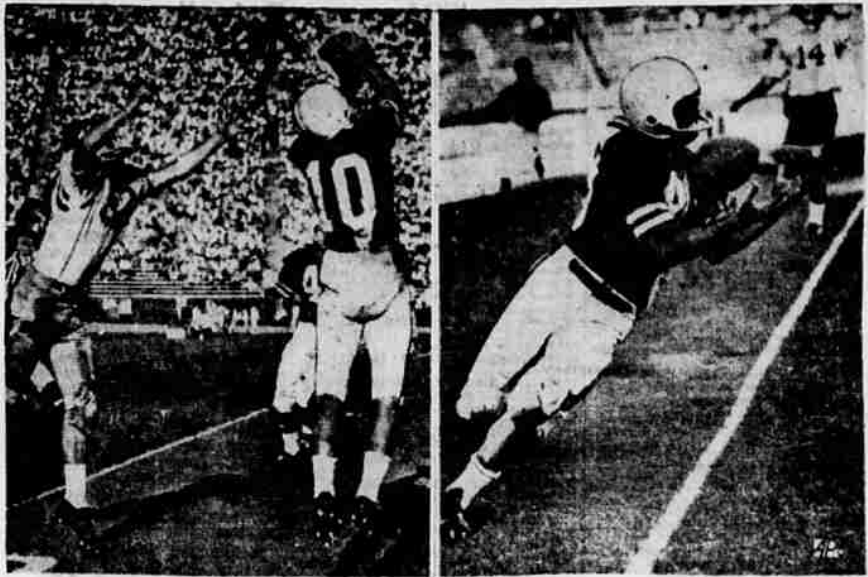

Long before you read this, the first weekend of the 3rd Timber Capital Tourney will be history. You'll get more news by reading what Jim Vance and Bob Monroe say in today's paper than in this column. So we'll say very little about it till next week.

However, we might state that doubles and singles are also quite satisfactory as to numbers. We have 106 sets of men's doubles and 212 singles, compared to 109 and 218 the first time, and 112 and 224 last year. The women have produced 47 doubles and 94 singles, compared to the first tournament's 54 doubles and 108 singles, and last year's 33 and 66. So it's gonna be quite an affair after all.

Jack Norton hit a big one for 236, and Jack Comiskey converted a 3-7-10 Xmas tree.

Bob Smith had a 580 without a 200, and Mike Bruesseau a 579 with one, (a 213). Fred Palermo was hottest for a long time, connecting for 205-228 and 590 Wednesday night. Bud Briggs had a 228 and Herb Morrison 225.

AMONG THE LADIES, Jewell Pratt and Irene Busenbaker tied for high set in the Rolling Pin swingers with identical 45's. Velda Ellison hit a 177, good for a case of Pepsi Cola, and Polly Winders had one stick too many for another.

OLIVE COON also was a pin too good with another 178. The Ladies Classic produced some excellent counts. Fran Knudsen led the wheel with 331, including 184-194 lines. Mary Circle and Corky Stewart tied for high game, both with huge 197's. Joyce Myers was close behind with 194, followed by Miz Nichols' 189, Ina Hooven's 187, Circle's 185 and a 180 by Flo Slack.

The San Francisco 49ers, who do their winning in streaks, are at it early this year, and, coupled with the flip-flop fortunes of their rivals, it might just be enough to give the Prospects their first National Football League division title.

Victory No. 4, since an opening game loss, was a comeback 21-17 over the Chicago (who's afraid of the big bad) Bears Sunday that enabled San Francisco to open up a full game Western Conference lead over Baltimore and Detroit.

The Colts and Lions, sharing the top spot with the 49ers at the start of play, cooperated nicely—Baltimore blowing a tidy lead for the second straight week to go down, 24-21 to Green Bay, and Detroit succumbing under a Los Angeles rout, 35-17.

Cleveland's revived Browns matched the Frisco story in Eastern competition, spilling the Chicago Cardinals 17-7 and taking over sole possession of the lead as Washington bounced New York's defending Champion Giants 31-14.

