observers on the dog's condition. He said his own dog was sent up more than 62 miles in a rocket some years ago.

"The trip lasted about 20 minutes and the dog was all right afterwards," he said.

Eugene Woman Killed In Two-Car Collision

SPRINGFIELD (AP)—Mrs. Ethel Wetzel, 55, of Eugene, was killed Saturday in a two-car collision near here.

She was the driver of an automobile which collided with one driven by Richard Vanderzanden, 29, of Springfield. Vanderzanden and five passengers in the Wetzel car were injured, but none seriously.

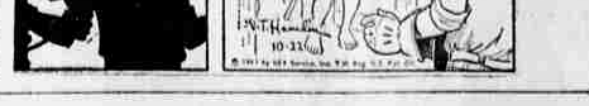
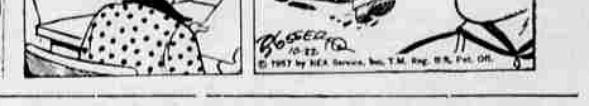
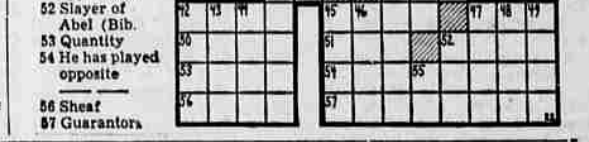
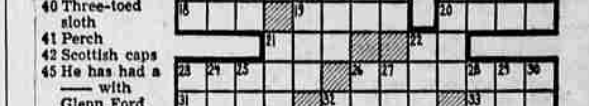
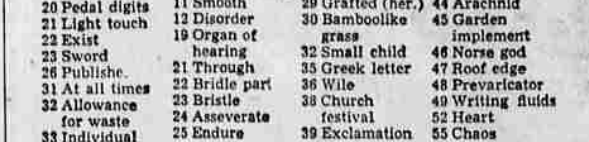
Most of the houses on 12th Place North, where the explosion occurred, either are occupied by Negroes or are vacant.
