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Jefferson, No. 5, spotted Benson, the 1956 Portland League champion, a safety and came back to win convincingly, 26-2. A 60-yard run with an intercepted pass by end Bob Christiansen started Jefferson on its way.

Grant, No. 7, kept pace with Jefferson in the Portland race with a 27-7 victory over Washington. The two teams meet Nov. 8 in a game that should decide the city championship. The league sends two teams to the class A-1 playoffs.

Beaverton, No. 3, continued to pace the Metropolitan League (district 3) race, defeating Hillsboro, 27-0. Halfback Mickey Sinner ran 43 yards to a touchdown on the third play of the game.

Milwaukie, No. 8, stayed right behind Beaverton in that league with a 27-0 triumph over Gresham. Quarterback Gary Albright threw touchdown passes good for 68 and 15 yards and plunged over for another score.

South Salem, with Gary Dallman scoring four times, turned in the most impressive performance of the night, crushing Bend, 66-0. One of Dallman's scores was on an 81-yard run. South Salem, No. 4 in the poll and undefeated, won in Valley League (district 8) play, rolled up a net yardage total of 605.

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# Tribe Comeback Nets 19-7 Win Over Crescent City Team

## Season's Record Is Evened At 3-3

A determined band of Roseburg Indians came back strong in the final three periods of play Friday night to crush the Crescent City, Calif. Warriors 19-7 in a non-league football game played on Finlay Field.

A crunching ground game along with a couple of well-placed passes spoiled the difference in the end as Roseburg taking advantage of two breaks, evened their season's record at three wins and three losses.

The Indians, after taking a thumping in the opening period, which saw Crescent City take a 7-0 lead, came back strong with single touchdowns in each of the three remaining quarters to take the much needed win.

Behind At Half  
Even though the Indians perked up in the last three quarters they still had to come from behind in the second half. A missed extra point try by Brent Long after the second period touchdown saw the Warriors leave the field at half time with a 7-0 lead.

Crescent City opened the scoring with just two minutes left in the first quarter on a five-yard pass from quarterback Bill Sullivan to tackle Jim Rombach. This came on the fourth straight pass completion of the game for the Warriors. Burt Markillee booted the extra point.

The touchdown drive of the Warriors carried them 57 yards in only eight plays, with Sullivan pitching to his teammates on four of those occasions. The first play of the drive was a pass from Sullivan to Drew Roberts for 35 yards and a first down on the Roseburg 21-yard line. He then pitched 17 yards to Roberts again before a completed pass to Dale Nickel netted them no gain. Then came the touchdown drive to Rombach, who was an eligible receiver on that side of the line.

An attempted Warrior punt in which the centered ball was thrown into the kicker's head gave Roseburg the ball on the Crescent City 39-yard line late in the second period. Nine plays later Roseburg had its first score, with Dennis Batsch going over from the five-yard line. The biggest gain of this drive was a 33-yard pass from quarterback Rod Hoenisch to Bill White. Fullback Bob Steele also figured in the drive as he made several good gains through the Warrior line.

One First Down  
After receiving the second half kickoff, Hoenisch attempted a pass

and Sullivan intercepted on his own 33-yard line and returned it to the 36, before he was knocked down by a swarm of Indian tacklers. Crescent City then pushed for its only first down of the second half to the Roseburg 33-yard line where they lost the ball on downs.

From its own 33, Roseburg moved to its go ahead touchdown in nine plays, with Russ Pinard going the final yard on a fourth and goal situation. A Hoenisch to Bradly pass that was good for 40 yards and a 21-yard dash by White were the main ground gains in this drive. Long then stepped to the line and placed the ball through the posts for a 13-7 Roseburg lead. This score came with a total of 15 yards loss during the brief time they had their hands on the ball.

On the first play of the fourth quarter end Greg Stevens, on some fine defensive work, blocked a Warrior punt on the Roseburg 16-yard line and an alert tackle Tom Tom-ashke fell on the loose ball on the 28. Ten plays later Roseburg had its third touchdown, with Pinard again pushing over from the one-yard line. Long's kick was again low to make the score 19-7, with almost seven minutes left in the game.

Crescent City took the kickoff and even though they completed two passes that were good for 27 yards, failed to garner a first down and Roseburg took Crescent City's kick on Roseburg's own 22-yard line. The alert Indian defense threw Crescent City runners for a total of 15 yards loss during the brief time they had their hands on the ball.

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On the third play Pinard fumbled the ball and Crescent City recovered on Roseburg's 32-yard line. On the first play after the fumble

In nabbing its fifth win in league play and the sixth of the season without a defeat, the Pirates had to come from behind with a two-touchdown second quarter to snare the win.

Phoenix took the opening kickoff and reached pay dirt in seven plays, with Faytinger taking the ball the final 10 yards of the drive. James then added the extra point on a line smash.
