

County Grange Okays State Convention Bid

Pomona Grange of Douglas County has decided to invite the state grange to hold its convention in Roseburg in 1959.

The decision was made at the last Pomona meeting at Azalea following a report by Master Howard Cracroft. He said he had conferred with Roseburg Chamber of Commerce members on the subject of the state convention and the conference had proved favorable.

At the same meeting, Cracroft tendered his resignation as Pomona master to accept an appointment as county grange deputy. His resignation was accepted, and Emmitt Walters of Riversdale Grange was elected to finish out the year still remaining in the two-year term.

He was immediately installed by the retiring master. He will take up his new duties at the January meeting.

The next Pomona meeting will be held at the IOOF Hall in Sutherlin. The Sutherlin grange will host the Jan. 25 session.

It was announced that installation of officers would be observed at Sunnydale Grange Dec. 8 at 2 p.m. and Dec. 15 at 2 p.m.

South Umpqua Grange was awarded 10 dollars for having the most members present at the meeting, and Azalea Grange was awarded \$15 for being host.

Of the 18 subordinate granges in the county, 12 had representatives at the meeting. Seventy-nine people attended. Henry Hendrixson, state deputy from Portland was honored guest.

The fifth degree was exemplified by the Pomona master and the degree team. Six new members received it, and one was received by demit.

The business session later was devoted to reports from different committees.

Secretary Grace Croft read letters from Sen. Wayne Morse and from Hershel Newsome, national grange master, the latter on overall grange programs.

A highlight of the meeting was a talk by Hendrixson on a subject entitled "The Changing of the Times in Agriculture."

NATO Forces To Hold Maneuvers Near Turkey
IZMIR, Turkey — NATO land, air and sea forces will hold three day maneuvers this week on Turkey's southwestern coast, headquarters of NATO's Southeast Europe land forces announced.

The maneuvers, from Oct. 31 to Nov. 2, will feature mock atomic attacks and participation of the U.S. guided missile cruiser Canberra.

A communique said other units taking part in the exercise—called "Red Epoch"—would include submarines from the Allied Command at Malta, the British Royal Air Force and units of the U.S. 6th Fleet in the Mediterranean.

Flu Epidemic Kills 3 Children; 550 Bedfast
SEATTLE — An influenza epidemic raging at the Rainier State School in Buckley, Wash., had claimed the lives of three children by Monday, and five more were listed in critical condition.

Dr. Wesley White, superintendent, said the three deaths were from pneumonia following influenza.

Two boys, 7 and 8 years of age, died late Saturday night. A 13-year-old boy was the first death Friday.

The five critically ill and three others were in oxygen tents Monday. All were characterized as of the "most helpless" type at the school.

Dr. White said about 550 children were bedfast Monday with the Asian-like flu and the number falling ill has been increasing by about 100 daily.

The state school houses 1,350 handicapped children.

Two doctors have been added to the school's staff and 20 new employees, some of them nurses, have been hired to help out during the epidemic which is expected to reach its peak within a few days.

State Health Department officials began compiling statistics Monday on the number of flu and respiratory cases reported in Washington last week. They said they hoped the figures would give some indication whether the outbreak is leveling off. There were 5,400 cases reported in the state in the previous week, compared to 2,900 a week earlier.

CARRY OUT RAIDS
TAIPEI — Military officials announced today that Chinese Nationalist forces in the Matsu Islands have carried out 24 patrol missions on the Red China Mainland in the past six months.

The announcement said the patrols killed "scores" of Communist soldiers and captured 21 small boats.

FILES FOR BANKRUPTCY
Ardie W. Scott, Roseburg millworker, has entered a bankruptcy petition in U. S. District Court, Portland. He claims debts of \$8,347.17.

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This car stood at Buckingham Palace, rolled up the Champs Elysees to the Arc de Triomphe, and passed at the Eiffel Tower.
