



Rademacher Business Exec, But Still In Fighting Trim

COLUMBUS, Ga. (AP) — Pete Rademacher is busy being a business executive these days—but not too busy to keep in trim if the right fight comes along. Rademacher is the Olympic boxing champion who tried to make the long jump from the amateurs to the world's heavyweight title in one fight. He failed, going down before the flailing fists of champion Floyd Patterson. But he wasn't stopped until he'd put up a much better show than the "experts" had expected.

Split Decision Loss Suffered By Kid Gavilan

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The bongo drums boomed out a sad beat today for Kid Gavilan, possibly tolling the end of his dream of recapturing the world welterweight crown. The 31-year-old Kid lost a split decision last night to 22-year-old Gaspar Ortega, 22, of Mexico in a 12-round fight at Wrigley Field.

The winner was promised a match with another contender for the title, Vince Martinez, in an elimination series to fill the title vacated by Carmen Basilio.

Referee Frankie Van gave the decision to Ortega 115-113 on California's 10-point per round scoring system, and Judge Tommy Hart called it 115-112 for the lad from Tijuana. Judge Dynamite Jackson saw it Gavilan 117-113.

The Associated Press scored it 116-115 for Ortega. Most of the ring-side writers, however, had Gavilan the winner.

There is nothing definite as far as his fight future is concerned. "I've been thinking seriously about going on a tour and boxing some exhibitions," Rademacher said. "That'd probably take me out of the country. And it would help me keep in shape in case the right fight comes along."

Pete says if he does fight again he'll be shooting for the top, but that doesn't mean he'll settle for anything except another title shot.

Rademacher said he turned down a \$20,000 offer from the International Boxing Club for a television fight shortly after his loss to Patterson in August and recently turned down another similar offer.

"I felt I had nothing to gain," he explained.

But if Pete's right fight comes along, he'll be ready. He is doing a lot of road and gym work to "try to build up my endurance, which I feel was lacking in the Patterson fight. It would take very little training for me to get in shape if I decide to fight again."

The battle bristled with action and neither fighter could claim a round by more than a point. There were no knockdowns and neither fighter bore a mark at the finish. It was a crushed Gavilan who greeted visitors in the dressing room and it was his exuberant manager Yamil Chade of Havana who supplied the dramatics.

Chade announced that the Kid's career was over at one stage. Then he tried to tear up Gavilan's California license, a sheet of paper enclosed in oilcloth and bound in heavy cardboard. The document wouldn't tear.

"My spirit, it is low. He no hurt me ever. I wait two years for this chance to get in title fight. Now chance, it is gone I think," said the sad Kid, a devotee of bongo thumping in his play period.

Gavilan said he thought he was well after 10 rounds and merely played it safe in the closing rounds.

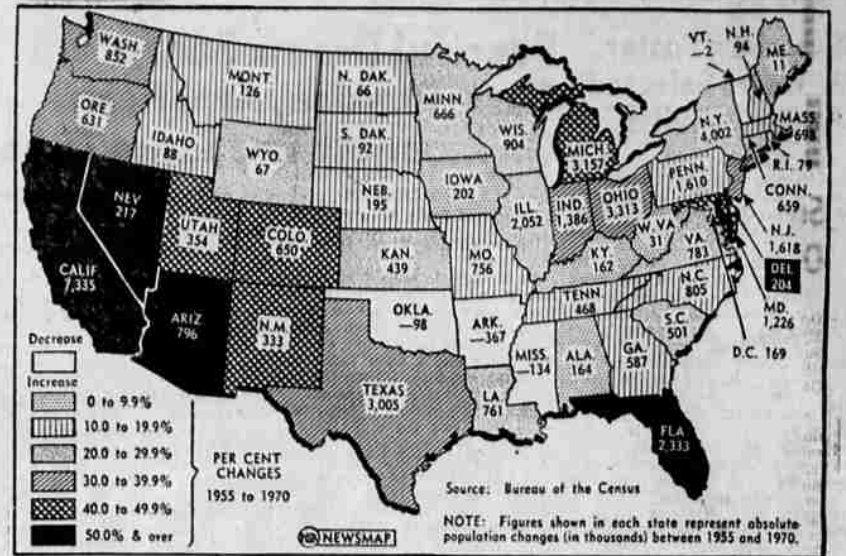

EXPANDING POPULATION—What the populations of the 48 states will probably be like by 1970 is indicated on the Newsmap above. It illustrates the projections made by the Bureau of the Census which are based on three factors: migration, birth rate and mortality rate. The western states are expected to lead the increase, with California eventually outstripping New York as the most populous state in the union. According to Census Bureau estimates, the total U.S. population in 1970 will be in the neighborhood of 220 million people. That only 15 million of this total will reside on farms is an important indicator of the changing make-up of our population and economy. The estimated population at present, as recently announced by the Bureau, stands at 171,790,000, an increase of over 20 million since the last official census in 1950.

Probers Told Company Worked To Block Union

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate rackets probers heard testimony Tuesday that the Morton Frozen Foods plant in Webster City, Iowa, worked undercover to keep out one labor union, then signed "a very poor contract" with the Bakers Workers Union.

