Oregon Employers Face Higher Payroll Taxes

picture is bad, because normally, this is the period in which the fund is built up through virtually no unemployment.

In the same period a year ago, income was 200 per cent higher than outgo.

"The trouble," Norton said, "is not that benefits are high, but that the payroll taxes have been too low. Under our experience rating, employers have saved 150 million dollars since the end of World War II."

"Some critics say our benefits are high, but they are only 36 per cent of the average weekly wage. The theory of unemployment compensation is that benefits should be half of the weekly wage."

Norton said employers in Washington State pay an average rate of 2 per cent, compared with Oregon's 1.45.

"In every year since the end of the war," Norton said, "our benefit totals have exceeded the employer contributions, with the single exception of 1951."

The trust fund reached its peak in 1948 with an 86½ million dollar total. Soon it will be only half that.

Norton said an advisory committee will be appointed soon by Gov. Holmes to study the whole picture. It will make an actuarial study of what the next seven years should bring.

State Court Backs Wimberly's Ruling In SP Death Case

The State Supreme Court in Salem has upheld a Douglas County Circuit Court decision for Southern Pacific Co. in the case of Harry C. Marks vs. S.P. A jury verdict had originally awarded Marks \$5,000.

Marks was executor of the will of John E. Marks, who was killed Sept. 2, 1952, when his pickup stalled on the SP crossing on Garden Valley Road in Roseburg and was struck by a train. The suit against SP charged that it was negligent in failing to stop and operating the train at a high rate of speed, but SP countered that Marks himself was guilty of negligence and that it did not have a last clear chance to avoid the accident. SP cited the case of Emmons vs. SP and other decisions of the Oregon Supreme Court relating to the doctrine of "last clear chance" as a precedence.

As a result of this action, Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly ordered that the original jury judgment of \$5,000 be cancelled and that the defendants had judgment in their favor against the plaintiff.

In an opinion by Supreme Court Justice George Rossman, the Supreme Court held that the train had given repeated blasts with its whistle, but that Marks had failed to get out of his truck until it was too late. The court said that train Engineer Clarence W. Wilson did all he could to avoid hitting Marks.

B. of Los Angeles; two daughters, Eva Smith of Los Angeles and Katherine Rose of El Monte, Calif.; one sister, Virginia Moran of Pico, Calif.; three brothers, William Bustard of Long Beach, Calif., and Thomas and Edwin Bustard of Baltimore, Md.; and 12 grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Sunday at 2:30 p.m. at the Church of Christ, 211 W. Military Ave., Roseburg. Glen W. Lundy, Walter Hudson, and Henry Geortzen will officiate. Vault interment will follow at Roseburg Memorial Gardens. Stearns and Little Mortuary is in charge of arrangements.

Sears Executive Admits Mistakes

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Sears Roebuck & Co. vice president accused Nathan Shefferman, some executives of the big mail order house Friday of "disgraceful" unfair labor practices against labor union organization efforts at its Boston store in 1953.

But Wallace Tudor, vice president in charge of personnel and employee relations, told the Senate subcommittee investigating committee these were "glaring exceptions" to Sears' over-all history of dealing with its 295,000 workers.

He insisted most of its employees feel they are "better off" than employees of competitors, whether organized or not, and described employee benefits they receive.

The committee, assigned by the Senate to search for evidence of racketeering and other malpractice in employer-employee relations is deep in an investigation of the relations between employees and Shefferman, a Chicagoan described in the public hearings as a specialist in "union busting."

The committee is exploring what happened when the Retail Clerks Union attempted to organize Sears stores in the Boston area in 1953.

Air Force Takes Distance Record For IRBM Tests

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force apparently has captured the distance record for intermediate range ballistic missile tests in its continuing competition with the Army.

A Thor intermediate range ballistic missile fired Thursday by the Air Force from its Cape Canaveral, Fla., test center was reported to have traveled 2,500 miles over the Atlantic Ocean.

This would be several hundred miles beyond the unofficially reported distance for an Army Jupiter. At least one Army firing was described unofficially as having gone about 2,200 miles. This was an actual Jupiter weapon, not the experimental vehicle designated as Jupiter-C. One of these devices was fired to a range of more than 3,000 miles.

The Air Force Thor test Thursday followed by a day a spectacular demonstration of the new Air Force long range anti-aircraft missile, the Bomarc.

This weapon, made by Boeing Airplane Co., tracked down and destroyed a drone bomber more than 100 miles away, the Air Force said. The reported full range of the Bomarc is understood to be between 200 and 300 miles.

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Wants Law Modified

Pressure On To Send Dag To Mid East

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — A move developed here Friday, reportedly with U.S. support, to send U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld on a special peace mission to Turkey and Syria.

Informal quarters said several countries, including Peru, Paraguay and Norway, were working on a plan embodying this idea and were prepared to lay it before the 82-nation General Assembly which resumes its Middle East debate Friday afternoon.

These sources said the United States had indicated it would prefer to send the secretary general to the troubled area rather than a commission of inquiry such as Syria has suggested. Turkey was reported cool toward the suggested commission.

Meanwhile, Syria continued to stand firm against pressure from some other Arab countries that it accept the mediation offer of King Saud of Saudi Arabia. Syrian delegates met with representatives of the other 10 Arab countries for forty minutes Friday morning without any change in position.

Saudi Arabia's Ahmad Shukairy was reported to have urged Syria once more to agree to mediation. He said after the meeting, however, that the Syrians are still standing on their plan for an investigating commission.

Four Dissenters

The Federation's Executive Council voted 25-4 yesterday to suspend the 1½ million member Teamsters Union, the nation's largest labor organization.

The suspension from AFL-CIO membership will hold good until the truck drivers' union ousts James R. Hoffa, its president-elect, and otherwise rids itself of alleged corrupt elements.

George Meany, AFL-CIO president directing labor's anticorruption campaign, said that unless these reforms are accomplished quickly, the Teamsters will face formal expulsion from the Federation at the AFL-CIO convention in December.

Hoffa angrily declined any comment on the AFL-CIO suspension decision as he stomped out of Federation headquarters. Earlier, Hoffa had said the Teamsters could go it alone outside the main body of labor if forced to do so.