Steelers Blank Eagles
Pittsburgh, pulling into a second place tie with New York, blanked Philadelphia 6-0 in the last of Sunday's six-game program.

The 49ers, behind 14-0 at the outset, touched off their winning rally after learning Tony Morabito, the club's co-owner, had suffered a fatal heart attack during the second period of the game at Kezar Stadium. A pair of key pass interceptions, clinched by another clutch punt touchdown pass by Y. A. Tittle, did it this time for the leaders, who have whipped Los Angeles, 23-20, Green Bay 24-14 and the Bears 21-17 twice since bowing to the Cards, 20-10 in their opener.

Tackle Bill Herchman scored one San Francisco touchdown with a 54-yard runback of a piffled Ed Brown pass and Dicky Moegle, with three interceptions for the day, set up the clincher with a 40-yard runback. Tittle passed the last 11 yards to Billy Wilson, sinking the Bears' division championship hopes.

Fourth quarter nightmares plagued the Colts against Green Bay, just as they had for Baltimore against Detroit the previous week. Leading 14-0, the Colts fell behind 17-14, rallied in the last minute on a Johnny Unitas TD pass, then lost when the Packers' Babe Parilli and Bill Howton combined on a 75-yard scoring pass play with 29 seconds left.

Don Sutherland, Ohio State — His 14-yard field goal beat Wisconsin 16-13 and kept Buckeye Rose Bowl hopes alive.

Tom Forrestal, Navy — Threw four TD passes, targeting half-back Harry Hurst for three of them, in 35-7 victory over Penn. State.

Alex Karras, Iowa — All-American tackle recovered fumble that set up 6-0 victory over Northwestern.

George Walker, Arkansas — His excellent signal calling twice caught Mississippi flat-footed with passes that scored one TD and set up other in 12-0 upset.

Don Pelham, Florida — Gator end blocked punt for safety that opened scoring in 22-14 upset of Louisiana State.

Jack Cummings, North Carolina — Little used sophomore, getting chance when disciplinary action benched Tar Heels' No. 1 quarterback, passed for one TD and set up other in 14-7 decision over Wake Forest.

Johnny Maio, Boston U. — Scored four TDs, one on an 83-yard punt return, in 35-28 upset of Holy Cross.

Don Nolan, Lehigh — Clever signal caller for unbeaten Engineers scored twice and passed for two other TDs in 40-6 route of Columbia.

Bufs Battle Before Losing

On the face of it, a team like Colorado should be looking forward to its game with Missouri this Saturday with no particular concern.

The Buffaloes already have showed they are made of the sternest stuff by barely losing to mighty Oklahoma, 14-13, Missouri, on the other hand had four victories, a loss and a tie on its record.

Strange Part
But there is a peculiar history connected to this Big Eight rivalry. In the past 16 years, Colorado—probably the only team that does not roll over and play dead when Oklahoma shows up—has beaten Missouri just once. That was a 34-13 decision in 1931.

Whatever happens, though, if any team ever was entitled to break the Oklahoma winning streak (if that day ever comes), it is Colorado. Over the years, Colorado has given Sooner coach Bud Wilkinson legitimate cause to see figures in the shadows.

Look at the record for the past four years: The Sooners go by, 27-20, in 1953, in 1954 it was 13-6, in 1955 it was 56-21 and last year it was 27-19. That last one was the only real ball game on the Sooners' '57 schedule.

The '57 edition was the closest yet with the Sooners coming from behind in the last quarter to chalk up their 45th straight victory by the margin of point-after-touchdown.

Have Weaknesses
But Oklahoma, ranked No. 1 in The Associated Press poll, has weaknesses. The Sooners should not have any trouble with Kansas State this week or Missouri the following week, but Nov. 16, they run into tough Notre Dame.

The Sooners are eligible for the Orange Bowl since Colorado represented the league there last Jan. 1.