The allegations came from Gary Long, Whittier, Calif., a former Morton employee who said he helped to fight the first union, and Eugene Peterson, an organizer and field representative of the United Packinghouse Workers of America, the union which lost out to the bakers.

Peterson estimated the Morton company saved nearly \$200,000 a year by negotiating with the bakers a contract which he said guaranteed its women employees 26 cents an hour less than its union would have demanded, and made employees 46 cents an hour less.

The two witnesses testified that agents of Nathan W. Shefferman, a Chicago consultant to employers on labor troubles, was instrumental in keeping out the Packinghouse Workers and negotiating the contract with the Bakery Workers Union.

The hearing was launched over

protests from Thomas S. Dawson, general counsel of Morton Frozen Foods, Inc., and Roy M. Anderson, assistant general counsel of Continental Baking Co., with which it has merged.

They argued that the testimony might prejudice National Labor Relations Board hearings. Committee members went into a huddle and Chairman McClellan (D-Ark.) then told the lawyers the committee had agreed unanimously to reject their plea for a postponement of the hearing.

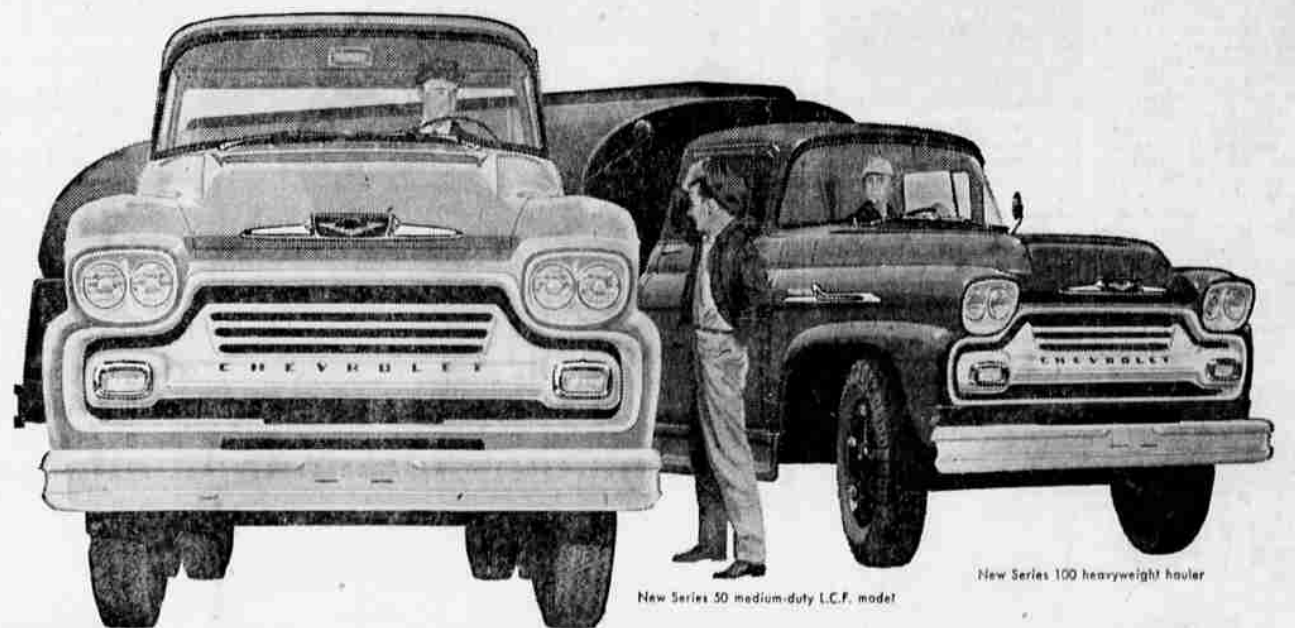

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Boxing Stylist Pastrano Earns Cheers In Decision

LONDON (AP) — Willie Pastrano goes back to the boxing ring after a week's vacation after convincing British judges his chances are good of becoming the first all-out boxing stylist to capture the world heavyweight title since Gene Tunney. The 21-year-old boxer from New Orleans earned British cheers with a 10-round decision over a 23-year-old Welshman, Dick Richardson, Tuesday night in what may herald a new era in the heavyweight world where sluggers have reigned supreme.

A sellout crowd of 11,000 at London's Harringay Stadium hailed Pastrano's victory as one man.

They revelled in the way Pastrano left jabbed and boxed his way to victory against slugger Richardson.

Pastrano reduced Richardson to a blood dripping wreck at the end.

And he did it with a poking left hand and lightning speed around the ring that left British fans limp with admiration.

Richardson tried to land his payoff punch but Pastrano was never there.

It was a boxing treat for the fans and a lesson for the inexperienced Richardson.

Now Pastrano has just one aim—to get back home and jump into the ring again against Texan Roy Harris.

It was Harris who outpointed Pastrano in a 10-rounder in June. "I was about the only man present that night who thought Pastrano had won," said Willie's trainer, Angelo Dundee.

"But all we want is to get Harris back in the ring again—then we'll see. Pastrano is only a kid—but a great kid."
