

Youth Admits Grenade Damage To High School

BAKER — Wayne Edward Collins, 18, who police say admitted throwing two grenades at a junior high school here Friday night, was arraigned Monday on a charge of maliciously throwing a bomb.

Maximum penalty on conviction is 20 years in prison.

Police Chief Clifford Murray said Collins told him he threw the grenades on the school's steps because he was angry at his employer, George Erickson, a Baker area farmer, and "wanted to get even with someone."

There were 200 children at a party inside the school at the time. None was injured. Damage to the school was minor.

GIRL DIES OF PLAGUE

WICHITA FALLS, Tex. — Bubonic plague, which once killed thousands but now considered rare, is blamed for the death of a little Texas girl who vacationed in Colorado.

Four-year-old Laura Bryans of Wichita Falls died of the disease Sept. 11 but the cause of her death did not become generally known until yesterday.

Announces 1958 Car Price Hikes

DETROIT — Price increases ranging from 2 per cent in the Oldsmobile line to 5.7 per cent for Pontiac were announced Monday by the General Motors car divisions for 1958 model automobiles.

Chevrolets, GM's No. 1 sellers, are up an average of 4.5 per cent. The new prices for the Oldsmobile line range from \$2,514.00 for the two-door sedan in the "66" series to \$3,915 for the convertible coupe in the "98" series. In the 1957 line these prices ranged from \$2,478.47 to \$3,838.05 respectively.

Buick's prices, up 2.3 per cent, range from \$2,388 for the two-door sedan in the "Special" series to \$4,263 for the convertible coupe in the roadmaster series. In the 1957 line these prices ranged from \$2,352.33 to \$4,162.33, respectively. The new Buick "Limited" series is priced for 1958 at \$4,549 for the two-door hardtop to \$4,663 for the convertible coupe, not offered in 1957.

The Cadillac line for 1958, up 3.3 per cent will carry price tags ranging from \$4,375 for the "62" coupe to \$6,910 for the Eldorado Biarritz and Eldorado Seville. In 1957 models these cars were priced at \$4,275 and \$6,711, respectively.

Chevrolet Scale Listed

Chevrolet shows a range of from \$1,824 for the standard two-door sedan in the Delray series to \$2,286 for the four-door Bel Air sport sedan. In the 1957 line these models were priced at \$1,723.82 and \$2,168.82 respectively.

Chevrolet also announced its station wagon line would range in price from \$2,194 for the Yeoman two-door, six-passenger unit to

\$2,847 for the Nomad, four-door, six-passenger model. In the 1957 line these models ranged from \$2,123.82 to \$2,376, respectively. In all instances the prices quoted are for six-cylinder models. Models with 8-cylinder engines are \$100 higher.

Taxes Extra

Pontiac's 1958 prices disclose the lowest model at \$2,335 and its highest at \$2,927. In the 1957 line the range was from \$2,284.34 to \$2,708.89. The Pontiac line for 1958 includes two custom cars in the new Bonneville series, not in the 1957 line.

All the prices announced are factory list, exclusive of federal taxes, state and local taxes, handling and delivery charges and optional equipment.

In all instances, the GM divisions said the higher 1958 prices are due to increased production costs, better styling and improved engineering. All also said that "entirely new" cars are being offered for 1958 with dozens of improvements in bodies and in engines.

Former Glide Resident Passes In Indiana

Walter B. McMillen, a former employee of the U.S. Forest Service at Glide, died Oct. 26 in Charlestown, Ind. He is survived by his wife, Frances McMillen of Charlestown; one daughter, Mrs. Lowell (Eileen) Olson of Eugene, and one brother, N. W. McMillen of Idlewild Park.

McMillen was born Feb. 22, 1877, in Summit, Ohio and came to Oregon in 1898 where he homesteaded in the North Umpqua area.

Complaints

Alfred C. Reynolds vs. Walter C. and Evelyn Watkins, d. b. a. Walt's Towing and Ambulance Service and others. Plaintiff charges that on Sept. 28, 1956, a logging truck belonging to him was resting in a damaged condition near the bottom of a canyon adjacent to Little River Road about 20 miles south of Glide when the defendants allegedly attempted to raise the truck without permission, causing the truck to fall into the canyon, inflicting greater damage and causing the motor to fall out. Plaintiff asks for \$2,850 in damages.

Lee Mortenson, Inc. vs. Steinger Lumber Co. Plaintiff charges that he performed contracted work for the defendant but allegedly has not received payment for the work performed. Plaintiff asks for \$4,711.42 as the balance owed on the work completed.

Stanford L. Cody, d. b. a. Oregon Investigators, vs. Ardie W. Scott. Plaintiff demands judgment for sum of \$609.53 allegedly owed by defendant on defendants' auto.

D. W. Parazoo and Charlotte Parazoo vs. Wendelyn O. and Sara A. Knapp. Plaintiffs charge that the defendants are wrongfully in possession of real property belonging to the plaintiffs and ask for \$280, in damages.

R. H. Benson vs. Nelson Geer. Plaintiff charges that defendant issued a promissory note Jan. 15, 1956 and has failed to make payments. Plaintiff asks for judgment of \$1,000.

John E. Wood vs. Bill Schultz. Plaintiff asks for judgment of \$1,150 against the defendant for allegedly unpaid debt.

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Sanity Trial Set For Child Choker

SEATTLE — A Ballard fisherman who strangled his two sons to "rid them of the devil" in 1934 will be granted a trial to determine his sanity.

Prosecutor Charles O. Carroll said Friday he has received affidavits granting permission for Oscar Hestnes, 60, to petition for the trial. Hestnes has been in the criminally insane ward at state prison since early 1934.

Both Hestnes and his wife, Maria, were sent to prison. After the killing of John Hestnes, 10,

and Henry, 4, the father told authorities he was the "Prophet of God." Robert M. Bergunder, then King County prosecutor, recommended life imprisonment.

Dr. Edward G. Hodgson, physician in charge of the ward at Walla Walla, was reported by Carroll as saying there is "reasonable cause to believe that Hestnes is sane, mentally responsible and safe to be at large."

The prosecutor said the law requires that Hestnes be granted a jury trial on his present sanity.

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
