Oregon, OSC Cagers To Meet In Openers

Oregon and Oregon State will meet Dec. 3 in Eugene in the first basketball game of the season for both teams.

The game will launch a pre-conference schedule that will carry OSC into the Midwest and Oregon into the Rocky Mountain states.

Oregon State winds up the pre-conference games with the Far West Classic, Dec. 27-28, at Corvallis. Oregon's final game before the start of the Pacific Coast Conference race will be against Colorado State at Fort Collins, Dec. 27.

The other pre-conference games: OSC—Portland University at Corvallis, Dec. 6; Portland at Vancouver, Wash., Dec. 7; Seattle University at Corvallis, Dec. 12; Gonzaga at Corvallis, Dec. 14; Iowa at Iowa City, Dec. 21; Indiana at Bloomington, Dec. 21.

Oregon—Utah State at Eugene, Dec. 6-7; San Jose at Eugene, Dec. 10-11; Brigham Young at Provo, Utah, Dec. 21 and 22.

Giants' H. Sauer 'Comeback' Star In National Loop

NEW YORK — "Big Hank" Sauer, 38, who hit 26 home runs to give the Giants a needed lift in their last season in New York, made the National League Comeback of the Year in 1957.

This was the verdict of the members of the Baseball Writers' Assn. who participated in The Associated Press annual poll.

Sixty-four of the 139 participating writers felt Sauer's recovery from a poor season in 1956 was the most noteworthy. Cincinnati third baseman Don Hoak was second with 29 votes.

Gomez Third
Far back in third place was Giants' pitcher Ruben Gomez with seven votes. He was followed by first baseman Stan Musial of St. Louis with six and Brooklyn pitcher Johnny Podres with five.

Sauer embellished his 1957 home run output with 76 runs batted in. He batted .259 in 127 games. His 26 circuit swells increased his total for 13 big league seasons to 275.

The resident of Inglewood, Calif., was given his unconditional release by the St. Louis Cardinals at the close of the 1956 campaign. He was picked up by the Giants as a free agent.

Sauer's 1956 batting average was .298. But he played in 75 games, many of them as a pinch-hitter, and managed five homers and 24 RBIs.

Hank's best year was 1952 when he led the National League with 37 homers and 121 runs batted in for the fifth-place Chicago Cubs. He won the Most Valuable Player Award. He is the only member of a second-division club to have done so.

Hoak also was helped by a change of uniform the past season. In 1956 he hit .215 for the Cubs. With the Redlegs he had a .293 average along with 19 homers and 90 RBIs. In 10 previous professional seasons — major and minor league — Don never hit more than seven home runs.

Gomez, who compiled a 7-17 record last year, won 15 games and lost 13 in 1957. He was the Giants' biggest winner.

Musial High
Musial won his seventh league batting title with a .351 average after finishing with .310 the previous season. Podres, in his first season out of Uncle Sam's Navy, captured the earned run title with 2.66 and won 12 games while losing nine.

Slugging outfielder Del Ennis of St. Louis was named as the comeback player on four ballots. Red Schoendienst, Milwaukee second baseman, got three votes.

Players with two votes were first baseman Dee Fondy, shortstop Dick Groat and pitcher Vern Law of Pittsburgh, pitcher Curt Simmons and shortstop Grady Hatton of Philadelphia, third baseman Eddie Mathews of Milwaukee and first baseman Gil Hodges of Brooklyn.

Dresen Named Dodger Coach

LOS ANGELES — Baseball's Charley Dresen Wednesday was back in the type of job he knows and likes best — on the field, and with his home town club, the Los Angeles Dodgers.

"We hired Dresen because we believe he is the best coach in the business," said Dodger vice president E. J. (Buzzy) Bavasi, who announced the signing at a press gathering Tuesday.

Dresen's salary was not disclosed. However, the veteran baseball figure last week resigned his \$25,000-a-year front office job with the Washington Senators of the American League.

Dresen said he quit because he wanted "a more active job in baseball."

Well, the cagey sign-stealer and sideline heckler has one. Manager Walt Alston said he plans to station Dresen at third base next season.

Dresen said he wanted to make it clear right off the bat that he has no ambitions to manage the Dodgers — a chore he did ably in 1951-52-53.

"I hope Alston manages the Los Angeles Dodgers for the next 40 years," he told the news conference.

Bavasi concurred that the club doesn't plan to ease Dresen into Alston's job.

"However, if at any time any club wants to hire Dresen as manager we will not only agree, but will push him," Bavasi added.

To make room for Dresen the club juggled its coaching staff. Billy Herman and Jake Pitler became scouts. Joe Becker, who has been with the team several years, and Greg Mulleavy, who joined the Dodgers this past mid-season, were retained.

As a Dodger manager, Dresen won two national league pennants. He quit after the 1953 season when president Walter O'Malley refused to give him more than a one-year contract.

Dresen said Milwaukee and another club he did not identify made him offers. He did not say what the offers involved.

Pleas For Help Refused, Injured Hunter Reports

TACOMA — Rex Richard Gilman, 29, injured in a freak hunting accident near Eatonville Sunday, said other hunters nearby refused his pleas for help.

Gilman, a special agent for the Northern Pacific Railway, was hunting in the St. Paul and Tacoma Lumber Co. area about 9 a.m. Sheriff's Deputy James Smith said Gilman slipped as he prepared to fire at a deer and his rifle discharged, the slug tearing through his left forefinger.

Gilman said he called for help but that hunters in an area below him refused to come to his aid.

He made his way back to his car and drove to Eatonville, where a doctor amputated the finger above the first joint.

"If Gilman had been wounded in a more vital spot," Smith said, "he could have died simply because of the hunters who refused to help him."

4-Day Training School Held For Shell Workers
